## Welcome To The Open & Women

The second week of the ABF zonal championships begin and we look forward to watching the exploits of the Open and Women teams. They are all hoping to get to the semi-finals so as to have a chance of getting to represent the **ABF** in Herning for the World Championships.

In the Open Championship the only team that have won all their matches is **South Africa** and consequently they are in the lead ahead of **Egypt** and ten points behind them is **Morocco** and claiming the fourth position is **Tunisia**.

In the Women championship there are two teams undefeated (they both have had a bye) and they are **South Africa** who are ahead of **Tunisia** but already nearly a match behind is **Morocco** who are just ahead of **Egypt**.

There have been some unexpected results today and some big wins, but this is only day one of five. The Round Robin is a marathon, not a sprint.

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## Important Message From Your TDs

#### **Dear Captains**

Please pay full attention

As I received several complains about failure to alert a conventional bid by players and these complaints were supported by photos against many teams.

Kindly be advised that all the conventional/artificial bids have to be alerted with fully disclosed- even if from the player's point of view it is clear

Double / Redouble / 4 NT / responses to 4NT / Transfers / Stayman / Puppet .... etc. as long as these bids are artificial or conventional, they must be alerted.

It has been decided that failure to do this, may result in your team receiving a penalty of 0.25 VP even if no clear damage was done.

As per the WBF/ABF Alert policy: All the players are expected to protect themselves to a large extent. How to protect yourself? By asking about the meaning of a bid or by checking the CC, especially, when screens are in use.

Especially, when you expect the bidding could be conventional or artificial, like the defensive bids, overcalls over NT, overcalls over strong artificial strong opening ... etc.

Please, Please – Share with your team as soon as you read this

En particulier, lorsque vous pensez que les enchères pourraient être conventionnelles ou artificielles, comme les enchères défensives, les interventions sur SA, les interventions sur une ouverture artificielle forte, etc.








## Egypt vs. Morocco - Seniors Final

he first of two sessions in the Seniors Championship had defending champions Egyppt playing against Morocco. Egypt had a relatively easy match in their semi-final whereas Morocco had to win the last session to inch themselves in front of South Africa by just six points.

The sense of the 4♠ escapes me, surely 4♠ was single suited – it was not alerted. The good news was that the final contract was not doubled. The jack of hearts was led and East overtook with the queen and cashed the ace before switching to the queen of clubs, covered by the king and taken by the ace. West continued with the jack of clubs and East discarded a heart, now declarer could escape for a mere three off vulnerable.



This was never going to be a happy contract and after the spade lead declarer took his only legitimate chance that the king of hearts was trebleton in the South hand. It was not to be and the contract was four off.

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


That looks a standard auction to me and on the lead of a heart, with the diamonds behaving, declarer took his eleven top tricks.

West's Double was not alerted so we will never know if it was a support or value showing one. It would have worked out better if East had bid 2NT and effectively ignored the 1♥ bid but after only 1♠ even the 3♥ did not get across the power of this hand. Declarer made an overtrick but the damage was done when the vulnerable game was bid and made in the other room. 10 IMPs to Egypt.

Had South bid 3♥ (perhaps a slight overbid) instead of 2NT then almost certainly the final contract would have been 3NT. In Five Diamonds, the trump lead was taken by East's ace and a heart returned and ducked to West's jack. Now with the ace of spades to come the contract was one off.

At this table South remembered Hamman's rule 'Bid 3NT if it is a plausible choice', and therefore bid 3NT. On the lead of the ♣10 declarer won in dummy and set about he diamond suit. East taking the second round. On the heart switch declarer ducked and East took two tricks with the jack and queen bedore playing another club. Declarer won in hand and had time and communications to set up a spade for his ninth trick. 12 IMPs to Morocco.

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

Whatever the meaning of 2NT North accepted it as a try for game. Declarer's task was simplified when West chose a trump for the opening lead. East won with the ace and returned a small spade ducked by declarer and taken by West and the suit returned to East's ace. Now with the trumps 3-2 declarer was home free.

South's Pass was on the timid side but as he misguessed the trump suit he only made nine tricks and at least had a positive score but still lost 10 IMPs to Egypt.

At the end of the first session Morocco had a handsome lead of 64-38. Egypt would need to pull all the stops out in the second and final session if they wanted to be champions.

# Quiz

I set this quiz during the previous set of championships, I am repeating it for those who were not present in the first week.

During the United States Bridge Federation trials in Schaumburg Illinois, this deal surfaced in the Round of 16:



After a set of bidding misunderstandings South found himself playing 7NT. The good news was the lead was the ♠10. How did declarer play and make his contract without any error from the defence and there are no singleton kings or the like.

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




# Egypt vs. Morocco - Seniors Final

fter the first session in the Seniors Championship Morocco had taken a 31 point lead over Egypt and with only 16 boards to go Egypt would be hoping for hands with swing potential.


West discovered that partner had an opening bid, four spades to the ace and a heart control. That was enough to decide to bid the grand slam. Only all three spades in the South hand would beat the contract – so it was about 89%, Though there is a less than 1% chance of a heart ruff., so you should really be playing 7NT. Neither of these negative possibilities came to pass so the slam was claimed at trick three.

Both 2♣ and 2♦ were alerted but no explanation given, I am assuming some form of Drury. If the direct 4♠ bid shows a hand something like East actually held then surely an enquiry after the 5♦ response to RKBC might have allowed the grand to be bid. Obviously the exact same thirteen tricks but a loss of 11 IMPs to Morocco.

East went for the penalty rather than a doubtful game. On the lead of the ace of diamonds Partner contributed the ◆5 and East continued with a small one to the West's queen. Rather than continuing the diamonds West switched to the queen of clubs, declarer taking the ace. And now attacked spades, West taking the ace. The switch to the queen of hearts allowed the defence to take eight red suit tricks and the ace of spades for three off.

The king of diamonds lead brought the ◆3 from partner and when East continued with the ace West 'unblocked' the queen of diamonds. The ◆10 lost to declarer's jack and he immediately attacked spades. West took his ace and now attacked with the queen

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
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of clubs. The defence were haemorrhaging tricks at a vast rate but there was no play to give up more so declarer finished only one down and made 9 IMPs for Morocco


On the \$\infty\$10 lead, which held the trick, the suit was continued and South took the jack and king and returned a club. Declarer rose with the king, either making the contract or going several off. It was declarer's lucky day as the ace of clubs was with South. Nine top tricks taken.

East is borderline between 2NT and 3NT, but as I have said before vulnerable games win matches. On the lead of the jack of clubs South encouraged and declarer took the king. Five rounds of diamonds were cashed and South discarded both spades so declarer made an extra overtrick taking the marked finesse against the jack of spades. Another 9 IMPs to Morocco, They had increased their lead by 23 points, making it 54 with only twelve boards to play. The next two boards were flat.

West started with three top diamonds, declarer ruffing the third round. Ace of hearts and another saw West take the king and play ace an another club, taken in dummy. Whe a spade was led from dummy East rose with the ace and the contract was now one down.

A fourth best ♥2 was led to South's ace, what should South do now? If think long and hard about returning a heart then no matter what West is holding a small heart is best, you need to avoid the situation where partner cannot lead a heart as it would set up a trick for declarer, simplistically, if declarer has the ♥10 then you must not lead the jack, if he has not got it then it does not matter what you do. You have probably now realised that South returned the jack. Declarer leapt up with the king, took three rounds of diamonds, played ace and another club and when North went in with his king the defence could only take one more heart and so declarer made an unlikely overtrick and 9 IMPs for Egypt.

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


The opening lead of the ♣10 was allowed to hold the trick. The spade switch was won in dummy and the ◆10 covered by the jack and king, East ducking, but taking the king with the ace and switching to a heart and took West's queen with the king. Declarer now cashed the ◆9 and when the suit did not break he gave up a diamond and had the rest of the tricks for plus one.

South led the jack of hearts ducked to North's king and the queen of diamonds came back. Your Chief Tournament Director Waleed El Menyawi explains the important procedures to be observed during the Championships:

The Followings are some important information from your Head TD which need to be carefully read by each member, captain or coach of any team, please refer to the <u>Conditions</u> of Contest for full details.



#### 1. Play Format: Open, Women, Seniors & Mixed teams

- 1. Three Complete RR (15 Matches X 16 Boards each; in 5 days)
- 2. The top four teams will qualify to the Semi-final stage, the first ranked team will choose its opponents from between teams ranked  $3^{rd}$  or  $4^{th}$ .
- 3. Semi-Final will be five Segments of 16 Boards each, No Carry Over ( Check the <u>CoC</u> for tie-breaks ).
- 4. For the Semi-final, Final and play-off sessions, It has been decided that:
- 5. The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in segments 3 & 5 in the Semi-final.
- 6. The team ranked lower after the RR stage will be the Home team in segments 2 & 4 in the Semi-Final.
- 7. The 1st Segment will be blind line up.
- 8. The team ranked higher after the RR stage will be the Home team in segment 3 in the Final or Play-off.
- 9. The team ranked lower will be the Home team in Segment 2 while segment 1 will be blind.
- 10. The Final will be three Segments of 14 Boards each, No Carry Over ( Check the <u>CoC</u> for tie-breaks ).
- 11. The first 2 RR will be home and away line-ups.
- 12. The last Round Robin shall be done according to the final ranking of the teams in the previous played 2 rounds and will be a blind line-up.

#### 2. Teams Events ... Last RR

The last Round Robin for all categories shall be done according to the final ranking of the teams in the previous played rounds.

#### 5. Play instructions and Schedule of play ...

A. When you log on to the RealBridge game (using the game link), you will find your team

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name written in one of the Tables.

- B. All team members are required to sit at their table (all together) in Pairs NS and EW, later on, when we start the session, the software will automatically move the EW pairs between the tables according to the schedule of play.
- C. In the schedule of play you will find Home team ( the team mentioned first ) and Visiting team ( the team mentioned second )
- D. The visiting team has to sit first at their table (Pairs NS and EW) and the Home team has the right to have a look at the visiting team and sit its pairs accordingly.

#### 6. Request a review

- 1. First step is to review the TD ruling with the Head TD
- 2. Second step is apply for an <u>official review</u> by submitting a review form through the TD in charge of your case.
- 3. A request for a review of a Tournament Director's ruling must be lodged within 30 minutes of the first posting of the official score for the Session in which the board was played that is the subject of the ruling. All such requests must be lodged by the team's Captain or his designee, or by one member of the pair in the Pairs events.
- 4. When lodging a Request for Review the appellant must make a monetary deposit with the ABF monitor. The amount of deposit required will be US \$ 100 (or the equivalent in Euro)
- 5. The case will be reviewed by a person who was not involved in the original decision. The Reviewer will check that the TD has gathered the necessary evidence of what occurred when the infraction arose. The Reviewer will then need to be satisfied that the correct law was applied and that other TDs were consulted where appropriate. In matters involving the judgement that was exercised by a player following unauthorized information, incorrect explanation or failure to alert, the Reviewer will clarify that suitable players have been asked appropriate questions to enable a judgmental view to be obtained. Finally, the Reviewer will check that the ruling that was issued based upon all the information available to the TDs was within the bounds of reasonableness. The fact that the Reviewer might have determined a slightly different ruling would not be good reason for the ruling to be varied. In the event that the process had not been followed properly in some material way, the Reviewer will ask the Head TD to correct the failings and issue a new ruling.

#### 7. Time delay and hesitation

- It is very important to know that the TDs have the tools to produce a board report which includes the time for each bid / play by each player, so please be bare that in mind when calling the TD for a possible hesitation or before denying it.
- It is also very important to know that the TDs also have the tools to produce a session time report which includes the exact time taken by each player in a session, in case of time delay, the penalty will be given according to this report.

#### 8. Home & Visiting teams

- When you log in to the RealBridge game (using the game link), you will find your team name written on one of the Tables.
- All team members are required to sit at their table (all together) in Pairs NS and EW, later on, when we start the session, the software will automatically move the EW pairs between the tables according to the schedule of play.

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- In the schedule of play you will find Home team (the team mentioned first) and Visiting team (the team mentioned second)
- NO LINE-UP will be needed from the teams, the visiting team has to sit first at their table (in Pairs NS and EW), minimum 10 min before the official start time, and the Home team has the right to have a look at the visiting team and sit its pairs accordingly.

#### 9. Headphones / Earphones

In order to minimize the noise in the venue as much as possible...

- It is mandatory for each player to have his own headphone / earphone which is connected to his device during play
- Use the table chat / private chat as much as possible and don't use vocal chat.
- Any vocal explanation will not be taken into the TD consideration in any case.
- You need to be very careful when using the table chat as you might give an unauthorized information to your partner which could results in adjusted score by the TD.

#### 10. Kibitzers

- Kibitzers are not allowed by any means at 1) the playing venue, 2) RealBridge online playing room.
- All players are required to immediately leave the playing area when they finish their session, players are also kindly asked to keep their seats and not roam around the playing area.
- All the matches will be broadcasted via RealBridge kibitzer website...

- At the RealBridge kibitzer website, you can find the live broadcasted matches and also all the other matches scheduled for broadcast.
- For security reasons, all broadcasted matches will be delayed by 30-45 min.

#### 11. Smoking, Eating and Alcohol, Mobile and electronic devices

We must act as if we were playing these championships "live", therefore, the following is strictly forbidden during play:

- Mobile phones and any other electronic devices, Mobile phones will be collected and there will be a regular check each session by the monitor.

# RealBridge Playing Instructions

### First: Log in, Lobby, at the table and Settings

- 1. To join any RealBridge game you will need a LINK
- 2. All the play links will be available on ABF website

**AND** you might also receive it by mail.

**3.** Click the link and you will be redirected to the log on page of our game which looks like the next figure ... Notice that your video should appear in the right bottom corner of the page and mic volume showing that it works.

**4.** If you can't see your video then you need to allow your browser to use your cam and mic, do as follows to allow it

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








- **9.** Each table labeled with a team name, find your table and chose where to sit ( Sit N, Sit S, Sit E or Sit W )
- **10.** Get familiar with the buttons at your table and call the TD using the button for help.



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

### **Second : Bidding, Play, Alert and System**

13. At the start of any session, All the team members are required to be seated at the same table (Table with the <u>team name label</u>), the system will automatically move the EW pairs to the opponents table when we start the session and will send them back to their home table when both tables finish playing the boards.

#### 14. Private chat and Table chat

- It is strongly recommended to use the chat rather than the vocal chat; the TDs will not take into consideration any vocal explanation if you have any case.

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

## 15. Self-alert and self-explanation proper procedure:

- 3. Make bid



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









If you make a **mistake** or need to **explain your bid further** after you have bid, you can click on the bid and add more text.



The added text will appear after an asterisk \*. The time in seconds between when the bid was **made** and the added explanation was **submitted** is presented after the added text in the square brackets, for this example, 26 seconds. The character limit on explanations is 200 characters.



#### 16. System

All teams are required to write a brief about their system at the table chat box before the start of first board in each match.



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#### How to load your system card (convention card)

Step 1

Copy the link to your system card/convention card from where it is on the web, like this:

- Find your card.
- Click the Copy Link button next to the system card name.

Step 2

When sitting at the table, click the System Card/Convention
Card icon to the right of your grey name-band at the bottom of the window.


Step 3 Paste your system card/convention card link into the box. To paste the link:
