Chairman's Lunch 15 November

We had another successful Chairman's Lunch on 15 November with around 25 clubs being represented plus committee members. The lunchtime discussion was about cooperation as a way of arresting declining membership.

Some clubs have an active teaching programme for complete beginners, some have improver sections for players in the intermediate stage after lessons but before they are sufficiently confident for normal club play. Few clubs are large enough to do both of these and many clubs do neither.

There are some examples of clubs jointly organising charity and Blue Point events and there are examples of clubs sharing dealing machines and Bridgemates but there was a general feeling that more could be done in this area.

The trend in membership numbers is such that the long term existence of some clubs is unlikely. Some clubs have temporarily addressed the decline in numbers by advertising but clubs that do not have a reliable feed of new members, either through repeated advertising, providing lessons to beginners or though establishing cooperation with local bridge teachers or local clubs face a future of declining numbers and ultimate closure. It is important that clubs that wish to survive in the long term have a reliable supply of new members.

An initiative has been started in the Farnham area that has identified several formal and informal groups of bridge players. It is hoped that through mutual cooperation between these groups bridge playing in the area can be put on a sustainable footing.

The most appropriate way to address declining membership will differ from club to club and although the Surrey Committee has limited resources we are willing to offer guidance and help where we can.

Open invitation

The Surrey Committee has an open invitation for individuals to attend our committee meetings. The take up so far has been good and both the Committee and the individuals involved have found the experience useful. 

Bridge Hand (1)


Unblocks and Crocodiles (by Jeffrey Allerton)

Sometimes to avoid an endplay a defender needs to unblock an honour, so that partner can win a subsequent trick. On this hand I declared in a recent Crockford's Cup match both defenders had to be on their toes.




In this auction there is a case for playing double as showing the values for doubling a 1NT opening, but it is perhaps more common for double to show spades. North had both options covered and then raised South's sporting 3 bid to game. This contract would have stood no chance on a club (or heart) lead, but West elected to start with a trump, won by East who played back another trump.

Declarer could now count nine tricks. His chance of a tenth appeared to be based on the position of the A, but the bidding and play to date implied that East was heavy favourite to hold that card. Still, there was little declarer could do other than draw the remaining trumps and cash the diamond suit. East followed to the trumps, perforce, whilst West discarded two clubs easily enough. On the third round of diamonds, both declarers discarded rounded suit sixes, leaving:



Now East was starting to feel a little uncomfortable and could see visions of an endplay. So on the 4th diamond he relieved himself of ♥K whilst West let go of ♣8. Now for the last diamond: West hung on to his hearts, discarding yet another small club, dummy shed ♥2 whilst East discarded ♥10, leaving this 4-card end position:.



On a low heart lead from South, West and North both played low, and East was forced to win with \$\tilde{\textsf{J}}\$, then lead round to \$\frac{1}{2}\$K, which was declarer's tenth trick. West immediately apologised for missing a 'crocodile coup': inserting \$\tilde{\textsf{Q}}\$ at trick would have prevented his partner from being endplayed. However, this inspired play would not have beaten the contract: declarer would have won \$\tilde{\textsf{Q}}\$ and exited with \$\tilde{\textsf{8}}\$ round to West's \$\frac{1}{2}\$. West's \$\frac{1}{2}\$ lead at trick 12 would have been ducked in dummy, East couldn't afford to overtake, so at trick 13 West's \$\tilde{\textsf{5}}\$ would be led round to declarer's \$\tilde{\textsf{7}}\$, an unexpected source of declarer's tenth trick!

Can you see where the defence went wrong? Both could have come down to two cards in each suit, but West could have saved the day alone by discarding the Q (another unblock) at trick 9 before performing his suggested crocodile coup at trick 10. Now he has a low club to lead at trick 12 and East wins the last two tricks with AJ.

Two unblocks and a crocodile coup by the defenders on the same hand!

North bids 3♣ (Stayman) to investigate whether there is a spade fit. When South denies a four card major, N/S reach 3NT.


After the heart lead, our ♠AK, ♥AK and ♦AKQJ give us eight top tricks, but it won't be easy to find the ninth. We could set up three extra tricks in clubs by knocking out ♣AK, but the opponents would then be able to cash at least three heart tricks. We can only afford to lose the lead once.

See if you can find a plan for a 9th trick before reading on.

Since we don't have time to establish our clubs, we must look for our ninth trick in spades. We could try cashing \triangle A and running \triangle T, but West would cover from holdings such as \triangle QJ86 or \triangle J74 and we would only collect a third trick in the suit if either opponent held \triangle QJx (or \triangle QJ alone).

We have much better prospects in spades if we lead towards our \triangle AT. At trick 2, therefore we enter dummy in diamonds and lead \triangle 2. We're intending to finesse \triangle T, but in practice East plays \triangle J. We win with \triangle A and run \triangle T to East's \triangle Q. East knocks out our remaining heart stopper, but we can re-enter dummy in diamonds to cash \triangle K9. We cash our remaining diamond winners and concede the rest. If East had played low at trick 3 our \triangle T would have been our ninth trick. If West had been able to win with \triangle J or \triangle Q, we would still have a third trick in spades if East started with \triangle Qxx, \triangle Jxx, \triangle Qx or \triangle Jx

Youth News
