
President's Message

Bridge is a game and should be fun

Last month I discussed two of the ten "big ideas" proposed by our new CEO – ideas to be discussed at the San Diego board meeting.

This month, I will cover two more ideas from the CEO.

Advertising

The CEO has proposed a specific plan for advertising. I like the plan, but I generally don't think the CEO needs board approval to conduct advertising. That said, the new CEO might want to make sure he's not getting too far ahead of the board of directors, so it's fine for him to engage the board on this idea.

I support advertising, and I especially support new vectors for finding and recruiting potential bridge players. The CEO's plan has many elements:

- Create a nationally coordinated campaign across social media. I fully support this idea
- Nationalize sponsors of NABCs. I find this goal to be an overstep; districts that host NABCs need to have flexibility to meet local sponsors needs.
- Focus on a few successful clubs to determine how to utilize the cooperative advertising to best effect for

NAP Unit Finals In Progress

District 23 held the first of two Unit Final games in the North American Pairs this past October 15 at the lovely South Bay Bridge Club in Lomita. With room for 20 tables only, it was a challenge to accommodate a record amount of interest in the game.

We managed to support 21.5 tables in a twentytable room by adding half-tables to each of the three sections in play. Flight A had 4.5 tables, while Flights B and C each had 8.5. With no empty tables in the house, our "sit-out" pairs became "stand-outs!"

Our next and last Unit Final game is Sunday, Nov. 5, at the Long Beach Bridge Club, and that's shaping up to be a very large turnout as well. Pairs who pre-register on the District 23 NAP web site get a small discount on card fees for the event. Register as soon as you can at https://nap.bridgemojo.com.

At the first Unit Final game, we qualified 50 bridge players for the District Final to be held on January 14. Besides the chance to represent District 23 at the Spring NABC, there are tons of red and gold masterpoints available for all flights in the District Final.

Director's Corner: A Preview

Hi there, District 23 friends. I volunteered to write a series of columns about how players can help make the club game experience better for themselves (and, maybe or maybe not, easier on the director.) This is the intro article. I am hoping that seeing this column in print will inspire some of the more experienced (and quite frankly, better) directors in the district to offer their own contributions.

In my mind, the club director's role is a bit different than the tournament director role. At a club game, I assume that the patrons are there (in approximate order of frequency and/or priority): to pass time in the afternoon; to socialize with friends, to enjoy lunch; to practice for an

upcoming tournament, to practice what we learned in this morning's lesson, to win. At most clubs, many of the same players sit down to play against each other day after day with only small changes in the line up. Tournament players are, again in my mind, seeking a more purely competitive experience where the contest aspects heavily outweigh the social aspects.

My major aim as a club director is to keep the peace - which is not easy as some people carry grudges into and out of the club for years - and ensure that as many players as possible have a good time that day. Some days, it seems like the players themselves would rather not have a good time, but I try not to let that

bother me (too much). One of my favorite quotes is: "This is the bridge club. If we can't get along with people here, where are we going to go?"

Of course, I take my duties on the Laws of Bridge and for ACBL seriously as well. I want to make knowledgeable and correct rulings. I want the application of the Laws to be uniform across all ACBL Sanctioned games. I do not want my ruling to affect the outcome of a competitive contest and I especially do not wish for an erroneous ruling to affect the outcome.

On top of that, I do my best to maintain an environment where Novices, Gold Rushers, Life Masters and Grand Life Masters can all compete together, socialize with friends, & eat lunch. I hope everyone in my game feels that they have been treated fairly and in accordance with the Laws. And that is part of what I hope to accomplish in this column: educating players so they are familiar with correct rulings and procedures.

Therefore, in the months to come, I am planning to cover some of the most common director calls (lead out of turn, revoke, breaks in tempo, other unauthorized information, obvious scoring errors, bridgemate procedures, etc.). My belief is that if readers of this column understand more about how these common situations are resolved, they will be happier with the rulings they get when something arises at the table. Maybe I am optimistic.

The fun starts next month!

Not a single promotion to report this month. Well, as noted last time, attendance was down over the summer, and there hasn't been a nearby Regional lately (no doubt the results from the Costa Mesa Regional haven't shown up yet in the updates).

For our Hand of the Month, we have some make-of-it-what-you will hands. Nothing spectacular ... just a couple of examples of why this game can be so intriguing ... and so exasperating. First: You pick up, as dealer, the following so-so hand: ♠Q9432 ♥10943 ♠KQ ♣K2.

After two passes, partner calls 1♠, pass, to you. Well, it kind of almost looks like a limit raise – but is it really? The tight diamond honors may not be pulling the weight, the hearts are pathetic, and who can say how much the ♣K is worth? (By the way, you aren't playing Bergen raises or anything else fancy – just plain old kitchen bridge.) So what will it be?

How about 2 •? It does pinpoint your side strength. True, partner might leave you there – but you know **this** partner pretty well, and deem a pass unlikely. So 2 • it is. Partner rebids 3 •, and that's that -4 • it is, making 5, a flat board. You went through all that soul searching for nothing!

How about this one? In fourth seat, you find yourself looking at: ♠A10985 ♥5 ♠862 ♣AKJ10.

The auction goes 14, pass, pass, over to you. Now what? Your side has the balance of power, no doubt (unless LHO has a junior two-bid over there) ... but what's your call? Double, and watch partner bid hearts? 24, on a four bagger? (Admittedly, it's a nice one.) 1NT, wide open in the red suits?

How about this principle: "When they want to play in your best suit... let them." So you pass. Good defense puts the contract 1 down, with nothing on for your side. Partner is 2=6=2=3, so you have no fit anywhere (except for the 5-2 spade fit!) and as an added bonus for those adventurous souls who went 24, clubs are 6-0 (on your right, of course).

Quote for the Month: "Get it right, you're a star. Get it half right, you're a gas giant." (Spider Robinson) Until next month ...



Santa Clarita-Antelope Valley by Beth Morrin

The following in a report by Mira Rowe of her experiences at the Long Beach Regional Tournament this past June:

When my late husband, Hansford Rowe, and I arrived at the tournament, he played with District 23 President, Mike Marcucci, while I headed for the partnership desk. One player, named Warren Cummings, listed 900 points, a little more than my 800. When I phoned, he said he would be glad to play with me. I found Warren to be kind and amicable. We filled out our convention cards together. In between, we talked and he said he is a math teacher for a prison. He has 18 students who will eventually graduate, some taking more time than others. Connor said he loves his job. "Isn't it scary?" I asked. "Well," Connor said, "there are two alarms on both sides of my belt, an alarm on the wall and an alarm on the phone nearby. Security comes the minute I press a button." "Do you ever use it?" I asked. "Everyday, but there is no other job I would rather have than this."

The next day, the partnership desk gave me Robert Micone as my partner who was there at the last minute. What luck! This player has five thousand plus points!

A miracle! He told me he only has one request, for me to call out the cards as I lined them up when I become dummy. He said he has a degenerating retinal condition. Pretty soon, the opponents, wanting to be helpful, were calling out the suit too. It was fun to watch him memorize the patterns of the cards and play them by memory as he held a light between his teeth. After our game, he asked me if I enjoyed the game. "Immensely!" I replied. It was quite a treat for me. Robert later gave me a lighted pen that was made in his own factory. I treasure the pen to this day.

Do It Once. Do It Right. And Never Do It Again.

There's a reason people are told not to repeat a preemptive raise. Holding ♠K10xxx ♥Axx ♠AQ9x ♣x I opened 1♠. I heard a 2♣ overcall on my left and partner showed at least a limit raise by bidding 3♣. RHO bid 4♣ and if the opponents were going to take a club sacrifice, I thought I should warn partner that my spades weren't great, so I bid 4♠, suggesting a diamond lead. Partner bid 4♠ and that should have been that.

But then RHO repeated the preempt, bidding 5♣. My pass was forcing and partner, encouraged by my willingness to bid beyond game, found a 5♦ bid. At this point I thought I owed partner a 5♥ cue bid, and partner offered me my choice of slams by bidding 6♦. I thought ruffing clubs in the hand with shorter trump was likely to be worth an extra trick, so I played it there. Partner's hand was a little less than I expected: ♠AQx ♥xx ♣J10xxx ♣Qxx. The ♦K was in the slot, though, so all's well that ends well. We were, of course, the only pair in the room to bid the 22-point slam.

The flawed choices here are $1 \ge$ with only three of them, 1NT which should show a stopper and about 8 to 11 HCP, or $2 \ge$ with only three of them. This is an old theme. Steve Robinson has used similar hands in his column. He believes that the response on hands like this should never be in a three card major. On this hand $1 \le$ playing with my friend Renee Hoffman. She responded $1 \ge$. $1 \le$ had doubled holding a $3 = 2 \le 4 \le 4 \le 17$ HCP hand and passed her in $1 \ge$. Not surprisingly, the 3 - 3 fit wasn't a good place to play.

Lolli: 1NT. Yes, I would rather have a potential heart trick, but it does show no interest in one suit or another, which is what I want to convey.

Dunitz: 1. I need a pimple more in hearts to bid 1NT.

Goldsmith: 1♠. 1NT has two flaws. 1♠ has only one.

Baqui: 1♠. My choices in order are 1♠ or 1NT. I like 1♠ better as it keeps the bidding low, and I don't expect to get doubled. If 1♠ gets doubled, I'm willing to redouble to get partner to bid his/her better (longer) minor.

Bare: 1. What else? Partner is aware that occasionally I may have a three card suit, and at least I have some values.

Jones: 1♠. If I had a worse hand, I would bid 2♠ with this shape. Partner tends to hang you less when you

escape to a minor in these situations. Here with an ok hand, I will bid 1\(\Delta\) and take my medicine if I find myself in game in spades on the next round.

Davis: 2♣. 1♠ would be the recommended bid in a bridge book with this hand as it keeps the bidding low, and a 1NT response would show a heart stopper and a better hand than I hold. However, if I bid 1♠ partner will play me for four spades (partner knows I could have only three spades, but he has to assume I have four spades). 1♠ is the bid that is most likely to encourage partner to investigate game or raise spades, whether or not the opponents compete. A 1♠ bid also might cause partner to raise or compete to 2♠ with only three spades and a good hand such as ♠AKx ♥xx ♦AQxx ♣KJxx. With 1♠ having significant drawbacks, a 2♣ bid will often be better than 1♠. Partner will be less likely to compete or investigate game when I bid clubs rather than spades. Partner will convert 2♣ to 2♦ with four spades and five or more diamonds (playing that equal-level conversion of clubs to diamonds does not show extra values) and if partner cue bids 2♥ my 2♠ bid will show three spades and some values. [Many expert pairs do not play equal-level conversion at low levels. They play that doubling and bidding 2♦ shows a hand bigger than a 2 • overcall.] Although partner is a little more likely to have four spades than four clubs when he doubles, we are more likely to get higher when I respond 1♠ than when I respond 2♣. Should we end up defending against a heart contract, my 2♣ bid is likely to get partner off to our best lead.

This problem was given to me by my friend Peter Knee. Peter likes $4 \bullet$, as does his partner, Andy Vinock. I like starting with $3 \blacktriangledown$ fitted instead of $2 \blacktriangledown$, if that is available.

Goldsmith: Double. Wouldn't 3♥ have been fitted last time? [Yes, 3♥ would have been fitted and probably the best bid!]

Jones: 3, not close. Only a problem because of MPs, but this is too good a description of my hand.

Kantar: 3♦. Of course it figures you would tempt me with that heart suit.

Lolli: 3. It looks like I have some useful cards for partner, so I'm going to compete. If he has short diamonds, he can bid hearts.

Wittes: 3♦. With most of my partners I play anything other than 3♥ is forcing to game. Although I am lack-

ing in high cards, my distribution and the quality of my heart suit more than make up for it. I would expect partner to bid 3 with a doubleton heart over 3.

Dunitz: 3♦ if it's non-forcing (I play it forcing), otherwise I'm stuck bidding 3♥. At least I have the ♥T.

Baqui: 3♥. Given the MP scoring, I'm going for +140 vs +130 or risking a minus score. I'll bid 3♦ playing IMPs. There is a potential bonus of getting to a reasonable game if partner has ♥Jx and quick trick-rich values.

Davis: 3♥. 3♥ shows my sixth heart and is invitational to game. It is close to a 4♥ bid because of the excellent distribution. I would bid 4♥ if I had the ♥J instead of a small heart. If my LHO bids 3♠ and partner passes, I have a comfortable 4♦ bid.

Bare: 4♦. 3♦ could be just competing.

the ACBL. I'm a big believer in the cooperative advertising program, but I also believe it needs to be oriented to achieve maximum results for the ACBL without wasting money on ads that don't work. I opposed the cut from 75% to 50% in ACBL reimbursements, but I support efforts to ensure money goes to those organizations that are successful in their marketing/recruitment.

Implement a strength-based rating system

I have been a long-time advocate of more sophisticated rating systems. In 2009, I presented a plan to many of the ACBL board of directors about how that

should be achieved, and my opinions haven't changed.

I believe very strongly that the traditional masterpoint system should remain intact and no new rating system should materially interfere with the masterpoint system. At the same time, a more sophisticated rating system has a proper place in the ACBL as a mechanism for balancing and seeding the field better, and as a value-added option for tournament players to understand the progress they've made as a player. Furthermore, a rating system might contribute to a better find-a-partner system, although I'm skeptical about such promised silver bullets based on the poor results partner-finding system have shown historically.

I confess that I erred and this wasn't the problem that I intended. However, except for the possibility of a fitted jump on the previous round, I got lucky and it turns out to be a decent problem.

Baqui: Pass. I have seen too many hands where partner overcalls with ♠AJ9xx ♥xx ♠Tx ♠QJxx and 2♠ is the last makeable contract. Though tempting, a raise to 3♠ risks a minus score, and anything else like 3♥ would create a forcing sequence.

Davis: Pass. Since I like to play that a new suit is constructive but non-forcing over an overcall, my 2♣ cue bid could be based on a hand with 3-card spade support that is too strong for a single raise. It could also be a hand without spade support that is too strong to make a non-forcing bid in a new suit. Partner's 2♠ bid over 2♠ shows a minimum 1♠ overcall, which can range up to almost an opening bid. However, he might have chosen to bid 2♠ to show a little sign of life with something like ♠AJxxx ▼x ♠KQx ♠xxxx so I may be facing his weakest hand of something like ♠AKxxx ▼x ♠xxx ♣JTxx. At IMPs I would invite with 3♠ since I want to be in a 40% or better vulnerable game. However at matchpoints, the game bonus is not a factor, and it is not worthwhile to push to get to game.

Goldsmith: Pass. Wouldn't 3♥ have been fitted last time? [Yes, and again would have been a good call.]

Jones: Pass. Plus scores are good at MPs.

One panelist takes an in-between route. His invitation sneakily transfers the blame to partner if the wrong contract is reached. Well bid Eddie!

Kantar: 3♠. Let it be on partner's head if we go down in 4♠.

Dunitz: 3♥. My hand is too good to pass. 3♥ is forcing and I will try that. If partner rebids 3♠ I will pass. Ugh!

Lolli: 3♥. I've already shown spade support and a limit raise for partner. I am now introducing a forcing **3♥** call to complete my hand.

Wittes: 3. This should be natural and forcing.

Bare: 3♥.

This turned out to be a stylistic problem. The aggressive overcallers are concerned that $2 \triangleq$ might be the limit on the hand. The more solid overcallers are forcing to game. Goldsmith's suggestion of $3 \checkmark$, a fitted jump on the previous round might be best. Fitted jumps more classically show five cards in the bid suit and four in partner's suit, but fitted jumps are frequently a little off from perfect distribution.

Kantar: Double. Take the money and run. [Doubling might get partner to bid. The only way to get partner to pass may be to pass yourself. But even that fails when 4♥ makes.]

Bare: Double. I can bid diamonds over 4♠ and I don't know if I can make 5♠.

Dunitz: 5♦. No clear action, but I'm bidding 5♦.

Baqui: 5. This is a tough one as your HCP strength suggests that partner doesn't have much, but you could easily produce four defensive tricks on your own. A conceivable lie of the cards could have EW having a huge major suit fit while our side has the minors. Partner needs DKxx and club length and it could easily produce a double game swing. In any case, it's likely to be cheap insurance to try 5.

Goldsmith: 5. Partner rates to have spades and will take out a double frequently. Just taking +100 or +200 is not enough; versus as little as ♠xxxxxx ♥Hxx ♦Kxx ♠xx we have a game [4♠ and 5 ♦ both appear to fail on that layout]. Yeah, we're getting them 500, but we can't get there from here.

Lolli: 5♦. While I'd like to have at least the ♦T, we could easily have a slam, so I show a big hand. [Would we never bid 5♦ to save against 4♥ at white versus red?] Tough hand, but that's my story and I'm sticking to it.

Jones: 5•, also not close. Passing deserves to lose 14 IMPs when both games make.

Two panelists caught what I missed at the table. Doubling and then bidding 5♦ is stronger than bidding 5♦

directly. Partner might occasionally bid 6♦ if you do it right.

Wittes: Double. I will correct 4♠ to 5♠, which should show a bigger hand than if I had bid 5♠ immediately.

Davis: Double. East's vulnerable jump to 4♥ may be based on high card strength. Given my four quick tricks and 18 HCP and the fact that East did not choose to investigate game, I think it is more likely that he is bidding on distribution with a good trump fit. He does not want to leave us any bidding room. It would not be a surprise to catch partner with a stiff heart and enough to make 5. In any case, there is not much reward for passing and hoping to get +100. Over my double (which is takeout with reasonable defense), I expect partner to bid 4♠ or 5♣, over which I will bid 5♦. If partner bids 4NT for the minors I will bid 6♦; if partner passes my double, then 4♥ doubled is probably our best contract. This sequence (as opposed to bidding 5♦ directly over 4♥) will let partner know I am not taking a save against 4♥ but that I am bidding to make. This would allow partner to bid 6. if he thinks he has enough. Of course, if I am wrong, I may be -500 when they were going down if I passed **4♥**.

This hand occurred in the Thursday night Caltech home game. My partner, Gene Smith, held ♠QT98xx ♥x ♠Ax ♣9xxx. I bid 5♠ which made on a slightly inaccurate defense. The double dummy action is to double and let partner play 4♠, which is unbeatable. I considered passing at the table to take my best shot at a plus score in case I had four defensive tricks and we had no game. But I went with 5♠ because it had multiple ways to be right.

A conservative 1NT (about 19 - 21 HCPs), a middle of the road 2NT, an aggressive vulnerable game 3NT are all possible NT bids. But I like 2♣ the best.

Dunitz: 2NT. I don't think there is a close second choice.

Davis: 2NT. A 1NT rebid would show a hand too strong to overcall 1NT so my jump to 2NT shows too much for 1NT, not enough for 3NT and lack of interest in playing in a suit contract (I could bid 2♣ if I wanted to investigate contracts other than notrump). Partner will raise with two queens or the equivalent in value.

Baqui: 2NT. I can appreciate the temptation to bid more but I'll take the low road, and bid 2NT as I would need at least one dummy entry and then some to score 9 tricks.

Jones: 2NT. It's just too easy to have nine tricks with partner holding some random four count to only bid 1NT.

Goldsmith: 24, planning to rebid 2NT. I think this hand is a tad too strong for 2NT now. I like to play that over 24 here, 24 shows about zero to a bad four. Then, if partner bids anything else, 2NT will be forcing. [The treatment of making the cheapest bid after doubling and then cuebidding is known is Herbert. I like this treatment. Anything except the negative response forces the partnership to game.]

Kantar: 3NT. I've only changed my answer four times between 2NT and 3NT, and finally let the fact that we are vulnerable at IMPs make my final decision.

Wittes: 3NT. I am somewhere between a 2NT and 3NT bid, but my texture is just too good to bid only 2NT.

Lolli: 3NT. In MPs, I might consider 2NT, in case partner is really broke. However, this is IMPs and I don't want to miss a vulnerable game. Is partner supposed to bid 3NT with the ♠JT9x and the ♥Q?

Bare: 3NT.
