Board Passes Balanced Budget

Bridge is a game and should be fun

I enjoyed the Reno NABC. I did return home a week ago with an upper respiratory infection that I'm just now overcoming. Many players have reported similar health issues

which they attribute to the Reno hotels allowing smoking. On the positive side, the main ballroom offered great smoke-free playing conditions and hotels and restaurants were plentiful and reasonably-priced.

At the Reno board meeting, the board balanced the budget. In fact, the board finally approved an operating budget with a surplus of \$100K. The board voted to cut a number of costs including \$15K in the president's budget. The board worked very hard over the past six months to adjust costs and revenues to absorb substantial increases in technology, cheating prevention and other costs.

The board voted to reduce the Cooperative Advertising Program from a 75% reimbursement to a 50% reimbursement. Clubs and units use this program to subsidize advertising. Although this program is only being reduced for now, the momentum on the board is with eliminating the program entirely so speak up if you feel the program is useful. One problem with this

program is that it's very difficult to tell whether the benefits outweight the costs. I favor giving the new 50% reimbursement level a chance to play out.

The most contentious motion before the board switched responsibility for hearing NABC+ appeals from player committees to the tournament directors. I voted against this motion, but both sides presented strong arguments. The prevailing "TDs should hear NABC+ appeals" side argues that TDs will have more objectivity and that obectivity outweighs any perceived shortcoming in the quality of the decisions. Many on the other side consider the quality of the decisions of paramount importance.

This motion has come up frequently before the board, and I favor reviewing the new scheme for a couple years before entertaining a new vote on the matter.

What I care about is the health of bridge overall. This meeting therefore marked the start of my efforts to raise awareness of the importance of clubs, units and districts – and other people/organizations directly impacting the future of our game. My initial assessment is that a total cultural shift on the board is necessary. The good news is that some other board members share my views and that many very savvy players, employees, ex-employees agree that the prosperity of clubs and teaching programs should be a strategic priority.

I'll share more details on the Reno board meeting in next month's column.

The Platinum Pairs By John Ramos, Unit 562


The late Norman Kay, one of bridge's legends, has his name attached the Platinum Pairs, and it's a fitting tribute: The event, held at every Spring Nationals since 2010, is arguably the strongest matchpoint contest held in the United States thanks to its rigid platinum-point entry requirement. With my Nationals attendance fairly sporadic over the years, I had never had the chance to play this event before last month, and playing with a new (non D23; sorry, Mitch) partner, I had few expectations other than that I should be prepared to kill or be killed. Luckily, although the latter occurred with regularity, the former was more prevalent. A round from the first session went particularly well for us:

Dlr: S Vul: N/S North **♥** K95 **♦** T86 ♣ AK West East **♦** AK53 ◆ OT94 **9** 63 **♥** AJ872 ♦ A54 ♦ Q2 **♣** T9 **♣** QJ73 South **^** --♥ QT4 ♦ KJ973

As North, after my partner passed and RHO opened 1♣, I perpetrated a matchpoints-influenced 1♠ overcall, picking off my opponents' fit and drawing an awkward 2♥ bid from LHO. RHO's 2NT ended the auction, and with the opponents sounding well prepared for a spade lead (and how), I hit on a low diamond. Declarer unhappily saw the queen covered by the king, held up until the third round, and then knocked out one of my high clubs, whereupon I found the play of the king of hearts.

♣ 86542

Declarer now could have cashed out for down two, but hoping I had the heart queen, he knocked out my other club, whereupon we took two hearts in addition to our four diamonds and two clubs for down three and a near top. The next deal:



As North once again, I opened a 14-16 1NT in second chair, and LHO overcalled 2, showing hearts and a minor. My partner bid 3, a Transfer Lebensohl bid showing spades with at least invitational values, and after my minimum-showing 3, he bid 4. After my raise to 5, he might have bid 6, which would have made even on a club lead (details left to the reader), but he chose a higher-scoring strain by jumping to 6. My LHO accurately led a trump, giving nothing away, but I drew trumps in four rounds, discarding my two low hearts, after which ace and a diamond forced LHO to lead into one of my AQ tenaces for my twelfth trick. Phew!

At the end of three grueling days – the last of which was played behind screens – my partner and I lay 13th of an original 104 pairs. Seeing our names up there by so many of the game's greats was the thrill of my bridge career to date. I never really thought of matchpoints as my game, but I can't wait to play this event again.

This month it's back to the "why me?" theme. Third seat, no one vulnerable, you find yourself looking at this balanced hand: ♠-- ▼KJT983 ◆AK8652 ♣A.

Well, anyway, the red suits are balanced with each other, and so are the black suits. OK. While you are deciding what to do with this monstrosity, partner opens 3♣, and RHO jumps to 4♠! Oh well, how about 5♦ by you? (5♥ could be right, but the diamonds are fractionally better, so we'll go with that.) LHO bids 5♠, partner goes 6♠, and now it's all pass.

The opening lead is the ♠K, and this is the dummy you have to work with: ♠85 ♥-- ◆QJT4 ♠KQJT953.

So, 13 tricks roll home, and you are +940. Is this bad because you missed the cold grand slam holding only 24 HCP between the two hands? Nope, that's not it. At almost every other table, the contract was 6• doubled, +1190. At the one remaining table... 6• redoubled, +1580! You were the only one not to get doubled.

We are continuing to profile some of our Inspirational Players in Unit 556. This month we are featuring Hansford Rowe.

Hansford Rowe is an actor and an avid bridge player. He had 60 years in show business and has filmed about 400 commercials. He lived in New York City for 25 years, performing in Broadway and off-Broadway shows. He toured Europe for two months with the Sound of Music and Japan with Porgy and Bess. He moved to California 25 years ago and did about 20 movies and a string of TV episodes. In between jobs, however Hansford always found time to play bridge.

In college he learned to play bridge in the second-floor rafters during lunch break. He did not learn to play duplicate bridge, however, until he came to California. His partner was Helene Wilson with whom he scored 70% in his first duplicate game. His second partner was Bill Brodek, then Hugh Bartlett, and Caroline Tucker. Locally, he now plays with his wife Mira Rowe and their friend, George MacDonald.

Hansford Rowe believes bridge is a fascinating game to play for fun. Like a puzzle it has to be put together with a partner and then reach a happy conclusion. Rand Pinsky, former District 23 District Director, "Not many 91-year-olds win bridge often".

In tournaments, Hansford plays with Distrit 23 president Mike Marcucci. Mike says Hansford is a fine partner and a buddy. Traveling Man

I went up north in early March to play with my old partner, Ryan Wessels, and had what was probably my most fun declarer experience ever. Facing strong opponents, after a 1♥ opening on my left, I overcalled 2♣ and found myself in 3NT facing a heart lead:

Dummy: ♠AT3 ♥983 ♠A ♣QT7653 Declarer: ♠6 ♥Q742 ♦K64 ♣AKJ42

RHO won the first heart with the king, and took a very long time before deciding that if her partner had spade cards, he might have found a negative double. So she led the \bullet Q, her partner encouraging with the 3. I won the trick with dummy's stiff ace and led another \rightarrow

heart. RHO took her ace and persevered in diamonds.

That decision proved unfortunate. I won the king (throwing a spade from dummy) and ran clubs, looking carefully for the seven outstanding diamonds that were higher than my 6. With 4 cards to play, this was the position:

Dummy: ♠AT ♥9 ♦-- ♣3
Declarer: ♠6 ♥Q7 ♦6 ♣--

I led dummy's last club, and RHO had to come down to three cards. Two of them had to be hearts or I'd just cash my last two hearts. Because of the entry situation, a spade discard would defeat an ordinary double squeeze because if I threw my heart threat, RHO could protect diamonds and if I threw my remaining spade, I'd be unable to squeeze LHO because I'd have no way back to dummy after cashing my heart. But RHO started life with KJ94 of spades so if she threw her last spade, her partner's queen would be exposed to a finesse. That left her no choice but to throw her last diamond.

My extra heart wasn't doing me any more good, so

I threw it and led a heart to my hand. LHO had to come down to two cards, and chose to keep a diamond and a spade. I led a spade to dummy's A and the 10 scored as well. My first (and possibly last) double guard squeeze.



You, South, hold: ♠K94 ♥T6 ♦KJ98 ♣T964 What call do you make?

The first question is "Do you agree with South's second pass?" There are seven scattered soft HCP; not much to write home about, but not close to a Yarborough either. No bid came close to adequately describing the hand on South's second call, but this situation is clear as mud, too. 2• is the closest to being a sure plus-score, but hearts will score higher than diamonds if they make the same number of tricks. Highest scoring of all will be passing and letting the vulnerable opponents play 2•. Well, it's highest scoring if they go down!

I'll start with those who make a negative double the first time.

Lolli: 2 At least we're in a seven-card fit, but I would have made a negative double at my first turn to show partner some values, scant as they are.

Sacks: 2. I think I would make a negative double the first time. Usually one would avoid a negative double with only three spades, as partner might bid spades with three, but holding four clubs, that seems less likely. If we get beyond our negative double, we will be better placed having shown some real values. Here, I have shown nothing, but I have no clear bid to show I have something, so I feel I am relegated to a simple

2♥ and hope partner bids again. Passing for penalties does not seem right with no aces and no guaranteed trump trick.

Lee: 2♥. It seems clear at matchpoints to play the major. At IMPs there is some appeal to bidding 2♦, planning on raising 2♥ to 3♥, but at matchpoints, we just have to go for the higher scoring strain. [Roger also told me he preferred the negative double on the second round.]

Kantar: 2^{\checkmark} . When two other bids are possible (pass and 2^{\checkmark}), choose a third, 2^{\checkmark} , taking the low road.

Bartusek: 2♥. Why gamble? Seriously, wouldn't everyone often reopen with a double holding 3=6=3=1 distribution?

Goldsmith: 2. If partner can make game opposite this, he'll bid again.

Roeder: 2. To those who astutely point out that majors score more than minors, I bow down to this galactic truism. It must be said, however, plus scores are good, and it will be very important on many hands to take the tap in the hand with the short clubs. The lack of a heart honor is another detraction in bidding 2.

You, South, hold: ♠J ♥AT4 ♦A64 ♣AKQJT4 What call do you make?

This hand comes from a recent regional. Mike Savage held this hand. His second and third bids were far from clear, and some of the panelists objected to one or both of them. I would have started with a redouble to show three card heart support. Mike passed in this situation on the actual hand, but he took longer than normal to do it. The opponents called the director and complained. When the directors did a survey among "experts," two of four stated that pass wasn't forcing. Thus, the directors ruled that pass was a logical alternative and ruled the contract as 4\square undoubled down one. Savage was outraged, claiming pass was clearly forcing. I agree! If a reverse followed by jumping to game doesn't create a force, what does create a force? I would not want to partner an "expert" who thought pass wasn't 100% forcing. The discussion of this problem drew enough attention that John Swanson, writing the counter to this column in "The Forum," used his partner's hand. Roger Lee was on both panels and connected the hands. Let's see what the panel thinks.

Roeder: Pass. The question: Is this a forcing pass? After a reverse, I think so. I would bid before I would double. At best, you will beat this one. When opponents bid to this level red against white, they are either insane or they've got it.

Bartusek: Pass. Partner has the spade length and knows the quality of his trumps; let him decide what to do. My pass is clearly forcing.

Lee: Pass. I suppose I've shown something like this,

so I'm happy to hear partner bid or double. I hate 2• [I agree, redouble is clear], redouble was a better bid whether it showed 3-card support or extras. [Roger told me on the phone that he thought pass was clearly forcing.]

Goldsmith: Pass. I think we are in a force, since we've bid game on power, so I'll leave this decision up to partner.

Sacks: Pass. Where is our fourth trick on defense? Righty heard me reverse and still kept walking the hand. My partner heard me bid, too, maybe he'll have something to say.

Kantar: Double. East is bidding like a guy who is sacrificing. I will look silly if he isn't.

Lolli: I would have redoubled at my first opportunity to show three hearts. Later in the auction, I would have bid 6♣ to show partner solid clubs. I would expect partner to bid 6♥ on ♥KQJxx, since he knows I have three. If partner has only ♥KJxxx, maybe he'll have the ♦K or •QJ. All the panelists will say they find the ♥Q if necessary for a diamond pitch or a red suit squeeze, if playing 6♣. I think 4♥ is an awful bid.

It looks as though the panel thinks pass is forcing. The table opponents were obviously looking for something. The sportsmanship of this bothers me.

This hand is also from a recent regional, but I added the •J accidently.

Lee: Double, which I think is normal with this shape, especially with a hand that is happy to pass 3M or 3N. If partner bids 3 and

it's wrong, so be it.

Lolli: Double. I didn't ask partner to bid diamonds did I? If he does, maybe he's got some and we'll be all right.

Bartusek: Double. Aggressive,

but seems indicated (don't want to miss a vulnerable game). I don't want to risk losing hearts by over-calling spades. Hopefully we'll be in at least a 7-card fit if partner bids 3.

Goldsmith: Double. Pass could be right, but with both majors and moderately short clubs, I prefer to act.

Kantar: 3♠. Edgar Kaplan says: "when in doubt bid your longest suit." This one is for you Edgar. If partner has hearts, I won't tell anyone, Edgar.

Roeder: Pass. If partner cannot bid in balancing seat, I judge game to be against the odds. Also, bidding close games after a preempt often does not pay due to potential bad breaks.

Sacks: Pass. Partner is still allowed to bid. 3♠ is marginal at best, and we might belong in hearts. Double begs for a minus score.

The winning call on the actual hand was to pass. The hand behind you was quite strong.

This hand is from a regional about 20 years ago.

Sacks: 3♥. This seems right on values. I don't really want to defend 3♦.

Lolli: 3♥. I'll take the mundane raise. At least the ♣K should be in the slot. Double would have been expressing useless information, because they won't be playing it in clubs.

Bartusek: Pass. This could be a massive vulnerable misfit (imagine LHO bidding 3♣ with three clubs and three diamonds). I can always decide to back in with 3♥ over LHO's 3♦ bid.

Goldsmith: Pass. All my stuff is in their suits, so I'll just defend. Hopefully, partner will lead trump.

Kantar: Pass. Cowardliness is rearing it's ugly head again. I cannot get myself to bid 3♥. Besides, a 3♣ bid will slow the game down to a crawl.

Lee: Pass, happy to defend with a hand like this.

Roeder: Pass. If it goes 3♦, Pass, Pass to me, I will have another decision. Bidding 3♥ immediately is way too optimistic when hearts may break badly.

The winning action on the actual hand was to double any contract by the opponents. The player presented with the problem did just that, doubling 2NT, and doubling again when 3♣ came to him.

You, South, hold: ★KQT4 ♥K64 ◆AKJ64 ♣6 What call do you make?

This is another hand from the last millennium. Style has changed considerably since then. Few experts would agree with the double now. They would either Pass, over-call INT, or possibly overcall the four-card spade suit (not recommended on hands this strong).

Kantar: In real life if I double 1♦ with a hand like this, my partners don't respond in spades. [No kidding!]

Sacks: 3♠. Einy, meiny ... three or four, I bid 3♠. Good thing my partner did not respond 2♠ to my silly double. [Whew!]

Lee: 3♠, right on values, though I strongly object to the double of 1♠.

Bartusek: 3♠. I don't have many losers when the aces and the ♦Q rate to be onside. Game probably won't take much from partner.

Goldsmith: 3♠. What was the double on the first round? Then, the choice was between pass and 1NT (or maybe 1♠). Are we playing power doubles? A normal maximum for partner is something like ♠AJxxx ♥J ♦xxxx ♣xxx. On the other hand, he could hold ♠Jxxx ♥xxx ♠xx ♠Qxxx. We aren't completely safe at the three-level, but game is in the picture, so I need to invite.

Lolli: 4♠. Bid what I think I can make. Slam is not in the picture, so no need to tell the enemy what my hand is about. I considered 3♠ for about 10 seconds, *[oops, a break in tempo in the column]* but partner will have a hard time bidding 4♠ on such as: ♠Jxxxx ♥Qx ♦xx ♣xxxx.

Roeder: 4♠. Both the ♠Q and the ♥A look to be well-placed. Not 4♠, as my fifth diamond may be devalued.
