South Africa and Morocco are facing off in a 56 board match to decide who is the second team that will represent Zone 8 in next year's Wuhan Cup. It is played over four stanzas of fourteen deals. The first board was a nerve settler for both teams

I am not sure whether West's Three Clubs implied heart support but whatever it meant West was not going to stop short of slam. There was nothing to the play and when declarer played the trumps from the top the only loser was a trump.

East started with the ace of spades and when her partner played the jack she continued with a small one allowing declarer to score a trick with the queen of spades. Declarer crossed to the king of clubs and took a losing diamond finesse. East could cash her two spade winners but when the diamonds were good for three tricks that queen of spades brought the total up to nine tricks and so the game was successful.

East led the king of spades on which his partner played the ♠9. Now East exited with a small club, won in dummy and the losing diamond finesse was taken. East again got off lead with a club won in hand by declarer. There were three diamonds to cash but still only eight tricks. Declarer tried running the ♥9 but East won and for the third time exited with a club. Declarer could then take his two heart tricks but would have to lose the last two going one down. This time the passive defence by East prevailed. 12 IMPs to South Africa.

The opposition did not come to the aid of their opponents by entering into the auction. This was not going to be a happy affair for declarer. South lead a club and declarer ducked to North who continued the suit. Dummy's ace won and a club returned for North who got off lead with a diamond and declarer attempted to run that to the jack but South's queen took the trick. South now gave the declarer the bad news about the trump suit by leading the king. Declarer took her ace and the ace of diamonds and played a spade. South rose with the king and played three winning rounds of trumps and then played the thirteenth club. Declarer could now only make one more trick with her lone trump, four down vulnerable.

East led the ace of spades and then cashed the ace of diamonds, unfortunately this presented declarer with the contract as now he had only two diamond losers and one spade loser so the doubled major suit game succeeded. The best defence if you start with the spade honour is another spade and the to make his contract declarer has to ruff another spade and draw trumps ending in dummy and then lead a diamond to his ♦10. East is then endplayed into giving the tenth trick.

North led the spade ace and then switched to a club. Dummy's ♦10 was headed by the jack and ruffed. Declarer basically followed the line I gave above, but it was a good save as Four Spades was a making contract. If we were playing double dummy then East would have led a small spade for West to win and return a diamond, basically breaking up the endplay, 12 IMPs to South Africa.

I was chatting with a bridge playing friend and asked him to guess the score, I promised him a good lunch if he succeeded but I was confident as he was unaware of the 0.5 carry over or the 4 IMP penalty for smoking by a member of the Moroccan





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team. The actual score was 53.5 to minus 1. Yes Morocco had only scored 3 IMPs over the first fourteen boards and so the penalty took them into negative territory.

The second stanza of the four-part play-off between South Africa and Morocco. South Africa had a near sweep in the first meeting and Morocco will need to stage a comeback in this session.

I was amazed when West did not make a reopening protective double. There is even a good case to be made for East essaying 1NT. Having allowed North to steal the contract it was important that it should fail. The defence did not get off to the brightest start when East led a diamond, Declarer immediately took three rounds of the suit discarding a club loser from hand. A small heart from dummy saw West split her honours and declarer won and exited with the ♣J which was taken by West's queen. When the king of hearts was cashed it felled partner's jack and created two winners for declarer. However West played another and East ruffed with the ♠2. His attempt to cash a club was thwarted when declarer ruffed and led his master heart. East now ruffed in with the ace of trumps but now declarer's remaining trumps were good enough for two tricks and consequently the contract.

I agree with East's 1NT here. South led the ♣10 taken in dummy and declarer immediately attacked the diamonds, North winning with the jack and returning a club. Winning on table another diamond was played and North won and tried a small heart. Declarer's ♥9 held the trick and the jack was led and when North won he could only exit with a heart and now the play of another diamond meant that after South took his king declarer had the rest of the tricks, so making plus two and 6 IMPs to South Africa.

South's king of clubs was taken by the ace and the ♠9 run to South's jack. The ♥2 saw North's ♥10 beaten by the ace. The ace of trumps was cashed revealing the bad split and declarer exited with a club to South. Declarer tried to cash the ♥K but South ruffed and exited with a diamond and waited for her trump trick. One off.

According to the convention card Two Spades was five spades and a five-card minor. It is rare that when one team plays in the same suit in both rooms that it leads to a happy outcome. The heart lead was taken by the ace and East found the cheeky reply of a small trump which declarer ducked to West's ♠9. A diamond saw declarer take East's queen with the ace and he then proffered a small spade won by East's ♠8. A diamond back to West's king and another round ruffed by East's ♠10 with still the ace and king of trumps alongside the ace of clubs to come declarer was three light. The defence actually made six trump tricks! 9 IMPs to South Africa.

West is in a bit of a bind after the three-level intervention. I would not be surprised if this had not been well discussed. I would have been tempted to blast 3NT. South may well not have a solid heart suit as quite often if that is the case she may well lie low especially against vulnerable opponents. I do think East should try 3NT, you need points, you are vulnerable and you are unsure as to partner's bid, assume the best and go for gold. When it is not your day it is not your day in spades as the defence took the first four tricks on a crossruff and with a club trick to come that was one down.

West's double obviously showed strength and with double stops in both majors East immediately bid the no-trump game.

After the heart lead declarer had nine tricks on top but when the diamond void was exposed he made an overtrick via the marked diamond defence.

At the end of the stanza South Africa had won 55-3 meaning that the running score was 108.5-2.

The Moroccan team then graciously conceded the match and warmly congratulated their opponents.





Championship Information

Your Chief Tournament Director Waleed El Menyawi explains the important procedures to be observed during the Championships:



Head Tournament Director's Notice

All team members, captains, and coaches are required to read these regulations carefully. For comprehensive rules, please refer to the official Conditions of Contest (CoC).

1. Competition Format and Qualification

The tournament will be played over 5 days of Round-Robin (RR) play. Each match consists of **16 boards**, with a time limit of **2 hours and 15 minutes** per match.

- **Round-Robin Structure:**

- **5 or 6 teams:** 3 complete Round-Robins.
- **3 or 4 teams:** 5 complete Round-Robins.

- **Qualification:**

- The team ranked **1st** at the end of the RR stage is the Champion and qualifies for the World Bridge Championship.
- **2nd and 3rd Place Qualification:**
 - If the difference between the 2nd and 3rd placed teams is **20 VPs or more** (≥ 20), the 2nd placed team qualifies directly for the World Bridge Championship.
 - If the difference is **less than 20 VPs**, a **Knockout Mini-Final** match will be held on **Day 6**.
 - **Mini-Final Format:**
 - 4 segments of 14 boards to determine the 2nd place, each segment has a time limit of **2 hours**.
 - Carry-over, the calculation of a carry-over will be based on all IMPs accumulated during their « head-to-head » encounters.
 - If the resulting IMPs difference is in favor of the Team who finished second, then a carry-over of 50% (of that difference) will be awarded in their favor but cannot exceed 28 IMPs.
 - if the resulting IMPs difference is in favor of the team who finished third, then a carryover of 33,33% will be awarded in their favor but cannot exceed 28 IMPs.
 - If needed, the Head TD can add a fraction to the Carry-Over before the start of first segment, to avoid any ties at the end





2. General Play Procedures & Line-ups

- **Seating:** Upon logging into the RealBridge platform, teams will find their designated tables.
- **Home vs. Visiting:** The schedule identifies the Home team (listed first) and the Visiting team (listed second).
- **Line-up Protocol:** No pre-submitted line-ups are required. Visiting teams must be seated at their tables (NS and EW) at least **10 minutes** before the official start time. Home teams may then observe the visiting line-up and seat their pairs accordingly.

3. Requests for Ruling & Appeals

1. **Initial Ruling:** All concerns must first be addressed with the TD in charge.
2. **Official Review:** If a team wishes to contest a ruling, a formal Request for Review must be submitted via the TD in charge of the case.
3. **Timeframe:** Requests must be lodged within **30 minutes** of the official score posting for the session in which the board was played.
4. **Deposit:** A non-refundable deposit of **€100** (or equivalent in Euro) must be paid to the ABF monitor upon submission.
5. **Review Process:** The Reviewer will verify that the TD gathered necessary evidence, applied the correct Law, and consulted appropriate colleagues. Rulings based on sound judgment will not be overturned simply because the Reviewer might have reached a different conclusion.

4. Technical Standards & Regulations

- **Time Delay & Hesitation:** TDs utilize analytical tools to monitor board-by-board timing and total session duration. Penalties will be issued based on these automated reports. Players are advised to exercise caution regarding hesitations; denials will be cross-referenced against technical data.
- **Audio/Headphones:** Although the use of personal headphones/earphones is **mandatory** for all players, but vocal chat is strictly unrecommended; all communication must occur via table or private text chat. Unauthorized information exchanged via chat may result in an adjusted score.
- **Noise & Unnecessary Talking:** Talking without a valid reason, discussing hands out loud, or general noise/discussions inside the playing venue are strictly prohibited, **Penalties will be applied immediately.**
- **Kibitzing:** Kibitzing is strictly prohibited at the playing venue and within the RealBridge on-line environment. All matches are broadcast via the [RealBridge Kibitzer Website](#) with a **30-45 minute delay** for security.
- **Conduct and Forbidden Items:** Players must maintain “live” tournament decorum. The following are strictly prohibited during play:
 - Mobile phones and electronic devices (these will be collected/monitored).
 - Eating (including snacks/biscuits) and drinking alcohol.





- Smoking.
- Leaving the table for the WC without explicit permission.
- Audible complaints regarding partner's bidding, play, or defence.

5. Alerts & Explanations Protocol:

- Players must use the correct procedure for alerting and explaining bids whenever required by regulations.
- **In case of disputed facts, unwritten or verbal alerts will not be considered valid by the TDs under any circumstances.**
- You must explicitly alert **ANY** agreed-upon convention or bid, **no matter how standard or obvious you believe it to be.**

Unacceptable Justifications: The Tournament Directors (TDs) will **NOT** accept any subjective justifications from players for failing to alert or explain a bid (e.g., claiming a bid is “standard,” “obvious,” “self-explanatory,” “clearly non-natural,” or any similar arguments).
