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Signalling to Partner

- Two main occasions when you can signal to your Partner
 - 1. When you are playing a card in the suit led
 - 2. When you are discarding, i.e. you do not have a card in the suit led
- In either case, you would not play a card that is a potential winner
- We will look at both the above types of signalling
- Some partners also signal a "Count" not being covered today

Signalling to Partner with a card in the suit led

- This is often referred to by the term "Attitude".
- Used when responding to Partner's lead.
 - ♥ A high card is "encouraging" Please lead a card in this suit to me
 - ♥ A low card is "discouraging" I do not want you to lead this
- Robson: "High for Aye, Low for No"
- ▲ Do not use honour cards (potential winners) and treat high as >6; low as <6.</p>
- ▲ Some partnerships use "Reverse attitude" Low encouraging; high discouraging.

Signalling to Partner with a discard

- There are many variations, but I will mention four methods: "Attitude"; "Dodds"; "Revolving"; and "McKenney".
- I use McKenney with most partners and prefer it
 -but it is a little complicated to use at first.
- A fuller explanation of McKenney follows but first I will talk briefly about the three other types.

Signalling to Partner with a discard (cont.)



You discard a high card in the suit you would like led to you

 You discard a low card in a suit you would not like to be led to you

Signalling to Partner with a discard (cont.)


Dodds:

 You discard an even card in a suit if you would like a card led to you from that suit

 You discard an odd card in a suit if you would like a card led to you from the other suit of the same colour

Signalling to Partner with a discard (cont.)

- Revolving:
 - You discard a high card in a suit if you would like a card led to you from the next higher suit
 - You discard a low card in a suit if you would like a card led to you from the next lower suit of the same colour



McKenney signalling

- ▲ Used when you cannot play the suit led
- You wish partner to lead a particular suit to you when she has the lead
- Use a card in another suit, rather than wasting one of the suit you want
- A high card asks your partner to lead from the higher of the remaining two suits
- A low card asks your partner to lead from a lower of the remaining two suits

McKenney signalling - examples
