Mixed And Seniors Start The Battle

This is the first day of competition and we have started with the Senior and Mixed Championships, Egypt are defending their title in the Senior event while South Africa are defending their Mixed title.. After the first three sessions of the first Round Robin, Egypt were leading both lists.

In the Seniors, **South Africa** is less than a VP behind **Egypt** with **Reunion** and **Morocco** in third and fourth place behind the leaders.

In the Mixed, again it is **Egypt** just ahead of South Africa by less than a VP with only four points separating the trailing group of Kenya, Reunion and Morocco. There are however Bye matches to unwind so the scores can easily change.

The first deal was a nice easy opener for all the players – a straightforward Four Hearts. Every table bid it and every declarer made eleven tricks. Was this a foretaste of things to come? (spoiler alert, when a bridge journalist suggests things will be quiet, you can be sure they will not)

As many of our players speak French they might understand the 'jeux de mot' when I pose the question of North if he doubled in a fit of pique. North's hand is very pretty but overly geared towards attack rather than defence. Declarer had little problem in garnering ten tricks when, as expected, the club finesse was successful and declarer could also ruff two diamonds in dummy. 590 to Reunion.

East's bid of 4NT showed two places to play and West showed that he tolerated clubs, if by good fortune East had a red two-suiter then he would be ready to make an effort in hearts if East removed to Five Diamonds. When you double the final contract and partner who has promised nothing in the bidding turns up with two aces and the contract makes an overtrick one might revisit the wisdom of making the double. After the lead of the singleton diamond declarer played dummy's queen covered by the king and he won with the ace. Trumps were drawn and a third round of diamonds played. East now had a choice as to which round suit to play and misguessed when a heart was chosen, now declarer could pitch his losing club on the long diamond for an overtrick and 750 for Egypt.

In my book a double of a Four Spades bid is for penalties, if you have just one suit then you can bid it, whilst if you are blessed with two then a bid of 4NT shows two places to play. This did not seem to be the methods employed at this table. If the double really was for takeout then I can make a good case for the slam bid and an even better one when I examine the four hands as the contract is cold. North did well to sacrifice in Six Spades but it was still 13 IMPs to Egypt.

I suspect that North, having passed at his first opportunity, would not have guessed that he would be playing in a game contract at the five-level. Another case of a doubtful double. I would not bet any money on taking a spade trick and your red kings do not look handily placed. My supposition about the spade suit proved correct when dummy ruffed the opening lead of the ace of spades. The king of clubs followed and when East took the ace the continuation of the king of hearts facilitated

declarer's task as there was now no need to enter hand to take a trump finesse as playing ace and another trump would prove successful. In fact it is possible to make a small slam. The play requires you to establish the clubs and then ruff the third round to gain an entry to dummy. Careful ordering of the finesses are essential to bring home the slam. If you start with a trump you must take only one round and then switch to the heart finesse and if that hold go back to the diamonds.

East's Three Spades bid was not good news for West. Had I bid Four Diamonds that would have shown 6-5 and when partner still persists with spades knowing that then I would have thrown in the towel and let her play in spades. It was yet another hopeless slam and finished down two.

East took a more restrained line after his partner's game forcing response. When faced with a continued barrage of spades he realised that he was not going to play the contract and gracefully let his partner play in game with some hope. In fact to beat the contract South has to find a club lead but when the card that hit the digital baize was a small diamond declarer had good chances. When dummy's jack was not covered declarer overtook with the king and played three rounds of trumps. When South was forced to win the third round of trumps there nothing that could be done to prevent declarer from making his contract. 13 IMPs to Egypt.

The light opener from West provided handsome dividends when it transpired he had a beautiful double fit with his partner. When North refrained from continuing a vulnerable barrage declarer was well on the way to a good result as the contract could not be beaten.

The Two Spades was a form of a Tartan opening showing 55 in spades and a minor with less than opening strength. East applied pressure with a raise to the four-level and South showed two places to play. North bid diamonds, no doubt expecting South to bid hearts, which indeed he did, and for what reason I cannot fathom, though the result was excellent. It seemed to provoke East into doubling. It is not the first time this session we have unproductive doubles. With the ace of clubs onside and diamonds not 3-0 declarer soon wrapped up eleven tricks and 15 IMPs for Reunion.

North was perhaps a little gourmand when raising to the three-level as his partner cannot be terribly strong in this auction. West led the six of spades and East took her ace and saw the king fall from declarer. To beat the contract a diamond must be played. It is not immediately apparent from East's perspective that this is the case. The opening lead is either a singleton or a doubleton – most probably a doubleton as declarer may well not have jettisoned the king under the ace (even if it was

the correct play). What East persisted with a small spade declarer was able to win in dummy with the ♠7 and then play ace and jack of trumps. Now declarer can finesse against West's ♥9 and only lose one trump and thus make the contract.

North chose to take no further action when South declined to respond after her double. Now the defence had to step up to the plate and defeat the contract. The defence did not get off to the best start when South led the ♥5 and North elected to play the ♥10 allowing declarer to win with his singleton queen. However declarer returned the favour by playing a small spade taken by the singleton king. Yet again the baton was passed to the other side when South continued hearts, this basically allows declarer to make enough tricks by ruffing hearts in hand. He ends up with eight tricks, even if the ace of spades is ruffed. 6 IMPs to Egypt.

The reason I include this hand is that you will find that when the deals are slightly less dramatic than this set and there are far fewer opportunities for big swings it is the little part-score contracts that make a huge difference to the score. It is always declarer who has the advantage on these deals as we all know that the defence of a part-score is more difficult than declaring it so that gives one licence to be a little, but not too, aggressive in the auction that is going to rest below game. Defending part-scores requires the utmost concentration, it is easy to sit back and think 'this is only a part-score, I'll save myself for those important higher scoring contracts'.

I was never sure what the agreed trump suit was and when the response to the Blackwood enquiry showed three keycards I was sure that the suit was spades so I was lightly surprised at the final contract. I do not claim I know the best way to play this slam single dummy. I will show you how declarer tackled it after the lead of the king of clubs. The lead was won in dummy and the top two diamonds

cash. A diamond was ruffed in dummy and hand entered with a spade to lead another diamond which dummy ruffed with the ace. Declarer now led the ♥9 and ran it and so South took it with the ♥10 and still had the king to take the slam down. This was 13 IMPs to Reunion. Egypt finished up with a narrow win of 50-44 or 11.76-8.24 in VPs. Would you believe me if I told you that double dummy the grand slam in hearts or spades can be made. If you play in hearts you win the penultimate trick with the ♥9 en passant against South's ♥10. It makes a good problem should you wish to while away a minute or two.

Declarer now cashed three club tricks and inexplicably South discarded a diamond presenting declarer two extra tricks and so the contract was made with an overtrick. 11 IMPs to South Africa. The winners were South Africa by 45-29 IMPs or 14.18-5.82 VPs.
