One Day Left

In the Play-off between **Diamond** and Sharjah Club, Diamond won the first low-scoring session by a margin of six points. In the second session Sharjah Club came back to win by 45-34 thus turning round the match and becoming the third placed team by a mere five points.

The hands in the two final sessions were full of thrills and spills, in the second session there were five slams and only three boards were flat during the entire day. **EGYJOR** just shaded **WASO** in both sessions, the first by three points and the second by nine, so giving then a twelve point lead going into tomorrow's final two sessions to determine who is the champion. A mammoth 146 IMPS changed hands during the 24 boards- that is more than six points a board. So still all to play for.

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Information for Captains

Alert

All alertable bids must be pre-alerted (press the alert button before making the bid). Giving an explanation is not compulsory unless it is an extra-ordinary bid.

For example if you are playing forcing NT over major openings (which is very common) alerting should be sufficient (if needed opponents can ask for explanation), but if you are playing 1NT transfer to X, only alerting is not enough. You have to type the explanation before making the bid. We strongly recommend you try to help opponents giving sometimes the simplest of information.

For example, if you are opening 1♣ with 2+. At least the first time you do it, just type "2+" in the explanation box when you make the bid. Only alert your own bids, do not even attempt to explain your partner's bids. Alert explanation space is limited on BBO, if opponents ask for further clarification using private chat respond privately, not on table chat. (Of course, unless opponents asked on table chat), If you are playing an unusual system make sure you pre-alert it before you start bidding the first board, including but not limited to: Variable or weak NT openings, strong ♣ or ♦ systems, 4-card major systems like ACOL, playing unusual honor card leads like Rusinow or low from a doubleton

Systems

HUM, Browne stickers systems, Forcing Pass Systems, Random Openings, and Encrypted Signals are not allowed all the time.

Players can't consult their system cards or notes between the start of the auction period until the end of the play. Exception: players may consult their defence notes vs 2♦ multi opening.

Psychic conventional opening bids are forbidden

Codes

If you want more information about an opponent's bid, whether or not it was explained, you should send a private message to the opponent who made the bid asking for clarification.

Requesting information may be made at any time, at the time the bid is made, when the auction concludes, or any time during the play as long as it is a private chat between one opponent and the bidder.

If players explain bids via chat they should set the recipients to Opponents, not Table, so that only opponents see the explanation, not the partner. But the best way is to explain the bids via the BBO alert mechanism.

Line up

All line-ups are blind and a personal line-up form (link) for each team including all the matches will be sent to the team captain to keep the link as it will be used each time, the team captain will choose 1) the match number, 2) pick the players from the given name list and players preferred direction (North, South, East or West) and submit it at least 60 min before the match starts.

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Two Important Pieces of Information For Captains to Note

***VERY IMPORTANT NOTES ***

The BBO Management recommends that you wait in the main section of BBO when you are about to receive an invitation to play. Different areas of BBO are managed by different servers, so if you are located in the casual section the system may read you as being offline even if you are online.

Also, we use a special procedure in order to make sure that all of our matches are starting at the same time. We start inviting players and set up the team match some minutes before the official starting time. This may result in your partner already sitting (and waiting) at the table of the ABL Mixed Teams match while you are still in the lobby. That is totally normal, and is done in order to be more precise on the starting time. We kindly ask all players to just stay in the lobby (main section of BBO or in the competitive section) and wait for our invitation.
































If the defence does not take its club tricks early then there is a small chance the the contract could succeed but North's first lead was the ♣K, declarer tried to muddy the waters by dropping the ♣Q but having opened 1NT there was not a lot of mud to stir up. North then cashed the ace of hearts and two more clubs to take the first four tricks – one off.

Declarer needs the ♥K to be doubleton onside as dummy cannot be reached dummy twice. Even the friendly looking lead of a club does not help as even if you ruff two clubs in dummy that only leaves one for taking finesses – one down and six IMPs to EGYJOR.

I assume West's 3NT showed 18-19, otherwise an alternative opening would have been found for a balanced hand. East should know the maximum point count is 29 so there needs to be a perfect fitting hand opposite to make a slam and in my experience partner rarely has the perfect maximum. It was bad news/good news/bad news story to the play. The bad news was that the slam was failing, the good news was that 5♣ would also fail, so there was scope for minimising the loss, the inconsequential bad news was that South, very generously in my opinion, underled the ♠K giving away a trick – would have looked very silly if declarer's hand had been slightly different.

My system card has 2NT down as 15-17, but it did not matter as partner had an automatic 3NT bid and declarer was not hard pressed when the ♠Q held the first trick after a spade lead. Another twelve IMPs to EGYJOR.






















3NT would also succeed but the minor-suit game was not in danger, in fact had the clubs split 2-2 then twelve tricks would have been there for the taking

There is an old saw which says 'takeout doubles should be taken out', especially if you are going to drop a trick in the defence, the contract finished one down and yet again IMPs for EGYJOR – nine to be precise.

South was not going to let the opposition play at a low-level and North found himself at the helm of a spade contract. Double dummy as the cards lie ten tricks are possible but declarer was content with nine.

After East's cheeky One Spade South was less determined and sold out to Two Hearts. To compound the problem after North had led a diamond to trick one, South returned the suit when the second trick was won by the ♣K and away went two spade losers and declarer could make eight tricks. Seven IMPs to EGYJOR who now led 37-2. WASO needed to change gear.






















I suspect there was nearly confusion in the auction but all's well that ends well. South has an unattractive hand from which to lead and chose the ♣A and now to beat the contract must underlead the ♠A so partner can win with the king and push a club through, otherwise it is too late as after trumps are drawn declarer can set up the hearts to discard the losing club.

South found a better lead, a heart. Declarer went up with the ace and drew trumps and then knocked out the ♥K but North immediately switched to a club and the defence took the next three tricks to break the contract. Twelve much needed IMPs to WASO.

A more gentle pre-empt paid dividends this time. 


When partner could speak West immediately went to game in hearts. After a diamond lead declarer managed to ruff one in dummy and then take a successful heart finesse and then had the pleasure of the seeing the king fall doubleton and in spite of the *K being offside there were eleven tricks.

The question whether East is worth an effort after discovering partner has a hand worthy of an overcall after an opening 1NT, a lot depends on partnership style, if the overcall can be slightly less than sound then it is more difficult to bid on, but if you partner plays with a straight bat then then perhaps one could make some invitation. Another six IMPs to WASO.


I suspect North felt marginally aggrieved when the defence took the first four tricks with two aces and two ruffs, it could have been three ruffs but I do not think the defence minded much.

A spectacularly wild opening which would have been a great success if Four Hearts was makeable by North/South, but as we have just seen the defence have a riot of ruffs. It was not doubled so no deep trouble but another six IMPs to WASO.

It was, as football pundits are wont to say 'a game of two haves'. To start EGYJOR racked up 37 while WASO could only score two and then at the backend of the session WASO scored 32 unanswered points, so only three points in it.






























When West cooperated with East's forward moves it was clear that there must be some useful cards in the West hand and so East bid the very good slam. Even though South led the singleton spade there was no problem as that hand also held the trump ace and so twelve tricks were gathered in short order.



I am not a fan of East's opening bid, had partner not had the ♠K a Pass might have been the response and a stone cold game missed. I appreciate that

West's hand is not the strongest but it is much stronger than its six points, it has a ninth trump and a singleton, certainly taking the hand into double figures. You are not promising much extra if you cooperate with partner. So that resulted in eleven IMPs to WASO

East effectively stopped the auction with the 4♠ bid, I do not know if and how the partnership methods differentiate between 3♠ and 4♠ but with the East hand when you know partner has four spades and the ace of clubs you can virtually underwrite the five-level so one needs to find a way to explore further. After a club lead that ran round to the ten declarer cashed the ♠AK and when the ♠Q fell doubleton took all the tricks.

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

East only bid 3♠ giving partner a chance to show better than minimum and that gave East all the impetus that was required. A diamond lead was won in hand and again the ♠AK were cashed and the same thirteen tricks claimed after the queen fell. Thirteen IMPs to EGYJOR.


West led the ♥Q and saw the ♥9 from partner, after thought the continuation was the ♥K which gave declarer two heart tricks. In dummy with the ♥A a small spade to the king lost to West's ace and the heart suit was then cleared. A small spade to dummy's ♠9 lost to the jack but now the spades were established and declarer had the requisite number of tricks.

West led the ♥K and when that held the trick the ♥Q followed taken by the ace. A small spade from dummy to the king was allowed to hold and declarer now tried to establish the club suit with a small one towards the jack but East took it with the ♣Q and exited with a diamond. Now declarer tried to establish the spades and when he played a small one towards dummy he inserted the ♠9 which lost to the jack. East got off lead with a club and declarer now hoped that the club suit would break and give him nine tricks but it was not to be and now declarer only had eight tricks and finished one off. Eleven IMPs to EGYJOR

I very much liked the auction, it is never easy to play in the fourth suit. When South led a club declarer took care of the contract by immediately ruffing a club in dummy and then taking three rounds of trumps. Ruffing the club cost an overtrick but the contract was guaranteed against a 4-2 club split and a 4-1 trump split – good safety.

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

West did well to realise the potential of the hand after partner's raise to game. North led a spade taken in dummy with the ace. The ♥K was led from dummy and North took the ace and continued with another spade ruffed in hand. Trumps were drawn in two rounds and then declarer went about determining the distribution. He played three rounds of clubs ruffing the third. He now had a count on eleven of South's cards, the question was now what was South's most likely holdings in the minor suits. He had another slight clue in that neither player had echoed in the club suit. Was South 3-2 or 4-1. There probably is not much in it mathematically but 3-2 looks more likely and so declarer played for that and so brought home the slam

We had had a session with five slams of which WASO had the upper hand but at the end it was EGYJOR who had one, again narrowly, 42-33. Over the two sessions we had had some interesting boards with plenty of scope for excitement, in fact only three of all the deals were flat.
