The ABA was founded in 1932 to provide African-American bridge players an opportunity to play duplicate bridge in a club environment. Unfortunately, in the early days of bridge, certain groups were excluded from exclusive clubs. In 1967, the ACBL amended its bylaws so that no person shall be denied membership because of race, color, or creed. The ABA remains a predominantly, but not exclusively, black organization. It holds two national tournaments each year. The ABA has its own masterpoint system. This is similar, but different, from the ACBL masterpoint system. Joint tournaments between the ABA and the ACBL are held in various parts of the United States. In my research for this column I came across the mission statement of the ABA. Part of the mission is to "provide challenging bridge games in an atmosphere of respect, tolerance, courtesy, kindness and friendship." Sure works for me.

My second topic this month centers on youth bridge in District 23. Saturday, April 6, 2013 was the 2nd Annual Los Angeles Scholastic Tournament held at the Barrington Bridge Club. A school bus brought 16 students, two parents, the principal and a teacher from Elizabeth Learning Center in East Los Angeles to play in the tournament. They were joined by four of this year's scholarship winners and other young players and interested adults for the 10-table game. Some of the

students had just begun to learn the game, but they all played and had a good time. Back on campus, these students will continue to play bridge during recess and lunch breaks and twice a week after school.

The person responsible for all this is our very own John Jones who teaches at Elizabeth Learning Center. John began the bridge club on campus after teaching a six-week summer school class on bridge for which students earned math credits. The impetus for this bridge program was John's realization that District 23's Scholarship Program had had no applicants several years in a row. One of the requirements for an applicant is to have some connection

to bridge. In the past scholarship winners had been caddies or were related to a bridge player. Since the students at Elizabeth Learning Center do not come from bridge playing families, to be eligible to apply, they need to become bridge players. This year six of the scholarship winners came from the Elizabeth Learning Center.

John, age 60, began playing bridge in 1974. He became as life master in 1977 after winning the ACBL Master of the Year award for surpassing all records for masterpoints earned by a non life master. John has played in the Reisinger finals and five world championships.

John comes from a family of teachers but he did many other

things before becoming one himself. He has taught math in LAUSD for 25 years. Fifteen of those years have been at Elizabeth Learning Center, the other ten at South Gate Middle School. This year he has a unique position. He spends five periods a day working with kindergarten through fifth graders teaching computer skills. His sixth period is Honor Statistics for mostly seniors. Students in the class have to have passed advanced algebra to be admitted. John also coaches the Girls Varsity Softball Team. In 2012 John was appointed to the ACBL's Goodwill Committee for his work promoting youth bridge. He has coached students from both Cal Tech and UCLA for the ACBL Intercollegiate Tournament.

Our hand for this month isn't – for a change – a wild freak, a real dog, or a rock crusher. In fact, it's pretty run-of-the-mill – at first glance. Partner deals at

unfavorable vulnerability, and you find yourself looking at this modest collection: ★ K752 ▼ T7542 ★ K2 ♣ AT. Partner passes, RHO passes, and it's up to you now. Do you open this hand?

There are three reasons you might want to open: (1) opening 1♥ blocks a minor-suit opening by LHO; (2) you have both majors and can probably out-compete the opponents; and (3) it's your turn to call. On the other side of the ledger, there are three reasons you might not open this hand: (1) you really don't want partner to lead from honor-empty-third in hearts, should LHO end up declaring; (2) if both passers are broke, and there's a big hand at the table, it is behind you; and (3) you would be delighted to defend a major suit contract. Well?

When Yours Truly kibitzed this hand, the holder thereof – a good player and an aggressive bidder – elected to open 1♥. OK, I wouldn't, but then I've never been invited to the Cavendish, either. Neither is the Bermuda Bowl selection committee interested ... Anyway, fourth player calls 1♠, partner raises to 2♥, RHO raises spades, and now ... what?

At the table, opener bid 3. This doesn't look right to me, especially at these colors, since partner will expect a full opening bid (and a better suit, to boot) from you.

What follows is what you'd expect. The opponents competed further, partner went to 4♥, out came the red card, and a few minutes later, it was 800 time. At other tables, the opponents scored anywhere from -110 (someone made 2♥ your way) to +150 in part score contracts. So yes, aggression can be effective: but there's a time to dial it back, too. (By the way, partner's hearts were ♥Q98. Ewwww. The rest of his hand wasn't very exciting, either.)

A Fun Position

Playing matchpoints with everyone red against silent opponents, you end up in 3NT, not 4, looking at the following collection:

Dummy: ♠K64 ♥KQT82 ♦9 ♠AQ97 Declarer: ♠AT5 ♥A53 ♦K854 ♣K42

The opening lead is the \bullet 6, and realizing that all of the heart bidders will eventually lead a diamond to the K in an effort to pitch a spade, you fly. RHO cashes the AQ of diamonds (as you pitch a spade), but then \rightarrow

shifts to the ♣J!

At this point, of course, you realize you've gotten very, very lucky. Diamonds are apparently 6-2 and it looks like you have a finesse position in clubs as well. But if both of these assumptions are true, you don't need to take the club finesse. LHO is guarding diamonds in front of dummy's diamond threat, and RHO is guarding clubs in front of declarer's club threat. You've already corrected the count by losing two diamond tricks. Thus, on the run of the hearts, no one will be able to guard spades.

So cash five heart tricks, throwing a club and a diamond. Assuming the \$\int 8\$ isn't good yet, cash three rounds of clubs, pitching the diamond, which has done its job. Everyone is down to three cards, LHO still has a diamond, and RHO still has a club, so neither opponent has room for three spades and you take the last three tricks with the AK6 of spades, having successfully executed a double squeeze.

You South hold: ◆J753 ♥AJT84 ◆A ◆AQ5 What call do you make?

Goldsmith: Double. I'll guess to double. Maybe partner has ♠Q ♥Qxxxx ♠QJxx ♣xxx. If he has ♠-▼Kxxxx ♠xxx ♣JTxxx, I got it wrong.

Bartusek: 5♥. We can probably beat 4♠, but 5♥ rates to make. I'm not going to play partner for perfect cards and a spade void.

Bare: 5♥. I play that partner would have bid 3NT with a little defense. 5♣ is tempting but my playing strength is a little light for a slam.

Roeder: 5♥. If partner has a spade void, 5♥ should make. It is far from clear to impute a spade void in partner's hand, since the range of hands for 4♠ is Grand Canyon-esque. If partner has a stiff spade, he will likely need the ♥K and the ♠J to make 5♥ a heavy favorite— not an extraordinary catch. It would be helpful to know if my partnership was using 3NT over the double as a raise to 4♥ with an outside defensive

trick. I rate 5♥ as 65% to make and 4♠ as 85% to go down, and when 4♠ goes bate, it will usually fail by just one trick. Bidding 5♥ has another upside: If a heart void is lurking, you might get a crack at 5♠.

Sacks: 5♣. I am on lead, so this must be asking partner to bid more with club values.

Miles (from "Marshall Miles Teaches Logical Bridge" 1967): 6♥. This is a gamble, but partner needs very little strength for a slam if he has a void in spades. If he has a singleton, he may have the ♣K.

Marshall's $6 \forall$ blast puts pressure on the opponents, but David's $5 \triangleq$ slam try looks on target to me.

This is the second in a series of problems first published by the late Marshall Miles, the former editor of this column.

You, South, hold: ♠JT763 ♥A82 ♦void ♣J9543 What call do you make?

Some choose to bid more.

Bare: 5♠. Cheap insurance and I can beat 6♠ with a diamond lead.

Sacks: 5♠. I got my lead director in to beat 6♥.

Bartusek: 5♠. Obviously we can beat 6♥, but 5♥ rates to make with West's probably having a spade void. 5♠ surely is going for less than the value of their game.

Some pass, trusting partner to have made the decision.

Goldsmith: Pass. At these colors, partner does not have as much as ♠KQxxxx ♥x ♠xxxx ♣xx [He would bid 3♠], so we do not have much chance to make. Partner may have a defensive trick, and since we have told him what to lead, even if we don't beat 5♥, we may well get a fair share of the matchpoints by holding them to five.

Roeder: Pass. On this auction, West's bid is 100% to make. You made a questionable decision not to chirp 4♠. [The lead directing 5♦ looks excellent to me.]

Partner should know that 5♦ is a lead director with spade support because of your initial pass. Oh, you play with a Flannery-phile such as Mitch Dunitz – quel dommage. You have put partner in the loop and he has elected not to bid 5♠. Does the presence of your diamond void give you enough confidence to overrule North's judgment? It would be helpful to know if West was Garozzo or Ma Kettle. Partner's most likely distributions are 6043 or 6052. [At favorable opposite a passed partner, partner could easily have a five card suit.] With 6043, he would probably choose to pass. With the latter, it looks right to bid. What tips the scale is that if 5♠ does not make, you are already behind those fortunate enough to buy the hand in 4♠.

Marshall doubles, hoping partner has a defensive trick.

Miles (from Bridge World, January 1976): Double. That's why I bid 5♦, isn't it?

The 1976 Bridge World panel voted 31 for $5 \triangleq$, 2 for double, 2 for pass, with 1 vote for $6 \triangleq$.

You, South, hold: ♠KT ♥KJ74 ♦KT42 ♣A63 What call do you make?

Bartusek: 2. If we have a heart fit, then 4 vershould be a good contract; otherwise, I'm bidding 3NT. (Nice 10!) Sure, balancers can have a queen less than direct seat doubles, but it seems too big a gamble to stop below game vulnerable at IMPs.

Bare: 2. I plan to play 4♥ or 3NT.

Sacks: 2. Unless we find hearts, we are headed towards 3NT. I cue bid, then bid 2NT over 2.

Goldsmith: 2NT. I'd like to cut partner some slack, but most of the time, the points are going to be divided roughly 1/3 me, 1/3 opener, and 1/3 partner, and he's not bidding again over 1NT. Hearts might be better than notrump, and if so, partner might try 3◆ over 2NT with, say, 4-4-1-4 shape. I think it'll be hard to get back to notrump if I bid 2♥ now, and impossible to judge between hearts and notrump if I cue bid, so 2NT seems best.

Roeder: 2NT. 3NT 85%. Thanks for the ◆10 and holding so much stuff behind the opening bidder.

Miles (from Stronger Competitive Bidding, 1992): 2♥, 2♦, or 2NT are reasonable bids. 2♥ allows for partner having shaded his double in fourth position. 2NT also allows for a light fourth hand double, and the hand may belong in notrump even when there is

a 4-4 heart fit. A cue bid gives you a chance to find a heart fit on the way to 3NT. I don't like a penalty pass. The level is too low, and if partner has a singleton diamond, your offensive prospects are better than your defensive prospects. As it so happens, game can be made in either hearts and (sic) notrump, but 1 can't be set.

Welcome to Family Feud! Representing the bridge players we have Marshall Miles! 2♦, good answer! 2♥, good answer!! 2NT, good answer!!! Unfortunately, in bridge we are limited to just one answer. Marshall is correct that passing the double looks wrong. So which of the three reasonable choices is actually best? 2\,\bigvert looks like it's giving partner a little too much rope while making no effort to offer notrump. 2NT versus 2♦ looks pretty close to me. The cue bid gains when partner responds 2, and hearts is the best strain (which won't always be the case just because we have a 4-4 heart fit). If we cue bid and partner rebids $2 \spadesuit$, we will bid 2NT and are slightly behind because an alert opening leader will be less likely to lead a heart. When partner rebids 34, we will have a tough time staying out of game whether we intended on forcing to game or not. I'd prefer the cue bid if I was going to force to game, but I don't think the hand quite merits forcing to game opposite a balancing double. I don't hate either 2♦ or 2♥, but I think 2NT is best in the long

Some panelists think this decision is close between double and 4.

Sacks: Double. Close versus 44. I know I will lose the fifth spade, but the possibility of a penalty conversion gives double the edge.

Roeder: Double. Ouch! Impossible problem. If partner yanks the double, we will likely be in a slam. Partner should not yank a 4-level double out of fright.

Others think that double is clearly best.

Bare: Double. 4♠ works best only when partner has 3 spades and a poor hand.

Goldsmith: Double. Not close. Partner could have ♠x ♥xxx ♠Axxxx ♣Kxx or ♠xx ♥KJx ♠Axxx ♣Kxxx. If he has ♠KJx ♥xxx ♠Axxx ♣xxx, we'll play 4♥ doubled instead of 4♠, but we might get 500 vs. 620 or +200 vs. -100, so that's not terrible.

Bartusek: Double. The most flexible action since it leaves open a large range of contracts (including 4♥ doubled, 5 of a minor, and minor suit slams). The major risk is that we belong in a 5-3 spade fit, but in that case, we might get 500 from 4♥ doubled.

Miles (from Competitive Bidding in the 21st Century, 2000): 4♠. I know partner might hold ♥KJ987, but he is more likely to hold a balanced hand with ♥K975, in which case the penalty will be inadequate to compensate you for your missed game in spades. Partner will make his 'Law' decision based on the assumption that you have at least one heart, and he can't bid spades with a three-card suit (and he may not bid them at the four-level even with a four-card suit).

I think double is significantly more flexible than 4♠. Double follows the sound principle of "When in doubt, let partner help with the decision." It allows partner to convert, bid 5♠ or 5♠, or even try 4NT (normally both minors).

You, South, hold: ♠T964 ♥Q53 ♠J85 ♣JT8 What call do you make?

This hand was played in the 2004 US Senior Trails. Marshall used it as a panel problem in December, 2004. Several of the current panelists were also panelists in 2004, so I've included both answers.

Roeder: Pass-- and pray; even if agnostic. While praying, lead a trump. If partner shows up with a trump, you can take yourself off life support. -530 might not be a total travesty since you might go -200 or -300 if you pick the wrong 3 card suit....or even worse, if the red card gets put on the table.

Some changed their mind 9 years later.

Bare (2004): 4. 3NT would be natural. Tough hand. Pass could be right if partner has two spades or a spade honor.

Bare (2013): Pass. Impossible to know what to do, 3♠ should go set even if partner is void. If partner has a spade honor it should go set 2 or 3.

Goldsmith (2004): 4♣. At IMPs, avoiding disaster is winning strategy, so bid 4♣, since it's least likely to doubled.

Goldsmith (2013): Pass. Plead a sudden emergency. Pass is the normal choice, but it could work out extremely poorly. Bidding could lead to -800, so there's no panacea.

Some stayed with their original guess.

Sacks (2004): Pass. Anything could be a disaster, but I might as well make the bid that has some upside. My little bits in my fragments could be useful on defense,

and I have an easy ♣J lead.

Sacks (2013): Pass. There's not much difference between minus 530 and minus 500. We might even beat it.

Bartusek (2004): Pass. Any bid I make could easily wind up in a 4-3 or even a 3-3 trump fit. Thus, let's hope partner has a stiff spade honor or the makings of five defensive tricks in combination with my scattered values. It will be easier taking five tricks than ten tricks. Probably doubled.

Bartusek (2013): Pass. Hmmm, -500 versus -530. It's a guess, but it seems percentage to try to beat them. Bidding is dangerous, because 4♥ can easily be doubled, and 4♣ might be a 3-3 fit. I'd be more comfortable making a decision if I knew the opponents' style.

Other 2004 panelists included Jill Meyers, who bid 4♣ intending to redouble if doubled, and Michael Schreiber, who passed, stating 4♥ was his second choice.

One hand proves little, but in this case it reminds us that our opponents can occasionally be insane. Opener held a risqué ♠AKJxx, and his partner made a grotesque raise on a singleton queen. Doubler held 23 HCP with three small spades, and declarer scored only his five trump tricks for -800.

Marshall was more inclined to make close passes of part score doubles than any other partner I've ever had; he loved this hand!
