#### Election of Directors to the Unit 191 Board of Directors

Hearing murmurings regarding the election of the 2019-2021 Directors to the Unit 191 Board, my letter this month addresses the election process: past and current. The Unit 191 Board is composed of 12 Directors. Every year, four Directors cycle off the board and four newly elected Directors join the board for a three-year term. A slate of nominees for the board is put forward by the unit's Nominating Committee. Elections for the board are held in conjunction with the Annual Meeting & Holiday Gala. Absentee ballots have been available for members who are unable to attend the Annual Meeting. Ballots are distributed as members arrive at the Holiday Gala and votes are tallied during the luncheon, so the results can be announced at the Annual Meeting, which is held after the luncheon.

In the past the Nominating Committee has put forward a slate of typically five nominees or more for the four board positions. Two years ago, the Unit Board and the Nominating Committee decided to only solicit four nominees for the four board positions with the understanding that members could self-nominate or submit additional candidates. Last year, a general call was made to the membership, asking them to provide nominees to the Nominating Committee. See page 2 of the October 2018 issue of the *Bright Leaf Alert Newsletter*. Additionally, nominations were requested from the floor at the Annual Meeting. Ballots were prepared to include write-in candidates, as necessary.

The objective is to streamline the election process, and to separate it from Annual Meeting, so that the new Directors can be announced at the Annual Meeting without encumbering the luncheon with distributing and counting ballots. The intent was never to disenfranchise the membership or to limit the number of candidates. We welcome all members to submit your name, if interested, or to nominate someone else who you think would be an effective member of the Unit 191 Board.

#### **COMMON BRIDGE MISTAKES: DEFENSE**

Over the years, I have had a number of beginners ask me what they could do to help cut down on the number of mistakes that they make at the bridge table. Did I have some kind of magical potion that cured all the ailments and indecisions of the novice bridge player? This article was written years go by a bridge player named John Memory, who hails from the western part of North Carolina. It was written for beginners and goes into detail as to common mistakes and how to correct them when playing defense.

**ALLOWING** declarer to make a trick or tricks he/she can't make for themselves (Often, this involves "breaking " a new suit.)

**ALLOWING** declarer to set up and get to dummy to run a long suit.

**FAILING** to work as hard as you can on defending (e.g. Failure to count declarer's hand. This is easier than many new players think.)

**FAILURE** to notice your partner's first following card and partner's first discard.

**NEARLY ALWAYS**, under-leading a side suit ace or king in a suit contract. Try to find another lead.

**FAILING** to play "3rd hand high." Here's an exception. You play your lowest card that will get the job done. You hold K, Q, J of a suit partner has led. Follow with the J, so that partner will know that you may have the K or Q. If you play the K, partner knows that you don't have the Q or J.

**GIVING** declarer a "tell" that he can interpret to his advantage. If declarer leads towards K, J, 9 in dummy and you hold the A, play low smoothly so that partner may score his Q.

**FAILING** to unblock partner's suit in NT. (E.g. in NT, your partner leads a Q, and you have the A and one more card. Play the A and lead the suit back towards partner's JTxx)

**PUTTING** partner in a difficult position with a lead. (E.g. Dummy on your left has A,J,T, 10 of a suit. You know declarer has a much stronger hand than your partner. Don't lead the suit, since partner's Q will probably be killed by Declarer's K. Let declarer play the suit and guess who has the Q.

**HAVING** defensive carding systems that are too complex to be interpreted correctly.

**FAILING** if you do, to prevent declarer from trumping cards in dummy. Often a defender needs to lead a trump or shift to one if he sees shortness in the dummy and expects declarer to trump his losers.

FAILING to cash your side's winners. When declarer is about to establish a suit to throw losers, go ahead and try to cash your side's winners. Often, this involves trying the only remaining thing that might work for the defense. Maybe you need to lead a K, hoping that partner has the A.



#### Have you heard of the Swiss Cheese Syndrome?

This syndrome describes bridge players whose game has reached a plateau and they are no longer progressing at the same rate or their game scores fluctuate erratically. It is caused by gaps in their foundational knowledge coupled with convention overload or lack of understanding of the convention card.

This class is designed to help players fill in gaps, e.g. differentiating between forcing and non-forcing bids, creating a forcing auction, captaincy, to double or overcall, common bidding errors and rebid traps, and handling strong unbalanced hands.

Harold Harkavy of Florida was one of the great notrump declarers of all time. The reason was that he played professionally and told his clients to avoid bidding notrump if they wanted to win. One time Harold was playing a 3NT contract with the OJ doubleton of clubs in dummy facing the 876 of clubs in his hand. He was in a hopeless contract and had to let the opponents in. He knew once they got in they would shift to clubs, so he led the CQ from dummy feigning strength in the suit. Sure enough the CQ held the trick. Harold continued by the leading the CJ from dummy which also held the trick! Now it was safe for Harold to knock out the ace he really had to get rid of because the opponents no longer had enough club tricks to take. Naturally Harold made his contract. Nevertheless he apologized to his partner saying:

"Partner if I only had the ten of clubs, I could have run the entire suit."
