














# A SPOOKTACULAR EVENT!

# Heightening Awareness of Bridge Opportunities in the Triangle The Unit 191 Ad Campaign

I am a relative newcomer to duplicate bridge and, since September 2013, I have played games at the Senior Center, at the Triangle Bridge Club and at the Bridge Academy. In all of that time, I have wondered about the ability of the various clubs to fill tables at their games, and who was attending and why. After thinking about this, and after the massive recruitment efforts sparked by ACBL's Can you Learn Bridge in a Day? program so ably implemented by **Jeff Boak**, I was led to wonder how much more we could do to galvanize the great mass of potential bridge players in the Triangle who would fill our tables to capacity if only they were sparked in the right way. Indeed, there is the dawning realization that bridge is big business, and clubs to a greater extent should be run like a business: assuming that is true then it is natural for us to try again to find new ways to nurture new and intermediate players with structured games targeted to their level of play. This needs to be a conscious effort. We can no longer just preach to the choir—people who know they want to play bridge anyway. We must seek out and bring new players along. The Triangle is a unique place, after all, with the highest per capita PhDs and college graduates in the nation. We are lucky to live here—we all know this. It is the obligation of Unit 191 to meet the needs of this entire population, not just the people who already know they want to play bridge and can withstand the rigors of competition in our open games.

With regard to our fellow Triangle inhabitants, many, like me, learned bridge as teenagers from books by Charles Goren and Alfred Sheinwold, played in college, and while in college had to make the wrenching choice between remaining in college or, instead, dropping out because their bridge play was interfering to so great an extent with their studies. I know people in both categories. For those who stayed in college (or did not), they went on to a life of work and raising family, and they dropped out of bridge. If they did not drop out prior to 1990 and the internet revolution, they certainly did after when work became all-consuming because you were always within reach of your email and thus you never left work. You can see this phenomenon demonstrated on the UNC campus at night. Formerly, at night, the campus was abuzz with activity: you saw people walking across the main quadrangle going somewhere to meet people, and the lights in faculty offices were on as they worked on research that could only be done in the office. Now the campus is dead at night—everyone is at home working on the internet, writing emails and responding to them. If our smart bridge players are rewarded with money and prestige to work this way, they do this in preference to playing bridge. This was not true before 1990. Before 1990, smart people left work, had no special place to go, and so they went out and played bridge.

So I wondered about the great mass of folks, like me, who now had finally retired. What were they doing? Didn't they miss bridge? Well, it turned out that when I handed out the LBIAD flyers, a common response I got was: "Oh, I have always been intending to get back into bridge." Sometimes this was followed up by additional comments about new-fangled conventions, and reluctance to step into a competitive organized duplicate game.

Now Bridge has become big business and the ACBL knows this. The ACBL may be a ponderous, stodgy organization but you can see signs of life there. Their LBIAD initiative is one indication; their Cooperative Advertising Program (CAP) where they will reimburse 75% of the cost (up to a maximum subsidy of \$750) of a <u>date-specific ad campaign for newcomers</u> is another. Now Unit 191 is taking advantage of this subsidy.

On November 10 the Board of Unit 191 met and approved an ad campaign to run on WUNC radio and in IndyWeek. The 24-word FCC-compliant WUNC ad will state: **American Contract Bridge League's Bright Leaf Unit 191, welcoming new bridge players and offering classes starting in January 2015. Details and registration information: unit191bridge.org**




