ACBL Charity Foundation Supports Local Nonprofit

President's Message

Have you ever wondered what happens to all the funds raised at charity games in bridge clubs throughout the country and at the beginning of each NABC? The ACBL Charity Foundation supports many charities and nonprofit organizations through grants. We are fortunate that one of our own just received a \$25,000 grant to support her nonprofit organization, the Reachability Foundation. The recipient is Joclynn

Benjamin, Peter Benjamin's oldest daughter. Though Joclynn does not play bridge, she was a caddy in both local and national tournaments during her teen and college years.

A gymnast in high school, Joclynn majored in Child Development and Family Studies at Cal State Long Beach. After receiving her diploma, she went to work for a company that provided gymnastic opportunities for children with special needs. It was there that Joclynn met Eric Amundson, her business partner. They formed the Reachability Foundation to provide benevolent assistance to low income families with children with special needs through recreational programming that is therapeutic in nature, but is not traditional therapy. To accomplish this goal, Reachability provides travel opportunities for families with children with disabilities. The idea is for the entire family, parents and children, both those with special needs and those without, to participate in the travel opportunity.

One travel opportunity offered by Reachability was a January trip to Big Bear. Ninety-five people spent two nights and three days on Bear Mountain. Operating much like a travel agency, the Reachability staff and volunteers set up and support the activities, but don't provide them. The Foundation provides the housing and programming to families on a sliding scale. Each family is responsible for food and transportation.

The first day, after checking into the Northwoods Resort, the kids participated in a get to know you snowball fight. The group then visited Moonridge Animal Park which cares for animals with disabilities. The park has a one-eyed owl and a three-legged bear. Often animals are rescued and nursed back to health before being released back into the wild. Upon returning to the hotel, the staff facilitated pool and jacuzzi time before dinner at a local restaurant.

On day two, the group spent the morning tubing at the Alpine Slide and ice skating or bowling in the afternoon. The last day is Ski Day in

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Marshall Miles

December 16, 1926 - February 5, 2013

Marshall Miles was an attorney, but most of us knew him as one of America's most respected bridge players and bridge authors. Marshall won seven national championships and one world championship. He is a member of the ACBL Hall of Fame.



The love of Marshall's life was his wife Betty. Betty died several years ago, but no description of Marshall's life could ever leave Betty out, or fail to describe the adoring devotion they each had for the other. Betty was not a great player, but she tried hard to learn from Marshall. Marshall was very patient with Betty at bridge, and Betty was very patient when Marshall would try to explain some advanced concept. Outside of bridge, Betty was very grounded, and her common sense helped Marshall. They were possibly the most perfectly matched couple I ever met.

Marshall wrote a tremendous amount. He authored the Problem Solvers Panel in the monthly Southern California Bridge News for several years. He wrote 11 books and was in the process of writing another. "How to Win at Duplicate Bridge," written in 1957, is my personal choice for the best bridge book ever written. Until that book came out, it was not common to write about cutting-edge ideas, but the book expressed several ideas that were way ahead of their time.

Marshall won five of his seven national championships with Eddie Kantar. Marshall and Eddie were one of the world's most famous partnerships. One reason was that they tried hard to fix the bidding problems they encountered. This resulted in some good conventions, some bad conventions, and some forgotten conventions. The Bridge World magazine once reported that more interesting incidents occurred with Marshall and Eddie at the table than with any other three pairs combined. One of the most famous incidents occurred when Marshall declared 7♣ on a 3-0 fit with Marshall holding ace, king, eight opposite Eddie's void. Eddie, thinking that Marshall had solid clubs, went to the bathroom. He returned, saw Marshall beaming, and asked if he made the grand. Marshall replied that, no, he went down, but they were supposed to defeat him 6 tricks, and they only beat him 5 tricks, allowing him to score the 48. In another famous incident, Eddie made a takeout double over an opening 1• bid holding a good hand. Marshall jumped to 2NT with •JTx. Eddie raised to 3NT and left the table during the play. When he returned, he noticed that the opponents had taken 6 tricks. He asked what happened, and Marshall replied that he had misguessed a queen. Eddie asked if he played the opening bidder for it. Marshall replied no that it was the •Q and he had played Eddie for it.

Marshall was never afraid to back his opinions. In an unsuccessful attempt to back his opinion, Marshall once sacrificed against 7♠ by bidding 7NT. Marshall took **zero** tricks, but told the story frequently. In the 2004 World Senior Championships in Istanbul Turkey, Marshall was partnered with Leo Bell. Marshall held ♠AQJ865 ♥62 ♦7 ♣KJ53 and heard the auction go:

5NT was clearly intended as pick a slam, but Marshall backed his judgment and passed! 5NT made, and any slam would have gone down. This spectacular pass scared the American team captain and many other observers, but with Marshall and Leo turning out good results throughout, the American squad went on to claim the world championship.

Marshall was not only opinionated about bridge but at times a little stubborn about his methods. Don Krauss, Bob Hamman and Marshall were traveling to Miami to play the US team trials. Don asked Marshall a hypothetical question: If the event came down to the last board and he had a choice of going against his system and winning, or backing his judgment and losing, which would he choose? Marshall answered that he would back his judgment and lose.

Marshall loved playing bridge more than anyone I ever met. He would drive long distances to play bridge. He would complain bitterly if he received a bye in a match or the opponents resigned or for some reason he didn't play the full allotment of boards. He would even ask for part of his entry fee to be returned. Marshall was ecstatic when Jeff Goldsmith organized his 80th birthday party and Marshall got to play 80 boards. He was looking forward to his 90th birthday and playing 90 boards.

He had a great sense of humor. He was as kind as anybody I know. We have lost a great friend, and the bridge world has lost its greatest fan.

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conjunction with USARC, United States Adaptive Recreation Center. The staff of USARC takes the kids individually up the mountain and they ski down, sitting or standing, depending on ability.

During the entire event, the Reachability staff and volunteers are available to the families to help if a child has a meltdown, or to advise a parent needing advice on a discipline problem, or on how to deal with the inevitable feelings among siblings, some who have special needs and some who don't. The events also provide opportunities for families to find other families who face the same parenting challenges.

Other trips have featured rafting on the Kern River, a train ride to Santa Barbara, a week in Maui and a Valentine Dance. What they all have in common is that each event is based on exercise and movement.

The \$25,000 grant from the ACBL Charity Foundation will be used for a Wizard of Oz themed event hosted at the Shalom Institute Family Camp in Malibu. The entire camp will be transformed into the Land of Oz and the kids will participate in a variety of Oz activities:

- Lion Activities to earn courage

where they challenge themselves in horseback riding, zip lining or the ropes course.

- Scarecrow Activities where they use their brains to problem solve, do puzzles, or overcome obstacles.
- Tin Man Activities where they show they care as they are caught doing something good, trying a new food, or caring for the animals in the Petting Zoo.

The kids will earn stamps as they complete the activities in order to earn their ruby slippers that will take them home. Evenings will include a screening of the film, group dancing, and a drama night where the campers will put on a

Wizard of Oz play written by a Hollywood parent. While the kids are engaged in their activities, the parents can participate in a number of workshops featuring professional speakers on dealing with children with special needs.

A photographer accompanies each trip, and parents can purchase pictures or online Snapfish books.

Joclynn is the creative genius behind all of this. She works tirelessly planning every detail and finding the right vendors and community people to support the programs. Some of the trips are annual and the families return year after year. Community vendors have watched the children as they mature from grade schoolers to teenagers and beyond. This summer Reachability ventures to Tahiti. After the families leave, Joclynn and her staff will present a workshop in French for Tahitians, sharing their successful strategies.

Eleven tricks are cold, twelve if the $\forall K$ is under the ace (and you run the lead to your hand). But it's pairs; can you make them all? How about this: cash the $\forall A$, then cash nine more tricks (two spades and seven diamonds). Holding both the $\forall K$ and the $\bigstar K$, what is poor LHO to do? If he holds the guarded $\bigstar K$, he has to throw all his hearts and your nine scores (you did unblock the queen, I hope ...). If he holds a high heart, then his $\bigstar K$ falls under the ace and that's that. Thirteen tricks and a cold top.

GUV Memorial Award

There are those that say bridge directors become bridge directors because they can't play bridge. I don't think that is actually the case especially for our esteemed director Mike Savage, but even if it is, Mike has one thing going for him. I have played with him enough times in recent years to attest to the fact that he is one of the luckiest bridge players around.

At the recent Laguna Woods Sectional Swiss Mike held King doubleton of Spades. I held ♠Jxxxx ♥Kx ♦x **♣**KTxxx. Mike opened 1**♣** and my RHO bid 1**♦**. I tried a 1♠ and LHO bid 2♥. I don't know if Mike had a couple clubs mixed in with his spades or what, but he bid 24 on his doubleton. With a supposed 9-card fit in spades and the potential for a big 2-suit fit, I made a game try with 3♣. LHO bid 3♦ back to me and I tried 3♠. LHO bid 4, perhaps hoping that I would bid once more (He had seen us in action on the previous hand) and was passed out. I led a low club and the dummy came down with ace, queen fourth of spades as our partnership breathed a sigh of relief. "Knowing" that declarer had no spades helped me defend the hand correctly as we set the contract one trick. That one trick came when declarer led the spade he didn't have and finessed. He later showed up with yet another spade and left me wondering whether I or my partner had lost it.

At the same Swiss I held a stiff spade, •AJ9 and not much else. LHO opened 1, Mike leaped to 4, RHO bid 5, passed out. Mike led the •Q and dummy tabled with •K8xxxx and •Ax. Declarer ducked the •Q and Mike then led a low spade which rode around to declarers queen giving up a trick. We still managed a 1-trick set but Mike chastised me for playing a "high" diamond at trick 1 asking for a spade switch. I pointed out that the diamond 9 was my lowest and even if I wanted a spade switch, playing the •J didn't look right at the time. At the end we did well in the Swiss but I was left with the feeling maybe directors really can't play bridge.

A Little Learning Is a Dangerous Thing

Playing at the San Marcos Sectional last month, I picked up the following collection in third chair: Ax, AJ9x, AQxx, Axx. I'm planning responses after my anticipated 2NT opening bid when I notice that partner has opened 1H. I end up playing the hand in 6NT after a Jacoby 2NT response, and catch the following dummy:

Dummy: ♠Kxx ♥KT8xx ♦KJx ♠Kx Declarer: ♠Ax ♥AJ9x ♦AQxx ♣Axx

The opening lead was a spade. Being a careful and reasonably proficient declarer, I realized that I had the opportunity to get a partial count on the hand before committing myself in the heart suit. So after winning the first spade, I ran my diamonds, noting that LHO started with a doubleton. I then won a club, everyone following, and it was time to play on hearts. I knew that LHO had 9 vacant spaces for the heart queen and RHO had only 7. So I played the odds and hooked LHO, losing to doubleton Qx on my right.

For my efforts, I received a richly deserved 3 matchpoints out of 25. Why do I think my play was wrong? Because I should have realized that almost the entire room would surely play the hand in 6H, not 6NT. And none of the declarers playing 6H would be able

to risk a ruff by playing around with side suits before tackling trump, so they would all simply play two top hearts. And all I had to do to ensure beating their score was take the same line as they would take, even if I knew more about the odds than they did. Bearing out this analysis, the recap shows that if I had dropped the heart queen, I would have scored up 20 out of 25 matchpoints.

Problem Solvers' Panel

You South hold: ♠AT9852 ♥Q76 ♦9875 ♣--What call do you make?

GOLDSMITH: 4. Give partner ♠xx ♥xx ♦KQJxxx ♠xxx, and 5. goes for 500, so 4. should be our limit. *[The opponents can then make 6...]*. I considered 3. as lead directing— in a McCabe context— but upon reflection, I don't like it because I think declarer in 5. or 6. will work out what I did and pick up partner's trumps or just play the hand double-dummy. If this means we can't beat 4. so it goes. Sometimes partner has a normal club lead anyway.

JONES: 5. There are at least two issues here: how high I'm willing to bid, and do I wish to bid a strain I'd like partner to lead. Bidding some number of hearts or clubs just to increase the opponents' difficulty is possible also. Even though I would slightly prefer a spade lead against a high level club contract, I favor eliminating the 5♣ bid from West's arsenal. I'll defend against a 6-level contract.

SofMM: 3. I could try for a club ruff or for partner to possibly ruff a spade. If partner has a stiff spade, this may accomplish both.

SACKS: 5. There are so many possibilities, I can't believe I'm taking the most direct one. 3♣ appealed to me both to eventually induce a club lead versus 5♥ (I would not sell out below that), and to make it neigh impossible for them to find clubs.

The question here is how high to preempt and the method to do so.

Marshall Miles, a member of the ACBL Hall of Fame and one of America's most respected bridge players, died February 5, 2013.

The problems in this set are the type Marshall was famous for responding with NTs without adequate stoppers. Marshall's typical answers, which are noted as the Spirit of Marshall Miles (SofMM), were written by Bell.

Marshall moderated the Problem Solver's Panel for this newspaper for 21 years. This column is dedicated to his memory.

You, South, hold: ♠KQ ♥AKJ7 ♦854 ♣AK54 What call do you make?

GOLDSMITH: 3NT. I have a Miles stopper, extra values, and NT shape. No raise suggests partner has a diamond card since who preempts on a solid suit non-vulnerable in first seat these days? Marshall made these bids in tempo.

JONES: Pass. It's possible that partner has a little and we have a better strain and game is still marginal. Give partner ♠Axxx ♥Qxx ♠xxx ♣xxxx and game in either hearts or clubs is likely going down if the opponent's diamonds don't block. We can't realistically hope for much more than that. Could we have a 4–2 spade fit with a 5–4 club fit? Sure, but how much more bidding are we going to do to try to find it. It's probable that East has some red cards in his box and isn't afraid to use them. [Seems unlikely when we have in the range of 22-26 HCP] Could partner have ♠AJxxx and

a round queen? Yes, but I'm not about to play partner for a perfect absolute maximum. If bidding more is right, I'll say "preempts work" and go to the next hand.

SofMM: 3NT. I had to suspect this auction would ensue after my double and the only reason I didn't bid 3NT directly was the hope partner could bid hearts.

SACKS: 3NT. I bid in tempo without fear. Might be right contract and might be the only way to get to another right contract. I like it better than wandering into the 4 level on a club suit like this one.

Seems like a big gamble at IMP's to pass 3\(\frac{1}{2}\). There are too many hands where game can make and 3\(\frac{1}{2}\) goes down.

You, South, hold: ♠T74 ♥AKT93 ♠Q8 ♣Q87 What call do you make?

GOLDSMITH: 2. This hand is why some play 4th Suit Forcing not game forcing. With that, this is trivial. Without it, it's impossible. So I overbid slightly to find the right strain and only go down one.

JONES: 3♣. All bids from 2♦ through 3♥ will be right some of the time. 3♥, 3♣ and 2NT are all right on values but possibly wrong on strain. 2♠, which is reasonable when vul at IMPs, is a small overbid. 2♥ and 2♦ both take the low road, but pretty much set the final contract. I don't favor either of them, though 2♥ is better. 3♣ seems the closest to the mark to me.

SofMM: 2NT. This is a perfect description of my

values and Txx is a much better stopper than my usual.

SACKS: 2. Partner will bid 2. on almost any hand with 3 hearts. We lose out when partner has around 14 HCP with something resembling two spade stoppers. At IMP's I would definitely be more aggressive (still can't decide between 3. and 2NT) but at matchpoints I'll be content to go for the plus score.

Playing 4th suit forcing as a game force makes many auctions easier since neither partner needs to jump to show strength. On this hand, it creates a problem in that you have no convenient bid.

GOLDSMITH: 3. We have to try for game when vulnerable at IMP's. Partner will usually have six spades. While I'd prefer not to get a club lead through the Kx, if he goes we probably don't have four quick losers.

JONES: Pass. Normally, AQJ9xxx is called trumps. Here, partner likely has six spades assuming we are playing some version of Hamilton (It's Hamilton when it works and Cappelletti when it doesn't − just ask Fred). Partner's hand is limited by his failure to double 1NT, so 4♠ seems unlikely.

SofMM: 3♥. *My hand is worth some try for game.*

A trump lead against a spade contract will probably defeat 4\(\Delta \) and I'd like to protect my club honor.

*15-18

SACKS: 44. Partner bid 24, a bid higher ranking than our hearts at this vulnerability. He must have a hand with real sound playing tricks. Sounds like NT bidder might have a quirky hand (playing tricks in diamonds with perhaps even a stiff spade, perhaps the K). Might come down to whether partner's potential side card is in clubs or diamonds.

For whatever it's worth, no game should actually make, but 3 will get 4 by partner and the NT bidder needs to lead a diamond to defeat the contract.


GOLDSMITH: 3NT. Easy. Those Miles stoppers come up a lot. Are you sure the diamonds on #2 weren't T74 as on #3 and #5?

JONES: 3♣. I don't like it, but what else is there? There's no stopper for NT, no biddable major, and a cuebid goes down a likely ill-fated path. 2♣ doesn't seem like enough even against a balancing double.

SofMM: 2NT. This should show 11-12 HCP and, of course, a diamond stopper. Once again, my solid stopper will suffice.

SACKS: 2♠. Partner made a balancing double and I have only 4 clubs. Why hang him out to dry by bidding 3♠?

A balancing double at the one level is frequently made with less than opening values. I like either a hefty 1NT or the optimistic 2NT.
