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PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Someone once asked a well known player if it is fun to play bridge. He said, "No, it is fun to win at bridge." I know some players, especially social players, would not agree with him. Even some duplicate players like to come out for the camaraderie they find and the chance to think about something else for a few hours. Such players often don't bother to pick up hand records, take only a cursory look at their score and probably throw away their score sheet before leaving the room, or soon thereafter. There is nothing wrong with this attitude and if this gives you enjoyment from our great game, then you won't get any criticism from me.

On the other hand, if you think you could enjoy the game even more, then think about how to improve your game. I notice each Thursday after the unit game that small groups of people often grab hand records and go over their results together, either there in the playing room or at a venue outside such as a diner. You can also get hand records and recap sheets on line, usually within 12 hours of the finish of the game. This allows you to see why you got such a low score on a board by comparing it to other scores on the same board. Go over your score card and see where you got low scores. Were you always overbidding or underbidding? Were you continually scoring one less trick than the field on either offense or defense? Of course sometimes you just get fixed. The opponents bid a thin slam missed at most tables and it comes home. All you can do about such boards is grin and bear it. Besides, don't forget you also probably got some gifts.

Once you have identified areas you would like to improve in, there are many sources you can turn to. There are many, many wonderful books on all aspects of the game. If you don't have a bridge library, start one. In addition you can learn a lot from bridge magazines. especially the ACBL Bulletin and The Bridge World. There is software to help you with all aspects of your game, especially declarer play. Get involved in bidding contests like the one run by Steve Robinson in the WBL Bulletin, or those in the ACBL Bulletin and The Bridge World. Bid hands from Challenge the Champs or The Bidding Box. There are teachers available to help you become a better player. Some of them offer group lessons and others offer individual help, including partnering you and then showing you what you did right and where you can improve. Contact the ABTA to see what is available in this area.

Finally you can circulate bidding or play problems to a number of players and get their opinions. One player who does this is **James Geist,** and his work has paid off, as he and **Arnie Frankel** won our two sessions pairs championship at our May sectional-congratulations to them.

I suggest you shop around and find the best medium and individuals to help you improve.

In my view, bridge is the best game out there and is always exciting and stimulating, but it is even more fun if you do well.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR THE MACHLIN TROPHY

Last year, with our 75th Anniversary, the WBL initiated a new annual award, the Machlin Trophy for Sportsman**ship.** The trophy is named in honor of **Jerry Machlin,** whom many of you will remember as one of the greatest directors the game has ever known. Jerry served as Chief Director for games in the Washington area during the 1950's, 1960's and 1970's and probably contributed more to the growth of tournament bridge in our area during the three decades following World War II than any other single individual. Jerry also founded the Mid-Atlantic Bridge Conference (the organization that hosts all of the regionals in our area), and he organized and staged matches in which Members of Congress competed against corporate leaders and members of the British Parliament. These matches helped to promote the game among the country's political and corporate leadership and demonstrated the wide appeal of tournament bridge.

You can also see and answer the problems at the WBL web site. WBL Solvers Club uses Washington Standard as published July 1996.

I personally score all the problems. If a majority of the solvers vote for an answer, and the answer is reasonable I will give that answer 100 points. I will not give 100 points to an answer that I consider bad no matter how many experts vote for it. There are times when I want to make a point. I will give that answer 100 points and will therefore give the majority answer 90 points. For the other answers I con-

sider how good the answer is and how many experts vote for it for its score. If you submitted an answer that got 20 points, that bid would get a bad score at the table. A good exercise would be to figure out why I gave your answer 20 points. You might have misread the problem.

I held this hand and I had the following choices. I could have opened 2♠ (choice A), which shows 10-13 HCP and six or more spades. Does the 6-5 distribution make up for the lack of the one HCP? Since I was playing Multi, I could have opened 2♠ (choice B), which shows a weak-two bid in either major. If the suit is spades, it denies ten HCP. I could have passed (choice F), opened 1♠ (choice E) or opened 3♠ (choice C). Lets see what my experts choose.

Five experts open 1 (choice E). Opening this hand follows the rule of 20 where you add the number of HCP (9) to the length of your two longest suits (11). If the sum is at least twenty, you should open. While the total is twenty, the singleton jack is not worth anything and the suits are bad. Put the jack of spades and the ace of clubs in your long suits and it is a clearcut 1 opening. On the other hand, you have one defensive trick with very little chance for a

second. The spades are so bad that if partner is on lead he could easily blow a trick.

Welles: "1♠ —Choice is clearly between 2♠ (10-13 with six spades) and 1♠. With this distribution and a five-loser count despite only nine HCP, I go for E, which will possibly allow me to show my distribution."

I disagree. If you open 1♠, there is a good chance that you won't be able to show your distribution. You open 1♠ and partner bids 2♥. Your primary duty is to show partner that you have six spades. Even though some play that a 2♠ rebid could show only five, by not rebidding 2♠, partner will assume that you don't have six. Now later diamond bids could just show diamond values. Even if partner bids 1NT or 2♣, you still have to show your six spades.

Cappelletti: "1♠ —A lot better than many twelve-point hands. And if you keep the bidding low, you are more likely to be able to show your diamond suit."

Bloom: "1 — Open 1 . Using the Rule of twenty I calculate eleven for length plus nine HCP. Even if I subtract one for the singleton Jack, I will add it back for the 6-5 distribution. A weak-two is not appropriate given the distribution. Although I'm not in love with the quality of either suit, the distribution is too powerful to ignore."

King "1♠ —While a little short in high card points, this hand more than qualifies for a 1♠ opener using either loser count or the rule of 20."

Landen: "1♠ —Five-loser hand equals an opening bid, so I'm told."

Five experts agree with me and pass (choice F). Maybe we can describe this hand later. If we're lucky the auction will go 1♣ - pass -1♥ and then we can show both of our suits. If we overcall spades later, partner will know that our hand does not fit an initial bid. By passing, you don't have to figure out whether this is an opening bid, a 10-13 2♠ bid or a weak 2♠ bid.

Smith: "Pass—My hand doesn't fit any of the categories, so I pass. What's the rush to bid, I'll get another chance."

Parker: "Pass—It makes no sense to preempt with two-suits and points outside your long suits. The spade suit is not good enough to open a weak or moderate two-bid. This type of hand is easy to get back into the auction with either a Michaels cue bid or an unusual notrump. Second choice is E, but it is easier to show this type of hand by coming in later."

Efant: "Pass—I usually open 2♠ to show 5-11 pts and six spades, but I also prefer to have two honors in spades, especially if vulnerable. I would pass here and see who bids what."

Hopkins: "Pass—I worry about the lack of honors in my suits. And, if I open some high number of Spades, disaster could strike if my partner is strong in the other two suits and the opponents have no game or we go for so much it doesn't matter whether they have a game or not. If I had to open, answer A is the closest to what I have and could work some of the time, but I prefer to be cautious with the weak suits."

Schwartz: "Pass—Probably won't get too many Robinson points but I can't see opening this up with a two-bid. I don't like 6-5 two-bids in general but with a good primary suit I can live with it, but not with this suit. With my few HCP tied up in my short suits, I don't like opening one either."

Two experts open 2. If partner has an opening bid with at least two-card support, he can jump to 4. ending the auction, giving the opponents no clue on how best to defend.

Roman: "2♠ —10-13 with six spades. If white on red I would open 4♠"

Adams: "2♠ —10-13 with six spades. If you are not going to let me bid a Multi 2♠, I might as well show the playing strength of my hand."

You could have opened a Multi $2 \spadesuit$. That was choice B.

One expert opens 3. If you're going to show a seven-card suit, at least have a good six-carder. KQJxxx * x. xxxx c is a 3. opener. If partner has a problem, I don't see how he's going to get it right.

Wookey: "34—The fifth diamond makes the spade suit the equivalent of a seven-card suit at least. This hand has huge playing strength, and a lower opening call doesn't do justice to the hand or take away the enemy bidding space."

I believe that you should preempt whenever possible but there are some hands that are better described by passing.

in clubs, at least four-card spade support with opening bid values. What is partner's prototype 4♣ -bid? ♠ Qxxx♥ Axxx♦ AKxx♣ x is a very good splinter, ♠ Qxxx♥ Axxx♦ Axxx♣ x is an average splinter while ♠ Oxxx♥ Axxx♦ Kxxx♣ x is a subminimum splinter. Splinters tell partner that he will have one loser opposite his xxxx. It also tells partner that his KOxx are wasted values. It's hard to come up with a splinter where 5 is not cold and 6 does not have play, unless you're off two aces. 6 is cold opposite my first example, on a diamond finesse opposite my second example and is off two aces opposite my third splinter. You can make at least 5 opposite all of my examples. Game-forcing bids create a force. Force means that the opponents cannot play in any contract undoubled. So, one of the options is to pass, forcing, and pull partner's minimum-showing double. Pass and pull shows extra values. If partner bids, showing extra values, you can think about seven.

Four experts bid a slam following the principle — bid what you think you can make. The problem is that partner can't bid seven holding • Qxxxv Axxxx Axxx -. When partner jumps to slam and there are possible scientific ways he could have gone, he could be gambling. Of course if partner has • Qxxx Axxx Kxxx x, you're off two aces.

Welles: "6♠ —At IMPS might settle for 5♠, but at matchpoints, will gamble that partner has two Aces, perhaps a club void, and that Diamond hook is on. With ten or eleven clubs and probably spade void, don't think I could get 5♣ for more than 300, so must bid at least game. And might as well try for a top."

Cappelletti: "6♠ —Unless partner has something like ♠ Qxxx♥ Axxx♦ K you should have at least a good play for slam."

That's why you should pass. How can slam be cold if partner doubles 5. ?

King: "6♠ —Seems like partner should have all the high cards outside of clubs for his bid. Otherwise he would have been only 3♣ as a limit raise."

Landen: "6♠ —Partner's hand is ♠ Qxxx♥ Axxx♠ AKxx♣ x, or very similar. With more he should start with 3♣. I suppose seven is remotely possible if has five hearts and a club void, but it's a pie in the sky to look for the perfect hand ♠ Qxxx♥ Axxxx♠ Axx ♣ -."

A 4. splinter where there are two bids in between can have a wider range then a one-under splinter. One-under splinters

leave no invitational room.

Six experts join me and pass. Pass is forcing! Four experts pass and pull. I'm also a pass and puller. Passing and pulling is stronger than bidding directly.

Parker: "Pass—And pull the double. This shows a better hand than bidding immediately. Since I have no first round controls to bid now, I will pull the double to 5♥, which should show second round control and deny a first or second round control of Diamonds. If partner cue bids Diamonds I will bid 6♠, if he bids 5♠ I will pass."

Cue bids are random which is why I love bidding key card and hate cuebidding auctions. There is no such rule that passing and cuebidding show second-round control. Actually there's no rule about what any cuebid, either directly or indirectly, means. Since there are two cuebids available, they have more meaning. If the opponents were bidding diamonds only 5♥ would be available which would make 5♥ an extra value bid saying nothing about hearts. If they were bidding hearts, there wouldn't be any cuebidding room.

Smith: "Pass—I think I'm strong enough to pass and pull. I have two clubs, so normally would have to double, but partner already said he is short there so that doesn't apply."

Hopkins: "Pass—Is this not a classic hand for a "Pass & Pull"? Partner's perfect minimum looks like: ♠ Qxxx♥ Axxx♠ Axxx♠ x, where the Diamond finesse is likely to work over 80% of the time."

Schwartz: "Pass—Most likely will end up in 5♠ as if partner has nothing in clubs, he is likely to have the missing red-suit cards. Still it doesn't hurt to pass to see what he can do as seven is still possible opposite a void or six might be poor opposite a minimum with a stiff club honor (he should double)."

The following two experts are forcing-passers and will pass partner's lack-of-extras double. It will be big matchpoint swing whether you get 300 or 500. Even +500 might not be worth much if slam makes. Partner is supposed to double 5♣ holding ♠ Qxxx♥ Axxx♠ Kxxx♣ x.

Roman: "Pass—Once we have shown gameforcing values (partner's 4♣ bid), the opponents never get to declare anything undoubled, therefore pass is forcing. I will pass if partner doubles, and bid 5♥ if he bids 5♦ . Unless partner has a club void or five hearts, we're going to need him to have the ♠ Queen, ♥ Ace, and ♦ Ace-King to go with his stiff club, and if he has all that he'll get us to slam over pass."

Woolsey: "Pass—A normal forcing pass, showing interest in bidding higher. If North comes back with a red-suit cue bid, we are in slam. If North doubles, I'm going to bet that the opponents have overreached and that we have 500 coming. If North bids 5♠, I'll give it up. With ace-king, and ace, and the queen of trumps, North should take a cue bid once I make a forcing pass."

If the 5♣ bidder has ♠ x♥ xx♠ xxxxx ♣ Qxxxx and the 2♣ overcaller has ♠ xxx♥ xxx ♠ Ax♣ AKJ10x, you can easily take eleven tricks in spades and they can just as easily take nine tricks in clubs. +300 won't be worth much.

Two experts sign-off. I would expect to make game opposite most splinter raises and slam opposite a heavy splinter. Partner's splinter makes this a thirty-point deck.

Bloom: "5♠ —I expect West has ten or more points for his overcall and a five or sixcard club suit. Partner has at least nine points for his splinter. We have a good shot at 5♠. 6♠ is iffy and I'm not so sure we can set them three doubled. No reason to gamble on 6♠ since we're playing matchpoints."

Effant: "5♠ —Partner is showing good support, and must have some points in diamonds and/or hearts. I don't have more than two club losers, and think we should make 5♠."

One expert makes a slam try. By cuebidding a king instead of an ace, you put yourself in a bad position. Partner could have ♠ Qxxxx♥ xx ♠ AKxxx♣ - or ♠ Qxxxx♥ Axxx♠ AKxxx♣ - He will think that seven will make opposite the AK of trumps and will try for seven. You have the AK of trumps but will be afraid to show them because of the lack of the ace of hearts.

Adams: "5♥ —Partner will know if he has good cards for slam (Aces, five spades or Queen, club void.) At the table I would have to know my opponents. Some players I would stop and double, others I would suspect 300 is max. 5♠ should be safe if partner has very bad hand."

Opening bid opposite a game force creates a forcing auction.

Strange auction. LHO shows 5-5 or better in the minors. Instead of bidding a minor, RHO bids hearts and you're void in hearts. There's no bid that describes this hand. There is a similar type auction. 1♣ by you - 1♠ overcall − Pass by partner − 2♥ by RHO. Here double of 2♥ is a takeout double of 1♠ and therefore is a penalty double of 2♥. Does this means that a double of 3♥ is a takeout double of minors which makes the double a penalty double? Unclear. Is this hand so strong that some action has to be taken?

Five experts join me and take some action. The good news is that partner won't pass the double with spade support unless he has very good hearts. Partner could easily have spade support but not be strong enough to bid.

Parker: "Double—This hand is a misfit. Let's try and reconstruct hands and see what we gain by bidding. East should have something like 4-7-1-1, West, 2-1-5-5 and partner 2-5-4-2. We have no fit so bidding a suit makes no sense. If I double partner will pass and we should do well. Three spade winners, one diamond, one club and at least two hearts."

Cappelletti: "Double—Show a good hand and tell partner you have more than just opening values."

Whatever double means, it does show extra values.

Bloom: "Double—Partner has few points, but E/W seem to have no fit. Since I'm void in hearts I assume my partner will have a few. I am doubling for penalties."

Roman: "Double—Lots of different things could happen from here, and while they're not all good, I have enough to tell partner I have a good hand."

Woolsey: "Double—I'm too strong to pass, but I don't want to give up on defending 3♥ since partner might have a big heart stack. This is clearly a takeout double. I simply have to hope partner gets it right."

Double might be for takeout but I don't think it's clear what suit you're short in.

Seven experts pass. Partner could easily have a weak hand with spade support such as $\triangle xxx \lor xxxx \lor KJxxx \lor x$. He surely wouldn't bid $3 \land over 2NT$ and probably will pass out $3 \lor over 2NT$, $3 \land shows a very good single raise, just short of a limit raise.$

Elfant: "Pass—With no support from partner and an apparent misfit by the opponents, I would just let them fight it out, and try to set them. I don't think they'll be able to make anything they bid from here on."

Hopkins: "Pass—Suits are splitting horribly and I have no indication of support from my partner. I am not stepping into the fire."

King: "Pass—Partner couldn't raise spades and all the minor cards are sitting behind me. My hand has gotten much worse as the bidding has gone on."

Schwartz: "Pass—Most likely game is 3NT as minors will be overuffed in dummy but that is next to impossible to get to. Double will almost certainly end the auction either with a big plus or minus score."

Smith: "Pass—I'd sure like to bid, but what can I say?"

Adams: "Pass—Looks like they got me, but I have no sane bid."

Landen: "Pass—Can't believe I'm not taking another bid with this monster hand, but what can I hope to make? It looks like a total misfit, so why not let the opponents play the hand?"

One expert guesses. If partner has the hand you want and you bid 3\(\bar{\hat{A}} \), he'll raise to four.

Welles: "4 — If North has a very likely four spades, in light of the bidding, that alone might be enough to make 4 . And he could well have enough to make game cold. Would not even consider any other bid."

Doubles in competitive auctions show good hands.

You have a 1NT-opener opposite partner's 1NT opener and RHO has shown a very distributional hand. I would doubt that he's 7222, more likely 7411, 8311 or even 7510. You won't get rich defending 4♠ doubled. How many tricks are you going to get if East has ♠ KQJxxxx♥ x♠ QJ109♣ x? You'll get five tricks, which is +300.

Two experts double. Unless 44 makes, they will win IMPs only if the opponents at the other table go minus. While Opener is very likely to pass the double, this double is almost like a negative double. If Opener has a long suit, he's allowed to bid it.

King: "Double—We may well have a slam, although we can expect bad splits that could doom it. Also it is not easy to find the right strain or level and the other table could even end up going minus. I will take my sure plus."

East's bid suggests bad splits.

Landen: "Double—We might make a slam but it seems more likely this might be our last plus score."

Six experts go for the brass ring. There could be twelve tricks off the top and if there are not, after a few tricks the opponent's distribution could be an open book. There won't be any defensive ruffs. On the other hand, if opener does not have a second spade stopper and he loses a trick to East, many many tricks will be lost.

Welles: "6NT—With a minimum of 31 HCP you would be exploring for slam without East's interference. In view of the vulnerability, double is out - can't see getting them for more than 500, so will bid 6NT, to protect possible Qx in partner's hand. Once I have to bid a least five, might as well go for all the marbles."

Parker: "6NT—Just a guess, but notrump should play better than a suit contract, since there will be bad breaks. I see no scientific way of deciding how to bid this hand."

Smith: "6NT—Just a guess. I'm hoping this will play well since partner may be able to take an extra trick based on the bidding. Wouldn't be surprised, however, if it had no play."

Hopkins: "6NT—This is about right on values. I know partner could have the "Kiss of Death" hand ♠ Kx♥ xxx♠ QJxx♣ AKQx, but most of the time he won't have wastage in the Spade suit and we should have a good play for the contract. It might even come down to whether partner has Q9x of Hearts versus Qxx! That is difficult to determine after the pre-empt."

Schwartz: "6NT—With these spots and controls rates to have good play with the added advantage of knowing where the out-

side cards are. There is little advantage of bidding a suit contract where a defensive ruff is likely, or a bad trump break."

Roman: "6NT—What I think we can make."

Many times it's right to bid what you think you can make. Certainly avoids bidding misunderstandings.

Four experts ask for partner's help. After a 1NT or 2NT opener, a jump to 5NT is a grand slam notrump try. Bid seven with a maximum. After there has been a trump suit established, a jump to 5NT is the grand slam force, asking partner to bid seven holding two of the top three trump honors. All other jumps to 5NT ask partner to help decide what should be the trump suit. Choice of slams. By indirectly bidding hearts, you tell partner that you're not sure about hearts as a trump suit. Let's say partner bids 6 ver your 5NT bid. Now 6 voffers partner a choice between 6 vand 6NT.

Efant: "5NT—We have between 31 - 33 points. With more than 15 HCP I would want partner to bid the slam. We have spades stopped, and will probably be able to make the rest of the tricks in the other three suits."

Woolsey: "5NT—Pick a slam. Over sixof-a-minor I'll bid 6♥, and partner can choose between hearts and notrump. This hand is certainly worth driving to slam, and this approach has a reasonable chance of finding the best strain."

Adams: "5NT—Choice of slams. Partner can pick Hearts, or 6NT. This is not a grand slam try at this level. If partner wants to try for a grand, he can try 64. letting me get out in 6NT."

5NT asks partner to bid a suit, which could be a four-card suit. 5♠ accomplishes the same choice-of-slams ask but allows Opener to bid 5NT denying a five-card suit. If Opener has ♠ xx♥ KJx♠ QJx♠ AKQxx, you want to play 6♣. If Opener has ♠ xx♥ KJx♠ QJxx♣ AKQx, you want to play in notrump or hearts.

Cappelletti: "5♠ —Try for a suit but you might retreat into 6NT."

One expert bids 5**V**. I would expect 5**V** to show a six or seven-card heart suit. Opener can't bid more since 5**V** could be a stretch.

Bloom: "5♥ —Partner and I have 31-33 points between us. If I bid 4NT as a quantitative raise looking for notrump slam, we will never find a heart fit. We may find 6♥ if partner is at his max with three or four hearts and if not we have a good play for 5♥. Partner can correct to 5NT with a spade stopper and if I hear 5NT I will raise to 6NT."

Use cuebids and/or 5NT as choice of

slams. Lets Opener help you make a choice.

Is this hand worth an invitational 2NT or a conservative 1NT? You could go other ways. 2♣, support diamonds by bidding 2♥ or make a three-card negative double. There are pluses and minus with all calls. 2NT could get notrump played from the wrong side. If opener has Qx or Jxx in hearts, notrump is best played from opener's side. 1NT risks missing a good game when opener has a good 13-14 something like ♠ Kx♥ Kx♠ AKxxx♣ xxxx.

Two experts bid 2NT. 2NT shows 11-12 HCP and that is what you have but you'd want to have another heart stopper or at least the ten of hearts.

Welles: "2NT—Stands out. It would be the bid without interference, and no other bid comes close to showing the hand."

Cappelletti: "2NT—Keep it simple. And the nine of hearts might promote a second stopper from your side. Note that the "Westerny" 2♥ cue bid, would not get partner to bid notrump with Qx or certain other holdings like JT and might result in playing a 4-3 diamond fit."

2♥ is not a Western cue bid. It shows diamond support. Opener with a balanced hand and a heart stopper probably would bid 2NT.

One expert makes a negative double. Three-card negative doubles should only be made if there is no other reasonable alternative.

Smith: "Double—I never double without four spades, but I'm stuck (other bids stink). I think I can handle anything partner bids. Tough problem."

Four experts go conservative and bid 1NT. Could be right if partner has a minimum weak notrump with no help in hearts.

Efant: "1NT—The hand is too good to pass, and there is no clear suit preference. I

have the hearts stopped, so lying by one point is the most preferable option."

Parker: "1NT—A little strong, but only one heart stopper and no source of tricks. A negative double only serves to confuse the issue and cue bidding hearts showing a diamond limit raise or better lies about the diamonds length."

Landen: "1NT—Nothing strikes my fancy; 2NT about right, but anti-positional, can't stand a negative double though it might rightside the notrump. It's only a non vulnerable game that rates not to make."

Schwartz: "1NT— I bid 1NT because if partner is balanced, the opponents should be able to establish five tricks before I have nine. If he is unbalanced and bids out, I can cue bid the next round.

Three experts bid 2. could lead to problems on the next round. Can Opener bid 3. with a 17-count? Can Opener rebid 2NT with eleven HCP as well as with fourteen HCP? Can Opener rebid 2. with minimum openers and with extra-value openers? I think you're forced to bid again over Opener's rebid.

Bloom: "2. —Not a lot of good choices here. A double is too misleading with only three spades. 1NT denies a four-card major but is weak. 2. will also deny a four-card major but show at least ten points. I would rather have five clubs or better quality but I don't, and unless partner has at least three clubs they won't get raised. 2. gives partner the option to support clubs, rebid diamonds, or best case bid notrump, all of which are fine with me."

King: "2♣ —I don't like to make a negative double without four spades and any no trump

bid by me wrong sides the contract. Let's force for a round and see what partner bids."

Adams: "2. —At matchpoints, I might take the low road, but at IMPs, see if partner has extra, and if so, play notrump from his side."

Three experts join me and bid 2Ψ a support-showing cue bid. Cue bids in this type of situation, after partner opens and there is an overcall, show support for partner with at least limit raise values.

Over Opener's rebid, I can use Eastern Cue Bids, which is the opposite of Western cue bids. 3Ψ , playing Eastern Cue bids, show a stopper in the opponent's suit and strongly suggest that partner bid 3NT. I can use the Eastern Cue bid if there is at least one other non-natural bid available to show a hand without a stopper in the opponent's suit. If Opener bids a black suit, I can bid the other black suit to show a game-forcing hand without a heart stopper. If you're not playing Eastern cue bids, 3Ψ by you asks Opener to do something intelligent and bidding 3NT with a heart stopper is the intelligent thing to do. Would he bid 3NT holding Qx or Jxx of hearts?

Hopkins: "2♥—I can handle most responses from partner. I don't want to play notrump from my side."

Roman: "2♥ —Two aces and a fitting honor for partner is enough to convince me to go big with this hand."

Woolsey: "2♥ —Limit raise or better in diamonds. If North can bid 2NT, I'll take my chances in 3NT. If he merely bids 3♦ I'll have to pass, but it could easily be the right contract."

Throw away Western cue bids and play Eastern cue bids.



REVERSES: THE MOST MISUNDERSTOOD BID!

Recently my husband, Steve, was teaching a group of beginners about forcing bids. Of course he mentioned reverses, which are forcing for one round. The students' eyes glazed over and their jaws went slack. "We don't understand reverses!" they wailed.

It seems to me that reverses are the most misunderstood bid in all of bridge. They don't get no respect! "Oh, I don't play reverses," you'll hear your new partner say, after she's just forced you to bid at the three level with your minimum hand. The problem is, those who don't study reverses are doomed to force their partnership to bid too high and go down.

What is a reverse? When opener's rebid at the two level is in a higher-ranking suit than his opening bid, that's a reverse. The key is that it's not possible for responder to support opener's first suit at the two level. If responder can't stand opener's second suit, she might have to bid 2NT, or support opener's first suit at the three level. Since the partnership should have at least 23 points to safely bid 2NT, and responder might have only six points, opener needs 17+ points to reverse!

Let's look at some auctions:

In Auction #1, North's rebid is a reverse because he's bidding a higher-ranking suit than the one he opened, and it's a suit that South has bypassed. South now knows not only that North has at least 17 points, but also that his first suit (diamonds) is longer than his second suit (hearts). When you reverse, your first bid suit should always be longer than your second suit. South is *forced* to bid again. If she wants to show a preference for North's

original suit, she has to bid diamonds at the three level! North needs a powerful hand to push the bidding up so high, when South has promised only six points.

In Auction #2, North may have four hearts, but he doesn't have the strength to reverse, so he rebids 1NT. It's South's job to now bid 2♥ if she happens to have five spades and four hearts. (With four spades and four hearts, South would have bid 1♥ on her first turn. We bid four-card suits "upthe-line" to help us find our 4-4 fits.)

These auctions might appear to be similar, but they are very different! In Auction #3, since North has reversed, if South wants to go back to partner's first-bid suit, she has to go all the way to 3. Auction #3 promises at least 17 points and more clubs than diamonds. In Auction #4, on the other hand. if South prefers diamonds to clubs, she can simply bid 2♦ without raising the level of the contract. Auction #4 tends to show more diamonds than clubs. But what would North bid if his clubs were longer than his diamonds and he wasn't strong enough to reverse? If he's too unbalanced to rebid 1NT, and he doesn't have six clubs and so can't rebid his clubs, he might consider opening diamonds and then rebidding clubs! Although this is contrary to the rule of opening your longer minor, it's much better to lie to partner about the length of your minor suits than it is to lie about the strength of your hand.

In Auction #5, North bids his spades even though South has denied having four of

them. In Auction #6, North might have four spades, but with a minimum hand, he passes 1NT or bids a minor with a very distributional hand.

7) <u>North</u> South 1♥ 1♠

This is not a reverse, even though North's second suit is higher than his first, because his rebid is at the one level. South hasn't denied a four-card spade suit.

Partner reversed; what do I do now?

- Don't pass! Assume she's read this column and she has the strength for her bid.
- 2. With a weak hand (6 or 7 points), rebid your major if you have five or more. Otherwise, bid 2NT. With just 17 or a bad 18, opener will probably pass or place the contract. If opener has extras, she can still go to game.
- Any other bid is natural and forcing to game. You
 can raise opener's first suit with three-card support,
 or raise her second suit with four. Bidding 3NT
 shows 8-11 points and a balanced hand.

Reverses are useful for players at every level. Respect the reverse and you'll suffer fewer reverses at the bridge table!
