## DIRECTOR'S CORNER by Paul Matheson

The Directors held their 4th annual Director's Cup golf event on October 8. In a close finish the team of Marilyn Williams, John Quinn, Bob Matthews, and Paul Matheson edged the team of Bev Magnuson, Jon Williams, John Kuyper, and Rick Gauthier. The awards banquet was held later in the afternoon at the Palmer Golf Course and attended by about 30 players and guests. In a surprise ending Bev Magnuson was voted the most Valuable Player in the tournament despite the fact she was on the losing team. A good time was had by all.

As we enter the Season there are several club policies that bear reviewing. One at these is the seating policy. Since our games are held in facilities operated by the Recreation Department we must abide by their policy that Village residents be given first priority. Residents are given priority on a "first come, first serve" basis. The second priority is for residents who have guests. The last priority is Guest/ Guest pairs. Resident/Guest pairs and Guest/Guest pairs are seated only if space is available.

Another important policy concerns the saving of N/S seats for those with medical problems. A pair desiring this preferred seating must call the director in advance of need. If such a request is granted at least one player from the team must be at the venue at least 30 minutes prior to game time. BOTH players must be at the table at least 15 minutes before the game. If both players are not seated, the table will not be saved and waiting pairs will take their place.

Another policy needing to be discussed relates to cell phones. All cell phones are to be turned off during the game. If a member is concerned about a possible emergency situation they should inform the director prior to the game start. The Director will then decide the course of action needed to minimize a possible disruption. If one's cell phone rings during a game the pair is to be assessed a $1 / 4$ board penalty. If the call is answered the penalty is $1 / 2$ a board.

Another topic concerns the speed of play. Our contract with the Recreation department stipulates the period for which the room is reserved for us. As you may have noticed there are often large lines of people standing outside our rooms waiting to use the room when we are finished. So it is essential that the Directors make sure we finish our games in a timely manner. Also slow play impacts not only the slow table but the players in the table in front of them waiting for a pair to arrive and those in the table behind them waiting to move to the slow table. If allowed to continue this "accordion effect" only causes additional frustrations. Therefore the game directors have a duty to make sure the game moves at a regular pace. Our director's policy is to warn slow tables when they are behind and ask them to catch up by the next round. If slow play continues at some point a board is "pulled". "Pulling" a board is usually frustrating to the slow pair but more so to an innocent pair who started the round late and believe they are being "punished" through no fault of their own.

This will be my last contribution to the Newsletter as Head Director. Rick Gauthier will take over the job in 2018 and we all know he will do a fantastic job. I would like to thank all the Directors who have made my job so easy over the last 5+ years. It has been an honor to have served them and all the members of the club.

Buck Buchanan interviewed our new Head Director as of January 1, 2018, Rick Gauthier. The following is the article he wrote to Buck.
"I grew up and resided in the Springfield, MA, area for the first 55 years of my life. When I graduated high school I planned on going to college for computer programming, however my father owned a heating \& air conditioning business and that summer one of his employees quit and he asked me to work for him. It wasn't really what I wanted and I was not sure if I had the aptitude, but I felt I really couldn't say no. After riding with him for one month he told me I was on my own! When I told him I wasn't nearly ready he said "I don't care if you have to call me ten times a day, you'll never learn if I'm holding your hand!" As it turned out I spent 38 years as an HVAC contractor, the last 22 on my own after my father

Bridge players often tease me about how quickly I move about the room, but this is how I've always worked-full speed ahead. One time my father and I were installing the refrigeration for a walk-in cooler at a restaurant and we moved so quickly doing the job that the owner asked us if we were on speed!

My wife Sally and I met in 1981 in a nightclub where both of us were drinking soda! She wasn't sure she wanted anything to do with me because of the tattoo on my forearm but I had an easy opening line because she obviously had a new tan and who doesn't want to talk about their vacation? Sally and I took up bridge in the late nineties and to this day play a very simple Standard American system. I began directing at a small bridge club in Northampton, MA and eventually became the head director at that club. There were only four or five directors and we only directed once per month.

Sally retired in 2006 from the Social Security Administration and I retired in 2012 at which point we moved to TV. In addition to playing \& directing bridge I enjoy golf, bicycling, walking, games, yard work and working for Habitat for Humanity putting my construction experience to good use.

My philosophy as Head Director will be to splinter off pieces of this huge job. With the tremendous expansion of this club, this job became overwhelming for Paul and I hope to reduce that burden and spread it out. Paul is graciously handling the database management for the club and I think we all appreciate what he has done for us and will continue to do. I plan on helping to train the two new director candidates that expressed interest prior to my election, continue training existing directors, have someone manage the Director schedule, have help with writing the monthly Director's Corner in our newsletter and most importantly trying to have myself and others available to help with the inevitable Bridgemate and ACBLscore problems and what has become a complicated job of running the games. We currently have about 19 games per week and manning them is a continual challenge. To that end one of the conditions of my employment is that no Director will ever be forced to run a game-if there is no one available we may have to occasionally cancel a game in that occurrence, but we will strive to keep that from happening. We are lucky to have a great team of directors who have all expressed a willingness to work with me which in turn will result in a period of stability for the club that was needed at this time.

I would like to cite one player who, for me, is an example that l'd like all players to emulate in order to ensure a pleasant game and keep our directors on board. Paul Hassett has disagreed with my rulings on occasion but has never raised his
voice or argued with me at the table. We will often have discussions after the game and he may persuade me that I was incorrect (or not) but it's always done amicably. As a plus we both may learn something from the conversation. There is never a need for heated confrontation. This is only a game and no one is winning a car!

In conclusion I have to say that my favorite part of directing is the people. Ironically running a game is a social event for me and I've made many friends and shared many laughs with all. I hope the laughs continue!"

Thanks, Rick, for providing such relevant insights into your life, work habits, personality, and dedication. I'm sure the players at our club will support your many endeavors, and may we all have a good laugh now and then! Pat P.

# How would you bid this Hand? <br> By Neil H. Timm 



DEALER is SOUTH and none are vulnerable!
How would you bid this hand? You clearly have several options!

## OPTION 1

Given the vulnerability, some may open $2 \boldsymbol{\downarrow}$, even with that very poor suit!
North with 16 dummy points will bid $4 \vee$. And some may pass. This is a very good result for North-South.

## OPTION 2

However, many east players with a singleton heart will double; and, after west's bid of $5 \star$, east will bid $5 \star$ A good result for E-W if not doubled.
OPTION 3
However, with no defense in diamonds (low ODR - Offense to Defense Ratio), should north now bid $5 \vee$ (not good) or double (better)?
With two diamonds, north must double and NOT bid $5 \vee$. If north were to bid at the 5 -level, east with two quick tricks, and low ODR - must double; hoping partner has one trick.
OPTION 4
With a poor suit, most will not open $2 \downarrow$. Then the bidding may go:

| South | West | North | East |

| Pass | Pass | $1 \downarrow$ | 2 |
| $4 \star *$ | $4 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ | Pass | Pass |

Pass *=Delayed splinter in support of hearts

## OPTION 5

The bidding goes:

| South | West | North | East |

In Option 5, east converted a plus score to a minus!

In Option 5，east converted a plus score to a minus score．
When the opponents are bidding to the 5－level in a competitive auction，many have heard the＂the 5－level belongs to the opponents＂．This is not the case．One must invoke the rule of 210！What is that rule？It goes：
Bid to the 5－level with a void（zero cards in their suit），pass with one，double with two．
The rule comes from negative slam doubles，which are used to decide whether to sacrifice．Over a slam the second hand doubles to show no defensive tricks（0），but passes with（1）or more（2）tricks．

Negative Slam Double－A Double of opponent＇s slam is used to indicate either a willingness to continue bidding or penalize the opponents．
Example：
（1マ）－2ム－（4マ）；
（6V）－X
This Double indicates the player has no defensive tricks and，assuming partner＇s hand is limited to offensive values， suggests partner make a sacrifice slam bid（usually with favorable vulnerability）．
