Knock-outs and Leagues

Lady Rose Cup

This is a KO Teams-of-4 running from October to May. Playing 32 Boards (28 by agreement) in each match except the final which is 48 boards (32 in the plate)

1st round losing teams enter Plate free.

Players must be primary members of Surrey to qualify to represent the County in the Pachabo Cup. The Cup is **Green pointed**.

The 2013-14 season is now open for entries and entry forms can be found on the Competition Entry page of the SCBA website or you can enter electronically on the Competition Entry page. Entries by 12th September

Surrey and Novice Leagues

Last year was the second year of running these leagues in the new format and it is proving to be a success with many new teams entering and with a fair degree of movement of teams from the Novice League to the Surrey League and between the different divisions of the Surrey League.

The 2013-14 season is now open for entries and entry forms can be found on the Competition Entry page of the SCBA website or from Trevor Hobson on 07545 966 008 or by email at trevor_hobson@hotmail.com.

The Surrey League is divided into four divisions to provide competitive bridge for all players irrespective of experience and ability. Division 1 is played on a county-wide basis, while Divisions 2 to 4 are subdivided into sections geographically to keep travel to a minimum.

Division 1 Is the premier teams league competition in Surrey
Division 2 Is suitable for most of the top club players in Surrey

Division 3 Is for the majority of club players in Surrey

Division 4 This is the entry level to Surrey teams competitions and is broadly equivalent to the 'improver' sections run by many clubs. EBU membership is not required.

The Novice League is used by teachers as a means of giving their pupils experience in team competitions, from where they can progress to the Surrey League. The Novice League is subdivided into sections geographically to avoid excessive travel.

The closing date for entries is:

Surrey League: 1 October 2013 Novice League: 20 October 2013

The Victor Ludorum

How will you do this season in the Victor Ludorum? Do you even know what it is? The Victor Ludorum is awarded to the Surrey player who gets the most number of VL points during the season. VL points are awarded in SCBA competitions that are open to all Surrey players. So you can get VL points for the County Pairs - which anyone can enter, but not for the Senior Pairs which is restricted by age. So, what events count and how do you get VL points in them?

There are some one day events:

AGM Swiss Pairs

Club pairs Challenge Final

County Pairs Cup & Plate

Ladies Pairs

Mens Pairs

Mixed Pairs

Multiple Teams of 4

Midweek Pairs

Spring Swiss Pairs

Summer Swiss Teams

In each of these you get 2 VL points for coming in the top 25% of the field, and 1 VL point for coming 50% or more and below 25%.

And then there are the Leagues and Knock-outs:

Lady Rose Cup Lady Rose Plate Surrey League Divisions 1 to 4

In these you get 1 VL point per win, up to a maximum of 3 VL points per event.

Play of the hand: making the most of card combinations

A seminar on how to make the most out of numerous card combinations By Ian Pagan

lan is one of the country's top professional players. He was in the British under 25 team, competed in the Camrose and has won the Spring Fours, the National Men's Pairs a record 4 times, the Hubert Phillips, Crockfords, Tollemache and Pachabo. He has played in the winning team in the Camrose Trophy.

We consider many of these through playing then discussing together 20 deals from various national and international competitions.

Ian has held several superb seminars for good club players during 2012/2013. By popular request since the seminars were so well received, we are holding another two seminars, the first on 8 December at 1.00pm at The Bourne Club, and the second, High Level Competitive Bidding, on 2 March 2014 at Wimbledon Bridge Club. Opening lead Jack of Spades

Key Combination: A8xxx 10xx

Correct play of the Diamond suit brings home the contact. Start by leading the 10. The only 4-1 break you can legitimately handle is the singleton 9. In addition, if West mistakenly covers with QJ9x (or KQ9x or KJ9x)

he will regret it when his partner's singleton honour drops, enabling you to make 3 Diamond tricks. There is some history to this combination. In the 1990s, one of England's top players failed to lead the 10 with this combination in the final match of the National Swiss Teams. There was a singleton 9 and had he led the 10 his team would have won the event.

Mini-Bridge Day at Carshalton High School for Girls

On 26 June more than 200 year 7 students participated in a Minibridge Immersion Day. The event was run by the Maths Department as part of CHSG's Learning Skills Day. Minibridge is a simplified version of the game of bridge and is the route into bridge recommended by the English Bridge Union (EBU), the national governing body for bridge in England. Minibridge was first developed in France and the Netherlands as an introduction to bridge for schoolchildren and was soon acknowledged as an excellent game in its own right.



The EBU and Surrey County Bridge Association organised 9 additional certified instructors to help lead the immersion day. Four members of the GB U20 Bridge Team, Christopher Huber, Toby Nonnenmacher, Michael Alishaw and Shahzaad Natt, were also invited to the immersion day. Seven year 8 students, Rowen Brechin, Lydia Edewor, Zoe Smith, Abigail Manning, Olivia MacKenzie, Olivia Rumsey and Halah Afghan had been learning to play Minibridge after school during the spring time with one of CHSG's maths teachers. As a result of these students' promising ability and dedication to the bridge club, they were invited

to help the EBU instructors teach the year 7 students to play Minibridge on the immersion day.

There were two 2- hour sessions where the students learned to recognise the suits and their ranks, to deal and sort cards by rank, to understand what a trump and trick are and to play as declarer or dummy. By the end of period 4, all of the girls were playing with partners and trying to win more tricks than the opposing team! During period 5, four students from each group were chosen to play with the more experienced year 8 girls. They played some specially prepared hands to enhance their skills and to allow them to test each other against the other pairs. All of the students were introduced to the no fear bridge site, www.nofearbridge.co.uk, where they could learn more and practise by playing online.



All of the year 7 students were invited to join the after school Bridge Club which is in run by Mrs Huber in



B02 every Wednesday after school. In September an instructor from the EBU will be coming to the club each week to teach the girls to play bridge. It is hoped that CHSG can cultivate a bridge team to compete against other schools in Minibridge and regular bridge competitions over the coming years. The GB U20 Team members spoke to the girls about the benefits of playing competitive bridge. Three of the young men had travelled to China last summer for 10 days to represent Great Britain in the Youth World Bridge Championships where they made it to the quarterfinals! These young men have all travelled all

across Europe to play for Great Britain, including in 2013 to Finland, Ireland, Poland and the Netherlands.

The year 8 girls where excited by the opportunities that playing bridge might afford them.

The Minibridge Immersion Day was so successful that the Maths Department is considering making it an annual event. SCBA also organised Minibridge days in two other schools, Weydon and Bohunt, so if there are other schools who would like to have a day of Minibridge please contact douglaswright@3countiesbridge.com or on 07801 989 630, as he organises numerous teaching activities within Surrey, Hampshire and Sussex.




Defensive Problem in Surrey League

As the summer comes to an end and thoughts turn to the new bridge season. One of the best events in the calendar is the Surrey League. The beauty of the League is that the matches can be played on any date, at any time of day and at any location in Surrey. The League is efficiently organised by Trevor Hobson, and there are several divisions to suit all standards.


Here is an interesting lead and defensive problem from last season, faced by Peter Lee as West. His opponents were playing Acol with a mini NT.

Dealer S Love All, IMPs



What should West lead? Nothing looks particularly attractive. A trump is out as that is highly likely to give away a trick. A diamond is the most passive possibility, but that could help declarer to pick up a diamond honour in partner's hand, not to mention giving away a lot of information to declarer about your own hand. Of the black suits, a spade is a better shot than a club as it has the latter probably needs partner to hold one precise card (*K) whereas the former works well if partner has one of two cards (*A or *Q). So it comes down to a choice between the pointed suits.

Peter Lee chose to lead \$7 (playing standard leads and signals) and saw this dummy.



On this occasion the spade lead works well as partner holds the ♠Q and declarer wins the first trick with ♠A. At trick two he plays ◆5 to the 9, A and 8. and then leads ▼3 from dummy to the 7, Q and K. What should West lead now?


There seem to be three plausible defences:

- If partner holds ◆Q or if declarer holds a 4-card diamond suit then it is right to defend passively, cash a spade winner, exit in diamonds and wait for your minor suit tricks.
- If partner holds ♣K and declarer has a useful discard available on dummy's a diamond winners (e.g. if declarer holds ♠A10x ♥AQxxx ◆Qxx ♣Qx) then it is necessary to cash out the defence's black suit winners at this point.
- If declarer holds ♣K and has a useful discard available on dummy's diamond winners (e.g. if declarer holds ♠Axx ♥AQxxx •Qxx ♣Kx then it is necessary to lead a small spade, hoping that partner can win and play a club through declarer's king.

Can any useful inferences be drawn from partner's signalling? A good method is to play suit preference in trumps, but here partner might have started with a singleton heart, (although the opponents don't play 5-card majors, Opener might have been dealt one!). What about partner's diamond card? Should that be suit preference? If this is standard count ,then partner has an even number so at least that rules out declarer holding 4 diamonds.

Which defence should West play for, or is it just a guess?

At the table, West had little hesitation in playing for the third option: he led \$\&\\$8 to East's \$\&\\$10, and on winning the trick, East played a club through for one down. This was the full deal:



So how did West know to play a low spade? I have to confess that I missed out an important detail. At trick 1, East contributed the **nine** of spades. It's normal to play 'third hand high' of course, but here East was able to deduce West's spade holding from the 4th highest lead and East could see that it might help partner to clarify the spade position. Declarer would not win the ace from AQ in this position, so when East's nine forced out the ace, West deduced that East must have started with AQ109(x)(x).

Bridge is a partnership game. Next time your partner 'misdefends' a contract, before you criticise, please stop to think: 'how could I have defended better to help?'.

Teams-of-four is far more relaxing than matchpoint pairs: you don't need to spend too much time worrying about overtricks and if you finish a hand quickly you can go straight on to the next one without having to wait for other tables to finish. If you finish the entire set of boards quicker than the other table, you can get started earlier on the food and drink! Why not give the Surrey League a try this year?

Changes to the EBU alerting & announcing rules 1st August 2013

With thanks to Jill Cook on whose document this information is based.

Opening 2NT bids now have to be announced with their range values (as with 1NT).

3♣ Stayman and 3◆/3♥ Red Suit Transfers after a 2NT opening now have to be announced, not alerted (as with 1NT).

However, 5-card Stayman, Puppet Stayman, Baron and any other artificial 3♣ which is not standard 4 card Stayman do still have to be alerted....after both 1NT and 2NT.

1♣/1♦ openings which may show fewer than 3 cards and are non-forcing (as for example in some 5 card major systems or systems where it might show a weakish balanced hand) now have to be announced as "may be two" or "may be one" or "may be zero". However where the minor opener is forcing it should still be alerted.

Artificial bids above 3NT in the 1st round of the auction now have to be alerted. The first round of the auction is defined as the first bid and the three subsequent calls. An artificial bid is a bid which does not promise at least 3 cards in the suit bid or which promises some other suit.

Examples are:

- (1) Leaping Michaels over opponent's Weak 2 opener [eg. $(2 \forall)$ $4 \triangleq$ overcall, which shows spades and clubs. $4 \triangleq$ has to be alerted now]
- (2) Texas Transfers [eg. where 1NT (P) 4♥ is a transfer to spades. Alert the 4♥ bid]
- (3) Cue bids and splinters [eg 1 (P) 4 where 4 + shows a control/shortage] should now be alerted.

Don't forget that all doubles over a natural suit bid below 3NT are assumed to be for take-out unless alerted. So if you want to double someone's suit bid for penalties or for, say, showing 3 card support then that double has to be alerted.

Also, a double of any NT bid in any position is always assumed to be for penalties unless alerted. [e.g. (1 - 1) - P - (1 - 1) - X, has to be alerted if you intend this to be a take-out of 1 - 1.

Doubles of artificial suit bids below the level of 3NT are alerted if they do not show the suit which has been bid. However, doubles of short 1 - 4 are alerted if not for takeout.
