EGG SALAD ALA JOHN

For as long as John and Sue Torrey have had their Tarheel Bridge Club in the area, John has made egg salad sandwiches. Everyone looks forward to these delectables each Wednesday and Friday. There was a request for the recipe for John Torrey's egg salad, and John happily shared his secrets.

For 14 sandwiches:

Hard boil 11 large eggs. Slice with an egg slicer.

Add:

- 2 stalks of celery. chopped and drained I use a Cuisinart, then tilt the bowl to drain for several minutes
- 1/2 sweet onion, chopped and drained (Cuisinart again)
- dried parsley flakes (McCormick) Should noticeably darken the surface
- ground black pepper A couple of shakes of the container
- Curry powder (the "secret" ingredient) Visible yellow coating on much of the surface. About four squeezes of the McCormick container.

Stir together, then add Hellman's mayonnaise. - Three scoops with a large rubber spoon, enough to get desired consistency.

Boiling eggs: I put the eggs in cold water and heat to a boil, then cover with heat off for 10 minutes. Then douse with ice-cold water.

I found a trick that makes boiled eggs easier to peel. If you lightly tap a raw egg on a hard counter, it sounds like "bok". If the egg is broken it goes "fud" instead. Tap lightly on each end and the side - reject the eggs that go "fud". Then tap a bit harder on the side, to create a hairline crack in the shell, and put the egg in the cold water for cooking. The sound should be "kik". To test you can tap lightly again - the sound should be "fud". The crack will be visible after cooking, and the eggs will peel easily.

BRIDGE CAMPS

This summer, we have two camps scheduled to teach bridge. You are all familiar with the first one, the Youth Bridge Camp, being held June 15-26. This camp is aimed at young people who are about to start 5th grade but is also offered to younger children with the recommendation of a bridge player. This year we were invited to participate in the Durham Expo to inform families of gifted children of fun, educational summer activities. This Expo brought in over 500 people. We spoke to many families who wanted to know more about bridge. We also told them that we would accept younger children from that group because the age restrictions were intended to insure that the participants were ready for the abstract thinking bridge requires. We have had a few registrants already but we need more. If you have children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, or friends or neighbors with children, please encourage them to come to our camp.

The new Adult Bridge Camp, being held July 20-31, is the result of comments made by some of the Saturday morning students who came to continue learning about bridge after attending the October Learn Bridge in a Day. There are no age restrictions for this camp, not even a lowest age so if some children can't attend in June and they are willing to learn with adults, they are welcome. (As an aside; the children will probably be the stars of the show since their brains are so much more attuned to learning new things quickly than adults are.) Both camps have the first week focused at bare beginners, starting as though everyone in the groups has no knowledge of the game. The second week requires that participants already attended the first week or its equivalent (for the Adult Camp). Again, please let friends, neighbors, etc. who might want to learn bridge know about this camp.

We plan for the participants to have fun and to learn a lot in both camps. The kids who have attended these camps in the past have loved it and those whose parents signed them up for only one week (because they didn't want of force their children to continue if they didn't like it) nearly always wanted to come for the second week although many times they couldn't because they had something else scheduled the next week.

Sharpener Please

After this year's Wilmington Regional, Peter Boyd gave me an interesting hand. Many players would not see the key issues clearly enough to execute correct declarer play at the table.

Let's see if your thinking is up to the task. If you don't know him, the Peter Boyd to whom I refer is one of the top experts in the country. You may know Peter Boyd-Bowman of Greensboro, but they are different people. Peter was playing with his favorite partner, Steve Robinson. They both hail from the DC area.

Peter's hand was S JTxxxx, H xx, D QJxxx, C ----. Not much of a collection, you are thinking. Well, the auction proceeded, 1NT (15-17), P,P to Peter. He decided to contest the part score, and, though he might have shown 2 suits, he decided to treat his hand as 1 major. His systemic bid was 2 Diamonds which announced to the table that he had 1 major.

Usually partner bids 2 Hearts (pass or correct) but Peter saw his partner put down a 2NT bid. This bid said, "I have a lot more than you might expect" and asked a question, "Do you have a maximum or a minimum?"

"Three Clubs," called Peter owning up to a minimum. Peter hoped that the brakes had been applied, but partner bid 3 Diamonds inquiring about which was his major. With bad thoughts running through his mind, Peter fessed up to the Spade suit, and his partner raised him to game. The auction went P, P, Double by the 1 NT opener. So much for wanting to contest the partial!

The opening lead was the D K (A from AK) and dummy showered down with S KQx, H AQJ, D xxx, C KJxx. Not a bad catch, but still far from cold. The first trick went small, 2 (standard count), small. LHO played the DA, and caught small, T, small. A little Heart now appeared on the table.

What clues have you gathered? LHO has the AK doubleton of Diamonds. He would have lead the A if he had AKx. RHO played a standard count card of the D2, but then played suit preference of the DT indicating a Heart card.


Visualize all the cards and see if you should finesse or not. The 1NT bidder surely has the SA, the D AK which you have seen and the CA. That doesn't leave room for the Heart K, since that would be 18 HCP. You say what if RHO has the CA and the strong NT hand had the HK and the CQ? Beside the fact that it would be a very iffy bid to double without quick tricks, by playing the Diamond ten, RHO said that he liked a Heart shift rather than a Club. All facts lead to not finessing the Heart.

However, your work is not done. If you lead a trump, LHO will win the A and put his partner in with the Heart King for a Diamond ruff anyway. Challenges like these are what make bridge such a fascinating game. Peter worked out what to do to solve his problem. After winning the Heart Ace he led the CK and threw his Heart. LHO won the CA, but had no way to put his partner in for the Diamond ruff and thus the contract only went down 1 for minus 200. This was not a great result, but it was the best he could do at the time. The technical name for this play is a Scissors Coup: you sever your opponent's communications by losing a trick to the safe hand rather than to the dangerous one.

Several things stand out in my mind about this hand. An expert pair got to a horrible contract. Kay and I occasionally arrive at some interesting ones ourselves. Rather than lament our poor judgment or lack of better fitting cards, we try to do the best we can with the contract at hand. We try to use what information that we can gather from the bidding and the play of the cards.

Moral of the story: I emphasize that when you are on a roll at the table almost anything you do will work. When the wheels come off is the time to hunker down and not get discouraged. Try to bring your A game into play. Did I mention that the contract at the other table was 4 Spades undoubled, down 2, so the board was a push? Did I mention that Peter's team won by 3 IMP's and would have lost by 4 if he had gone down 2 tricks?

What to do in the balancing seat?

First, you may ask, what is the "balancing seat?" It means making a bid when passing will end the auction. So, this could be in any of the following auctions:

Let's consider the last auction first [#5]. Some might play this as preemptive but it also can be a solid opening, such as 13-15 high card points and 6 spades. Partner says, "My hand is so shapely that I can play with little help from you." However, given this auction, it's reasonable to count on partner for 7 or 8 points. If non-vulnerable against vulnerable, a jump is more likely to be preemptive [but not always.] Everything depends on partnership agreements. Moving back to the first auction, this is the balancing No-Trump* bid in 4th seat. It usually promises 11-14 and it should be marked on the convention card. Partner "borrows" a King to open.

Auction #2: if 4th suit passes in this 4th seat, what does that say? If opponents are vulnerable and this player has a big hand with lots of clubs, well, you get the idea. If he/she bids 1NT it should show a decent opening balanced hand with a club stopper. When 4th seat overcalls a preemptive bid, as in this case -- 2S over 2H, partner should think "partner has at least 5 spades and at least a robust opening hand." Partnership agreement governs whether you are obligated to bid, temporize, or be aggressive.

Auction #4 may be the most common. When partner of the opener's 1C opening responds 1NT, everyone knows approximate point count and shape. What if, as shown here, opener rebids 2C? Two passes follow and now you see

partner lay down the X card. What kind of double is this? Is it takeout for the majors? Is it a balance-of-points double? **As usual, it's all about partnership agreements.**
