I started playing bridge in college. I went to NC State and my husband went to UNC-Chapel Hill. I spent most of my career working at IBM in informatics, telecommunications, and Healthcare IT. A year ago I retired from the College of American Pathologists, where I helped create educational items for pathologists.

My main bridge partner, for over 30 years, was my husband, Cliff. He was an excellent player and I really enjoyed playing bridge with him. We played duplicate bridge early in our marriage then switched to social bridge while we were raising our three kids. We moved back to North Carolina around 2009 and starting playing duplicate every Saturday morning.

We received the last of our needed gold points at the 2014 Raleigh Regional Tournament in a three-session Knockout game playing with **Ken Dye** and **Betsy Mebane**. Our team came in first in our flight. It was a very exciting match!

My husband passed away two years ago. I stopped playing bridge for a year. I am very grateful that **Betsy Mebane** dragged me back to the bridge table. She would not take no for an answer.

My current bridge partners helped me earn the needed required points. They include my mom-**Charlotte Young**, sister- **Janice Farnsworth** and friends- **Lori Scanga**, **Debbie Hale and Mary Ferguson**. When I am not at the bridge table you can find me at a Pickleball court.

### Bill McCartney—Life Master



1 am certainly proud and excited to become a Life Master. I have always enjoyed playing card games and spent a fair amount of time playing poker during high school. I first became interested in bridge when our family went to an old lakeside hotel in Iowa. They had a card room and I watched the grownups playing bridge and thought it seemed interesting; they kindly taught me the rudiments of the game. I next started to play in 1967 while at Northwestern University Medical School in Chicago, where a classmate and I went to the Lawson YMCA near the campus and played duplicate bridge when we could spare some time from our studies. We even played in one tournament at the Palmer House when a couple of guys from the club invited us to join their team. I remember one funny experience from the tournament – I brashly doubled a senior player when he bid 6NT (I had about 14 points). He turned to me and said "What do you think I am, an amateur?" He proceeded to show me what a squeeze play is and, of course, made his contract. Despite this, our team actually got a couple of masterpoints.

I was too busy to play bridge during my later years of medical school or during internship or residency. However, when serving in the Army Medical Corp in El Paso, Texas, I was invited by my Colonel to play bridge (not duplicate) with the General at Fort Bliss. When I left the Army in 1976, I moved to Chapel Hill to start work at the UNC Department of Radiology. After a few years at UNC Hospitals, I ran into some physicians who were playing duplicate bridge and, after rejoining the ACBL in 1982, was occasionally able to play duplicate in the evenings. However, I found that playing for three hours at night after working a 9-10 hour day was not very practical, so I reluctantly gave up playing duplicate for the next 30 years; however, I continued to read the daily bridge columns in the News & Observer religiously for all this time.

In July 2013, I began working half-time through the UNC phased retirement program and this gave me the opportunity to start playing bridge seriously again; unfortunately, I could only play once or twice a week until September 2015 when I fully retired. When I started to play again, I realized that due to reading the bridge columns I was still reasonably effective at declarer play, but bidding was a different matter since everything had changed! I was playing at **Paul & Ruth Ann Schwenke's** game at the Seymour Senior Center in Chapel Hill and Paul was kind enough to lend me several of Barbara Seagram's books on bidding and I started to study in earnest. After Barbara Seagram's first visit to the Bridge Academy, I went on a bridge cruise to the West coast of Africa where she and her husband gave lessons and sponsored duplicate games on the days at sea. This was an excellent learning experience and the cruise itinerary was also great. Unfortunately, shortly after my return from the cruise I became quite ill, requiring hospitalization and much physical therapy. After two months of recuperation, I was very anxious to get back to playing bridge; in fact, this desire was a strong motivating factor in my efforts toward recovery. . (continued)

I got several nice encouraging notes, especially from **Karen and Nick Keehbler**. When I first returned to the Bridge Academy using a walker, I was touched by the wonderful welcome I received from the players at our club.

Many people have helped and encouraged me along the way in learning more about various aspects of duplicate bridge and including me into the group. My first regular partner, Richard Cole, helped me greatly in adjusting to the new bidding and we still play together in local tournaments. My current regular partners Page Thomas, John Schachte & Larry Kupper have contributed greatly to my understanding and refinement of my game and many others including especially Claire Sobel and Barry Buehler have taught me a lot as well. I have, of course, learned a great deal from Henry Meguid through his excellent pre-game lessons and more formal educational programs at the Bridge Academy; Henry has even played with me a few times and puts up with my occasionally choppy efforts at defense. I am still working on defense as well as more complex bidding issues. Although I take bridge seriously, I have also tremendously enjoyed the fun social interactions with the very pleasant and interesting people in our bridge club.

# TROMBOND

How many of you have ever held a Trombone? How many of you have ever even seen a Trombone? How many of you are thinking about calling the guys in the padded jackets to pick up poor old Randy, who has obviously gone round the bend?

Let's approach his from a different angle. How many of you have ever seen or heard Robert Preston in the immortal musical, *The Sound of Music*, belting *out* "Seventy Six Trombones Led the Big Parade...with one hundred and ten cornets close at hand"? I'd bet quite a few would answer, yes, if I phrased it this way. Trombones (taken from the song) is a term that a good friend of mine coined to describe a 7-6 hand at bridge!

In 1998, Kay held not 1, but 2 trombones in a span of three days at a Williamsburg regional. No computer dealt these beauties; people did. The remarkable thing was that they both had 6 Hearts and 7 Clubs. Truly, this was a once in a lifetime occurrence. I will not dwell on the second hand since it had a happier outcome, but I will bare my soul on the first, where I was the goat. On Wednesday's trombone, I picked up the innocuous collection of

Kay opened 1 Club, I bid 1 Spade, and she reversed to 2 Hearts. As per our methods, I would repeat my Spade suit with 5, If I chose to support her club suit, I could either force to game with 3 Clubs or else bid 2 NT as a relay to 3 Clubs with a bad hand, and we would rest there unless partner had an exceptional hand. I plussed up and bid 3 Clubs. Kay now had a chance to bid 3 Hearts to show a 6-5 distribution and

maybe not so many HCP in case I wanted to get frisky. Instead, she bid 4 Hearts!

What the heck was that? I have been playing bridge for a long time and have never heard that auction before. I am usually a very quick player, but I had to stop and ponder. I will not bore you with the thoughts that ran through my mind, but I finally concluded that I had a minimum in not only HCP but no extra Club length. I bid 5 cubs which ended the auction. Kay held

She had made a great bid, but I dropped the ball before getting close to the goal line. She was attempting to get me to focus on my Hearts, since if we started out with 2 losers, we would certainly finish up with 2 losers. I had the singleton K of Hearts and that should have been the only thing on my mind. I should have jumped to 6 Clubs since I knew we wouldn't lose 2 Hearts! We scored +420.

The rest of our set was reasonable, and we were up 7 IMPs after the first half. There was still reason for optimism. Our teammates came back and professed a not great round. I was having a bad feeling about things. As we compared scores, our lead had shrunk to 3 IMPs. Trombones was the last board. On a very different auction at the other table, the opposing team also bid only 5 Clubs, but were doubled. -650. Away went the board, and with it, the match. It took me a while to recover, but now, after fifteen years, I am proud to say that I can function normally again.
