## Fourth Suit Forcing

# \& <br> <br> Bidding to the Level of Fit 

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| Purpose: | To find out whether partner has stops in the fourth suit not yet bid, so a contract <br> can be played in No Trumps |
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| When it is used: | The Opener and Responder have bid three different suits and opposition have not bid. <br> Fourth suit forcing is used by the Responder in her second bid. |
| Why it is used: | Unlikely either partner has a balanced hand, but combination of hands may be suitable <br> for No Trumps if, and only if, the fourth suit not yet bid is covered with preferably two <br> stop cards. |
| What Responder <br> bids: | If Responder has stops in the fourth suit, she bids the appropriate level of No Trumps. <br> If Responder does not have stops in the fourth suit, she bids that suit (and Opening <br> Partner alerts). |
| Rebid by Opener: | If Opener has stops in the fourth suit, she bids the appropriate level of No Trumps. <br> Otherwise she must rebid one of the other three suits. |

## Bidding to the level of fit after partner has overcalled

| Applicable when: | You have less than 10 points <br> You have 3 or more cards in the overcall suit |
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| How it works: | Assume partner has: 5 cards in suit to overcall at the 1 level 6 cards in suit to overcall at the 2 level |
|  | Add the number of cards you have in that suit to the assumed number that partner has. <br> The answer is the number of tricks you should bid to make. |
|  | Example: $\quad$ Partner has overcalled $1 \leqslant$ and you have $4 \leqslant s$ You can bid $3 \diamond \quad(4+5=9)$ |
| Warning: | Do not raise your partner to: <br> higher than the 3 level in a minor suit or higher than game (i.e. the 4 level) in a major suit |
