On October 12-17, we are holding a regional tournament at the Marina del Rey Hotel in Marina del Rey. The playing areas have views of the harbor with all the boats in their slips. This year, our fall regional occurs opposite the World Championships going on in Philadelphia. Frankly, it is cheaper and the weather is much nicer in Marina del Rey. Come and stay at the hotel and you will receive a free play for each room night that you stay. Evening games are half-price.

Next spring, our district is sponsoring a Regional-at-Sea aboard the Sapphire Princess. For anyone who has taken a Princess cruise, you know what a treat it is. The cruise goes down to the Mexican Riviera starting on April 30. Daily beginner lectures by our own **Ellen Kent** and more advanced lectures

What Else Took Place in New Orleans

Last month I highlighted what I thought were the most important items passed by the board. I hope all of our units have taken the time to submit their sanctions for their Sectional Tournaments for 2011 and 2012... and maybe even 2013 if your unit is very efficient.

Following are some of the other highlights from our summer meeting.

- Membership for the first half of 2010 saw a gain of 250 members. June 2010 membership vs. June 2009 is 4,957 greater.
- Tournaments: Regionals are averaging more than 1,600 tables per tournament. Sectionals are averaging 176 tables per sectional.
- Three long time employees of the ACBL have retired: Gary Blaiss, Merrell Branan, and Rena Hetzer. I did have an opportunity to work with all of these people and they will be missed. Some employees who have been promoted include Wendy Sullivan, NABC Planner; Dana Norton, Educational Program Coordinator; and Patricia Glover, Director of Budgets and Internal Audit.
- Radio Ads for Clubs & Teachers have been developed targeting "baby boomers" and "empty nesters." These ads can be used for local advertising and the cost will qualify for reimbursement per the Cooperative Advertisement program guidelines.
- Marketing of Bridge: This past April, ACBL was present at the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics and in September was present at the AARP convention.

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Referencing bidding practices, the board passed a motion eliminating the requirement to pre-alert short (5-card weak 2s and 6-card 3-level major suit) pre-empts and/or undisciplined (less than Q high) pre-empts. The pre-alert is now replaced with an alert upon occurrence. All 6-card 3-level minor suit pre-empts are not alertable.

A change was made to the General Conditions of Contest in that “unless instructed otherwise by a tournament director, a member of each side must be present and seated before cards are removed from a board.”

A change to the conditions of contest for STaC games is that for a pair to be eligible for overall awards

the minimum number of boards that must be played is 20 (changed from 18).

The board created a new national event of the Senior Mixed Pairs. It will be held at the Fall NABC and will award 80 platinum points to the winner.

Finally, the board discussed in length the problem of slow play at NABC KO events. A motion was deferred to the fall meeting, but it is very likely that some action will be taken. It is my guess that once slow play is addressed at national events, there will be a trickledown effect that can be adopted by the districts.

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card majors, light openings, a weak 1NT (12-14) and Strong Twos. They also use two clubs as an artificial strong bid, but other two-level openings are also strong, but perhaps as much as two tricks lighter. ACOL's one level openings, by agreement, can often be lighter than other systems. Would you open at the one-level with 9 points if you had a decent rebidable suit? That's a very popular method in the ACOL system, and four card majors are common. Maybe I should be glad I didn't have to play against a roomful of players using this system!

Unless you sign a pledge to attend and vote for the new unit board, a sound truck will be dispatched to your home to blare campaign promises of the various candidates into your living room at 125 decibels. We estimate it should take less than 15 minutes to bludgeon the average member into submission (those wearing hearing aids may take a little longer). So be warned. Unit secretary Clint Lew will be coming around checking the membership roster. See you at the meeting.

Of course, some clever folks have figured out ways to avoid our annual shindig. Ted Kelly carried things to an extreme, in my humble opinion. He moved to Rancho Bernardo, far out of our unit jurisdiction! Others just skedaddled out of town for extended vacations. Our two hands of the month are a kind of personality test. Are you an optimist or a pessimist?

A) You hold: ♠x ♥Jxxxx ♦AKx ♣JTxx (Vul/NV)

The auction goes: Pass (you) - 3♠ (LHO) - 4♥ (pard) - Pass - back to you. Your action?

B) You hold: ♠KTx ♥Axxx ♦xx ♣Axxx (NV/NV)

The auction goes: 1♦ (11-16 HCP, may be short in diamonds) by pard - 1♥ overcall - 1NT by you - pass (LHO) - 2♠ (pard) - pass (RHO) - 2NT (you) - pass - 3♠! (pard).

Two questions- What do you think pard's hand is? What is your next action? In both cases, if you don't push toward slam, you are indeed a pessimist.

On hand 1, pard must have a fine hand for a vulnerable 4-level overcall. At least give him a 5♦ Q-bid to encourage him to bid 6 with the right hand. He will bid the cold 6♥. Ironically, the preemptor's partner will now take the 6♠ sacrifice which only goes off 500, giving you a bad board. You lose to all the chickens who passed 4♥. Life isn't fair.

On hand 2, what hand can a limited 1♦ opener possibly have to justify his bidding? It would seem that ♠QJ9xx ♥x ♦AKQxxx ♣x would be the least you should expect, so if you didn't push to slam you are indeed a pessimist of the first order. (He actually held ♠QJ9xx ♥x ♦AKQJxx ♣x.) Both 6♠ and 6♦ roll. Whether you used Blackwood, Q-bids, or just blasted, you should get to slam. Til next time...

A Hand Played with My Favorite Martino

In an Irvine Regional KO with Margie Michelin and Ellis Feigenbaum

Our N/S bid this close slam, South bidding 1-more diamond at each turn. Do you like our auction?

Our North's hand seemed to get better each time South rebid diamonds even with his mere 11 HCP, regardless of a probably wasted heart value. So over 3♦, Nick cue-bid 4♣ on the way to 5♦ due to his great clubs and a spade void. Now when our South rebid diamonds (again), North raised to 5♦, completing his hand description. Our South pondered North's bidding for a while and then he bid diamonds *one more time* – 6♦, expecting North to hold something similar to what he actually held. Diamonds behaved, so 13 tricks were made on a spade lead.

Roeder: 2♣. If it goes 2♥-pass-pass to me, I will bid 2NT to get diamonds in play.

Itabashi: 2♣. 2NT might wrong side 3NT. I hope partner bids 2NT.

Goldsmith: 2♣. Game is still possible (♠xxxx ♥Kxx ♦xxx ♣AQx), and 2♣ focuses on what we need for game. If I were willing to give up on game, I'd bid 2NT; those diamonds look like a 5-card suit. Our chances of finding game, however, after that start are small. But 2NT is a big winner vs. ♠Ax ♥xxxx ♦Jxxxxxx ♣---.

Jones: Pass. I have 15 HCP, but no bid I like. I might be back in later, depending on the auction. If I pass, I will likely end up on opening lead. If you made me bid, I'd pick 2NT. Maybe I like defending too much.

Wittes: 2NT. I'd like to be 5-5 for this, but my 4-card suit is very good, and it may be awkward or impossible to back into the auction later.

I was kibitzing Zia, in an online IMPs game. I was taken aback when he bid 2♣. I did not think that the risk/reward ratio was good enough to bid on such a weak suit at the two-level. With my usual luck, it would go 2♣ - 2NT - pass - 3NT with the opponents' holding ♠Jxx ♥xx ♦Jxxx ♣AQJx opposite ♠Qxx ♥AKQJxx ♦xx ♣xx.

Roeder: 2♠. 3♣ is acceptable but is the low road. I pick the high road, because my hand has improved at nearly every call. The opponents' diamond bidding suggests that this might be a 30-HCP deck.

Wittes: Double (support). If partner bids 2♥, I will bid 3♣ to show I have a good club suit and better than a minimum hand. If partner bids 2♠, I will bid 3♦.

Jones: Double (support). I'll show the 3-card heart support, but I'm not done. I'll do something thereafter to show extras. If partner bids 2♥, then I'll bid 3♣. I was tempted to lie about my heart holding and raise to 2♥. The hearts are good enough, but the overall hand is too strong to make only a minimum rebid.

Itabashi: Double (support). I play support doubles with most partners, but if not playing them 3♣ becomes a more attractive bid. I may still get to show 3-card heart support if the auction continues.

Goldsmith: Double (support). If the choices were between a support double and 2♥, I'd pick 2♥. Why tempt partner to pass 2♦ doubled? Plus I would like partner to compete to the 3-level. 2♥ doesn't do justice to the hand, however, and double is unlimited. If, by some miracle, we get the rest of the auction to ourselves, and partner bids just 2♥, I can continue with 3♣, which should give partner a pretty good picture of my hand.

3♣ now is terrible; in a competitive auction, supporting

partner with support is a huge priority. 2♠ is wrong; even if we have a 4-4 spade fit, partner will have at least five hearts, and even with 4-5, if his spades were good, he would have started with a negative double. A jump to 3♥ is about right on values, but it might get us to the wrong strain, and the point of support doubles is to solve that problem, so why not use one? Playing with someone who'd pass a double with ♠Axx ♥Axxx ♦Jxx ♣xxx, I'd take the low road and bid 2♥, figuring that I'll probably get to bid again.

I don't play support doubles, because most partners use them on any hand with three hearts. If I had ♠KTx ♥Qxx ♦Kxx ♣KJxx (which has not improved on the auction!), I would happily pass 2♠, but if partner thinks I've denied three hearts, our subsequent bidding or defense may go poorly. I think support doubles ought to be made only when you want to raise your partner with three-card support. I think 3♣ is clear on the problem hand. While I would love to show my strong 3-card support immediately, my best feature is my 6-trick suit. Most importantly, however, if I bid 3♣, I expect West to bid 3♦, and then I can bid 3♥. I like that plan.

Roeder: Double. Seems clear. I am happy to defend 3♦, don't have spade support, and do not have good enough hearts to bid 3NT. The double implies club length, because it is unlikely I have a "diamonds and diamonds only" hand on the auction.

Jones: Double. This is a penalty double. I have way too much to pass. If East had passed, I would have tried 2NT and hoped that partner had some heart help. Once East bids 3♦, however, 3NT seems like a bad bet. 3♦ is almost certain to go down and might occasionally even go for more than the value of a game we might or might not have. I won't be terribly surprised to hear East run to 3♥. When that happens, I shall pass and let partner decide what to do.

Itabashi: Double. Any other bid is a gamble. If forced to pick a second choice, I would try 3NT.

Goldsmith: Double. If 3♦ is psychic, this seems like a good start. If it's not, partner will pull to spades, and I'll expect that his suit (if maybe not his hand) should be good enough to have a shot at game.

Wittes: Double. I expect the 3♦ bidder to retreat to 3♥, over which I will pass. Partner should play me for some values, since I wouldn't double 3♦ with only a diamond stack.

As Jon points out, I wouldn't double 3♦ with nothing but a diamond stack, so if I pass a return to 3♥, I think partner will be able to work out that I have clubs, too. That's good, but I think I can do better. I bid 3NT! If 3♦ is not a psych, partner rates to have a high heart honor, so 3NT ought to play well. If it is a psych with heart support, I'll probably get a diamond lead, and I think I can probably make 3NT without a heart lead.

Itabashi: 4♠. I would like to know if we are playing support doubles. If so, then partner probably has only two hearts, and I would bid only 4♥. If I bid 4♠, partner will envision a better trump suit than what I have, since he knows I'm playing him for two hearts. If we are not playing support doubles, then partner is looking for spade control, and I feel obliged to show it.

Wittes: 4♠. 4♦ is a big bid, so I suspect my free 3♥ bid turned partner on. I expect something like ♠xxx ♥AJx ♦-- ♣AKQxxxx. Although not quite that good, this might even be the companion hand to problem #2, in which case 4♠ is still a good bid, and 6♥ is not an unreasonable contract.

Roeder: 4♠. This is the companion hand to #2, no doubt. See my comment about getting excited in 30-HCP deck situations. I understand the counterargument that partner bid only a nonforcing 3♣. Perhaps I am unduly influenced by the hand in #2. And, yes, I am a sinner. After all, I love SEC football, where the conference motto is "if you aren't cheating, you aren't trying."

Goldsmith: 4♥. This is obviously the companion hand to #2. There is no way for South to expect such good heart support from a hand which failed to raise immediately, so slam is history. Sometimes you just can't recover from an earlier blunder, but even

without one, finding 22-HCP perfecto slams is not an exact science.

Jones: 4♥. Partner's surprising and creative action is an effort to let me know that slam might be possible despite each of us having made nonforcing part score bids. What type of hand is consistent with his sequence? Something close to ♠xxxx ♥AK ♦x ♣AKJxxx. Note that if I had the ♥J instead of a small one, 6♥ would be a better bet.

Yes, this is the companion to Problem 2. Those who play straitjacket support doubles (so 3♣ denied three hearts) know their partner cannot have a hand that makes a good slam. Kudos to those who bid 4♠!

[Jones, Problem Solvers Panel Editor] Problems 2 and 4 are valid problems in their own rights, but in combination, they are not sufficient to determine if NS can reach slam. In Problem 4, opener rebid 3♣. When the North hand was presented to the panel in Problem 2, every panelist thought it was too strong for that, so those who bid more than 4♥ in Problem 4 are expecting a hand different from the South hand in Problem 2. (...except for Rick, who admits he has a wire!) David is correct about the point that partnerships who play support doubles ought to have an understanding about whether a support double is mandatory with three-card support, and if not, what criteria must hold for opener not to double.

What do you bid?

Jones: 2♠. I don't want to get terribly frisky at this vulnerability without a singleton or void. If I had a weak 3♠ available, I would use it.

Goldsmith: 1NT. That gives me the best chance to buy the hand low. West will probably double. If partner bids 2♠ or 2♣, I'll jump to 4♠, figuring that the opponents can probably make 4♥, and we'll be down one. If he bids a red suit, I'll only compete to the 3-level at most.

Roeder: 1NT. You will not find this bid in any bridge book, but I am pretty sure it is the percentage bid. The vulnerability and form of scoring is wrong for an immediate 4♠. At this vulnerability, the target for 4♠ to be successful is narrower than Calista Flockhart's waist – a 1-trick save against their making 4♥? And what if partner has a really good hand? It will be no fun putting down this dummy in 5♠. While 2♠ is much better than 4♠, there are still too many scenarios where we are needlessly heading to Minusville. 1NT will keep our big fit a secret to the opponents and will make it tough for them to bid a game. And if partner goes crazy, I will simply correct to spades.

Itabashi: 2♠. Even though this is supposed to be semi-constructive, the 10-card fit and preemptive value of the simple raise makes it an easy choice.

Wittes: 3♠ (preemptive). I play modified Bergen Raises, so 3♠ is automatic on this hand.

This is a hand for tactics. At this vulnerability, it is easy for the opponents to bid if they know we have a fit and we know that they probably can make anything they bid. A forcing NT is the hardest bid for the opponents to bid over in this type of big fit hand.

I fell from grace on this hand. I bid 1NT, pass, partner bid 2♥, I bid 2♠ (so far perfect). Then West doubled, and East bid 3♦. I got greedy and bid 3♠. West bid 3NT with ♠AQ8 ♥—♦AKxxx ♣AKxxx. Would they have reached game in any case? Perhaps, but I felt I had goaded them into it. When partner did not double (solid hearts?) I bid 4♠. Down two, doubled of course. Side question, would you have bid 3♥ with ♠KTxxx ♥AKQxx ♦x ♣Jx over the double of two spades?

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
