#### Whispers or Not

There are lots of little things about playing bridge that are forgotten in the heat of battle. "Lead before you write." How many of us have heard that before? How many do it religiously? How many ways can you politely ask an opponent to follow this guideline? How many

ways can you politely ask a partner!

And then there is technology. Those friendly BridgeMates that make life easier for us. Maybe more so for the Directors than us! Everybody does a little so one person doesn't have to do a lot. Good philosophy. Should prevent a lot of mistakes since more than one person looks at the results input. I've heard that even our beginners start to like them after a few sessions. There is always that "new gadget" period where anything new is bothersome. And poor eyesight can always interfere with something new being liked and being irritating instead. Overall, I think players are getting used to them, like them, and they are a benefit to the game. And who can not like getting the results immediately after that last button is pushed?

BridgeMates are expensive. This is an impediment to many clubs and units. No argument there. But more and more clubs are finding a way to afford them. They are probably with us for good until the next great innovation. Tournament players see them pervasively. The clubs will catch up.

One little drawback in the way we use them is irritating to me and I learned a long time ago that, if I am bothered by something, lots of other folks are bothered by the same thing! Interestingly, the exact same issue comes up whether score slips are being used or if BridgeMates are being used.

#### Mississippi politics

The headquarters of the ACBL is located in Mississippi. ACBL leadership wrote a letter in early April

to Phil Bryant, the Governor of Mississippi, expressing opposition to a legistlative bill, HB1523, passed by the Mississippi legislature that ACBL leadership perceived as negatively impacting LGBT rights. Governor Bryant, in fact, signed the bill into law.

I side with ACBL leadership – in this case the ACBL CEO and the ACBL President – in encouraging the state in which our organization's headquarters is located to be protective of civil rights. The ACBL has internal rules prohibiting status-based discrimination in employment or membership. No doubt the ACBL board of directors in conjunction with league management will investigate our duties and options in light of the passage of HB1523.

contract or the results during the scoring process without broadcasting those facts to the rest of the room!

Some players insist on broadcasting the facts multiple times. A minor thing perhaps. Perhaps not. If the N/S players, who are doing the scoring, will think carefully about this, they can determine that the only players hurt by this practice are themselves. It only **helps** the E/W players!

Think about it: if the N/S pair at the next table knows the contract and/or the results on a board, they may inadvertently take advantage of this knowledge and get a better result. That result, therefore, **lowers** the score of the N/S pair who "announced" the result and **helps** the E/W pair at that last table even though they are now gone.

Whether acted upon or not, the temptation to take advantage of such knowledge is a distraction from the business at hand and that is to play the hand you are dealt as best you can.

To be fair, you should have **no** knowledge of any previous result and that is exactly what will take place if the scoring process is done in **silence** or in whispers.

There is nothing wrong with writing down a contract and letting your opponent see what you have written in silence! There is nothing wrong with writing down a result and showing it to your opponent in silence! The same holds with Bridgemates. Enter the contract before play starts and show it to your opponent. Anything wrong with that? Enter the result and show it to the opponents for verification. **Silently!** 

If a lot of N/S's will start practicing this recommendation, not only will our playing area be quieter, it will be one more small matter taken care of to level the playing field at a game and prevent any hint of foul play. Something we should all strive for in all aspects of our game.

Lest you readers think I am forgetting about something related to this – the discussions about **all** the results once you see them on the slip or the screen and the sometimes loud discussions that ensue, never fear. We will discuss that in the future. Tempus fugit, or something like that.

For now, hope everyone is learning something every day to improve your game and we'll see those results at the July Regional in Long Beach.

of May. You can offer extra masterpoints, and most of the money is returned to our district. District 23 had the lowest contribution of any district to the Grass Roots Fund. Let's turn that around.

Note that if our district becomes a strong contributor to the Grass Roots Fund, we can get back more than we contribute to the fund. Three districts received back over 120% of the amount they contributed to the Grass Roots Fund.

For your information: May is designated as Grass Roots Fund month. During May, a club may hold as many games as they have sessions to benefit the North American Pairs and the Grand National Teams. During any other months, excluding January, April, and September, one game per month per sanctioned session may be a special fund game for the Grass Roots Fund.

Other News

The Longest Day will be held Monday June 20 this year: a day earlier than normal due to Leap Year.

In the past year the ACBL has increased its membership by 1214 people.

The biggest club in our district for 2015 remained the Long Beach Bridge Center, with the 750 Club and the Beverly Hills Bridge Club coming in second and third, respectively. The first grant nominee for this year's District 23 charity grants is the West Valley Food Bank. The West Valley Food Pantry was nominated by Unit 561 – San Fernando Valley. The West Valley Food Bank provides emergency food to the needy. The WVFP began in 1975 and currently provides about 850 families with 20,000 meals per month. The WVFP has a close connection to Unit 561 members by virtue of being physically located next door to the very successful 750 Bridge Club.

Oh, joy and rapture unlimited. Partner has promised 9 tricks (or more), but your tram tickets will contribute little if anything. Not even a wretched doubleton in that mess. So what's your call?

Partner's bid is 100% forcing, of course. Frustration! Here's where the trust part comes in. The winning call is ... Pass! Yes, you are Masterminding the deal. Does partner trust you enough to not commit that sin too often if you do it this once? Do you trust partner not to cram the cards down your throat (figuratively speaking, of course) if you pass? Partner's hand is ♠T ♠AQ9 ♠AKJ7 ♠AQJT84 and only 9 tricks are available in clubs. If you call 3 NT just to keep the auction alive, you go down two. Obviously, nothing else is better, either. Such is bridge.

At the recent San Diego Regional, I had a most unlikely and unexpected 6 IMP pickup in a KO match. I promised my partner not to mention his name in this column because we wouldn't want his wife Chiye to find out the error in his ways. However, I might suggest to her that he needs new eyeglasses.

I held AKx of clubs and not much else when my LHO opened 2♣ and rebid 2NT after a 2♠ bid by responder. The opponents started bidding away and at one point my RHO bid 6♣. I couldn't resist doubling for the lead and LHO bid 6NT. I didn't double this because I didn't want pard to think I wanted a lead other than a club.

Well I got one anyway, a diamond. Declarer had 12 tricks without needing a club so he wrapped up 6NT. We were playing behind screens and using bidding trays. Perhaps pard missed out on my double because of this, perhaps his glasses needed replacement or perhaps he was sleeping through the auction. In any case this felt like a big IMP loss in a close match.

Well, guess what, our teammates also got to 6NT and the hand with AKx decided to double alerting pard that there was a lead which beat 6NT. Unfortunately for him his pard didn't find it so our teammates made 6NT Doubled and we had a 6 IMP pickup.

# Problem Solvers' Panel

You, South, hold: ♠AJ32 ♥K76543 ♦765 ♣--What call do you make?

We have a good fit, a long suit, a void in the opponents' suit and a mediocre HCP hand. What's best?

#### Chechelashvili: 44.

**Swanson:** 4. A slight overbid to eliminate the possibility of being shut out of showing the two big features of my hand – four-card spade support and short clubs.

Wittes:  $4 \clubsuit$ . Perhaps a slight overbid, but if partner has nothing wasted in clubs, the  $\bigstar$ KQ, the  $\blacktriangledown$ A, and either the  $\bigstar$ A or  $\bigstar$ K, we are in the slam range.

**Bare:** 4. Light for a splinter but there is going to be a lot of bidding.

**Lolli:** 4♣. We could go from a possible set in 4♠ (♠KQxxx ♥QJ ♠QJx ♣xx) to a possible grand (♠KTxxxx ♥AQ ♠Ax ♣xx). It's also possible the opponents could bid some grotesque number of clubs. By bidding 4♣, at least partner knows I have at least four spades with club shortness.

Davis: 2♥. I want partner to evaluate AQx in hearts and a stiff diamond much more highly than if his red suits were reversed. I will cue bid 4♣ if I get the chance, will cue bid 5♣ if partner shows extra interest in either major, and will take the push to 5♠ if he/she bid to 5♠, unless partner doubles 5♣ in front of me. A game-forcing fit-showing jump to 3♥ would be the ideal bid over 2♠ with my hand. A direct 4♠ over 2♠ is okay, but I like highlighting the red-suit disparity

and then showing the club control, unless partner discourages me. This is risky because showing the club control is more important than showing hearts. However, if the opponents jump to 54 and partner has two or three clubs, he will infer that I am short in clubs.

Wickham: 2. Since a grand slam in spades is an excellent proposition when partner holds as little as ♠Kxxxxx ♥Ax ♠Ax ♣xxx, and anything past the four level could be a disaster opposite some trash like ♠KQTxx ♥Jxx ♦Kx ♠KQx, creating a plan that will work in either case is not easy. I expect my LHO will raise clubs, and I will try my best to read the level of satisfaction attached to the club raise. My plan is to start with 2 to give the opponent enough room to raise clubs with most any hand type. If partner passes or bids diamonds over the anticipated club raise, I will cuebid 4♣ if available, or the minimum number of spades available through the six level. If partner rebids spades or raises hearts, I plan to cuebid clubs as cheaply as possible. Maybe we're saving against a cold club slam, or maybe I'll need a new partner after this adventure.

Shuster: 3♥ if fit showing, otherwise 4♣. While useful to tell partner I have a good hand with club shortness, it is more useful to let partner know that ◆AQx ♣x in the minors is offense and ◆x ♣AQx is defense.

I like the  $3 \checkmark$  bid, which gets in the spade support and the heart support at once.

**Bare:** 4♠. All bids have flaws but ♠K should solidify clubs and let partner know that it is our hand.

Wittes: 4♠. If partner bids 5♠, I will bid 6♠. Over 5♠, I will bid 7♠. For a vulnerable four level overcall, partner rates to have ♠AQJxxxx of clubs and the ace of diamonds, and possibly a spade void.

**Shuster: 4NT.** Keycard. I'm driving to at least 6♣, but if partner doesn't answer a spade void, we'll play 6NT.

**Swanson: 4NT.** Ace asking, I assume. The plan is to bid 6NT unless partner does something to indicate a spade void.

Wickham: 4NT. The only question I have is whether or not partner has first round control of spades. ♠void ♥xxx ◆AJx ♣AQJxxxx would be a lousy 4♣ overcall, and 7♣ would fail only if clubs were 10xxxx offside. ♠A ♥xx ◆AJxx ♣AQT9xx would be a better 4♣ overall, but 7♣ would often go down with ♣Jxxx offside. My plan is to bid 4♦ Kickback or 4NT RKC.

Chechelashvili: 5NT. Grand Slam Force, a convention that I don't typically like to use, but I believe best

here. With the quality of a spade suit, I tend to trust LHO for having seven, so either partner or RHO have a void, and both are good. I don't think partner would bid 4. with anything less than •void •xxx •Axx •Axx •AQJTxx (or •oid •xxxx •Axx •AQJTxx, or •x •xx •Axx •AQJTxxx). I am bidding 5NT in case partner has •void •xx •Ax •AJTxxxxxx or similar.

**Lolli: 6NT.** They called the director on me because I took so long, so I shruged my shoulders and bid. If there is a vote to kick me off the panel, let me know the result. :)

Davis: 74. It will be embarrassing if the opening lead is a spade and partner has to follow, but that it unlikely. If partner has seven clubs and no club losers, we should have 13 tricks. With six clubs and no red jack, a red-suit squeeze or setting up a spade trick (assuming he is void in spades) will have to suffice. Of course, it would be nice if partner has the diamond ace and no club losers. 4NT as Blackwood would be best in case we have 13 top tricks without bringing in the club suit (e.g., A xx AJxx AQJxxx), but I won't risk partner thinking 4NT is natural.

Swanson: 4. A little heavy, but gets the flavor of the hand across.

**Bare: 4**. Let opponents guess at the five level.

Chechelashvili, 3%.

Wittes: 3♥. Over 3♠, I will carry on to game. I have too much distribution not to bid on. If partner cue bids, It's a tough decision whether to cooperate, but below game level, I would probably bid 4♦ over 4♣.

Davis 3♥. Invitational or better in spades. I will, of course, continue on to 4♠ but I'd rather not bid 4♥ directly since I could be stronger. I don't want partner to be guessing how good I am if he/she crowds the auction with a 5♥ bid, so I'd rather set the floor at an invitational hand in spades. I will bid 4♥ if given the opportunity and partner shows interest in slam.

**Lolli:** 4. If partner gets enthusiastic, but I'm not going to be the steering oar.

Shuster: 4♥. Unlike problem 1, I have honors in both side suits. I'll let partner know I expect to make 4♠ and leave any 5-level decisions up to him.

Wickham: 4♣ (Fitted). I would make a 4♥ (2nd choice) splinter bid unless I had a fit showing jump to 4♣ (1st choice) available. On a good day I might make 4♠ opposite a piece of trash like ♠Axxxx ♥Kx ♠Qxx ♣Kxx. More importantly, I want my partner to know I have some defensive values, although I had to overstate my offensive capabilities a bit. Sometimes partner will have to make a decision over 5♥.

Once more, I prefer the fitted jump. It gets across why I am forcing to game.

The opponents may wish they had made a penalty pass on some of these auctions!

**Bare: 3**♣ for lead then probably 5♦.

Wickham: 3♣. I am certain that I will eventually bid 5♠, and I will expect to make that contract half of the time. On the way, I need to set up our defense against a spade contract, so I will bid 3♣ at this time. If 5♠ is frigid, and the opponents cannot make a game, AND can manage to pass out a 3♣ contract, kudos to them. I plan to bid the minimum number of diamonds at each subsequent opportunity, unless the opponents bid to 5♠, which I will double and defend.

**Davis:** 4. I hope that the nasty opponents don't let me play here undoubled and that this gets a club lead against 5. (I will bid 5.) and then make a greedy double of 5.).

Chechelashvili: 5♣, hoping to get a ♣ lead against possible 5♠.

**Lolli:** 5. Proctected by the law. Let them guess. That's what they do to me anyway.

Shuster: 5. I expect LHO has extra spade length and I don't want him to be able to show it at a convenient level. I could bid 3♣ or 4♣ angling for the lead, but that leaves LHO room to bid spades. I could bid 5♣, but that risks playing there when 5. is a down-zero save. Sometimes it pays just to bid what is in front of your nose.

Swanson: 5♦. Seems routine. I suppose that 3♣ to be followed by 5♦, trying for a club lead, is possible. I'll take the straight-forward action and try a

double of 5♠ for a club lead (if they bid it). If partner leads a singleton heart, that won't be bad either.

Wittes: 5. Seems about right for this hand.
