Lesson 11: Opener's Rebids – Weak & Moderate Hands

If you open the bidding with one of a suit and partner responds in a new suit his response is **forcing** (unless he had already passed) and opener must bid again. So, when opening the bidding with one of a suit you must be prepared to rebid. Mentally divide your hand into one of two groups, moderate hands of up to 15 points and strong hands of 16-19 points, this week we will deal with the first category and next week deal with strong rebids.

With a hand of not more than 15 points there are four options:

- 1. Rebid your own suit at the lowest available level; shows at least a 5-card suit with no intervening suit worth bidding. E.g. 1H-1S-2H shows at least a 5-card Heart suit and you do not have a Club or Diamond suit.
- 2. <u>Support your partner's suit by raising one level</u>; shows at least 4-card support for partner's suit **but** if partner's response to 1S has been 2H he guarantees a 5-card suit so can support with 3 magic number is to have at least 8 trumps between the two hands. E.g. 1D-1H-2H or 1H-2C-3C
- 3. Show a second suit, lower-ranking than the first, offering responder a choice; note that the first suit must be at least as long as the second. E.g. 1H-1S-2D or 1S-2C-2H.

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4. Rebid in no-trump at the lowest available level; lesson 9 covered these rebids

It is important to note that on a hand such as:

K Q 10 3 2
K 6
8 7
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When you open 1H and partner responds 2C you **cannot** bid 2S as you are not strong enough – you are asking partner to go up to the 3-level to give simple preference. We will deal with stronger hands on which you can do this next week.
