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MP Inflation: Fact or Fiction?

There has been substantial discussion on the national level (and below) if due to the greater awards of masterpoints, less seasoned players are advancing to higher brackets or strats before they are ready. I welcome your thoughts on this subject and I will be asking

the ALACBU board at our October meeting to discuss this issue. The following are the recent developments.

The immediate questions that are raised include: 1) For large Gold Rush games, are the masterpoint awards too high and 2) Is the "X" flight of an AX flight an appropriate amount of masterpoints when compared to the Gold Rush awards? A brief history.

Many, many years ago, there was only one game to play in, namely an Open Flight. Then to encourage less experienced players to participate in ACBL events without the "expert" competition, flights, stratifications, seniors, day light, and gold rush events were created. As time passed, the masterpoint formulas that were in effect before stratification have become outdated. The national board is undertaking a review of the formulas.

Some of the things the board has done were to raise the masterpoint requirement for life master from 300 to 500. The other categories have also been raised. In Atlanta, the board also voted to raise the masterpoint limit for Flight B of the North American Pairs to 2500 starting with the 2014-2015 cycle. The flights for the Grand National Teams have been raised as follows: Flight C: non-LM-500 MP, Flight B: 0-2500 MP, Flight A 0-6000 MP, and Championship Flight: 0-unlimited. These ranges will be effective for the 2013/2014 cycle.

Finally, a change was made in the Red Ribbon eligibility raising the range to pairs who have fewer than 2500 master points. The motion to include players with fewer than 2000 master points in the Micro-Spingold NABC knockout Teams was deferred to Phoenix for further discussion.

Some thoughts on the Balancing Notrump bid by Roy Wilson

Many players agree that after an opening bid by the opponents and two passes a notrump bid in the balancing seat does not promise full values. Most players agree that it shows about 10-13 points and a hand unsuitable for a double. I asked a number of good players what their agreement is for subsequent bidding about a hand such as this after the player in first seat opened 1♠ and the other two players passed: ♠Qxx ♥Kx ♠AJxx ♣Qxxx.

This is a typical hand for a balancing notrump call. You can't double because your partner will expect heart support, but you don't want to pass, either. The question though, is this: What does your partner's next bid mean? The majority of players seem to prefer to play Stayman and Jacoby transfers, but a smaller number prefer to play natural calls and use a cue bid as Stayman. The reason given is that there are three remaining suits and if you use both Stayman and Transfer bids you can only play one of those three suits at the two level. Wouldn't you like to play in two diamonds if you partner has this hand: $\triangle xxx$ $\forall Jxx$ $\bigstar Kxxxx$ $\bigstar Kx$?

You probably should assume your partner prefers Stayman and Transfers until you talk to him or her about your agreements.

Once again, we have sad news to report. Long time Unit 551 member, fine player, and all around Character, Lary Alba (that IS Lary-with-one-r) passed away, after a long illness, on September 9. To give you some idea, Lary's nickname on the Bridge Base was ... the Albatross. (Hopefully you got that faster than Your Somewhat Slow Correspondent.) Lary was famous ... or should we say, infamous ... for his partnership with Scott Samarel, and their "Scary Club" bidding system. (Think about it ... you'll get that joke, too.) With 8-point openers in first and second seat, it was a rare hand indeed that was passed out. The system could really bollix the opponents... until they caught on. One memorable evening, Scott and Lary were competing in spades

against the opponents' clubs. The auction reached 3♠ (neither side vulnerable) when Lary's LHO decided he had had enough and pulled the red card. 1100 later, Scott remarked to Lary, "Maybe we should have let them play 3♣ ..."

Our hand of the month this time is nothing too unusual, at first sight. As dealer, you pick up the following collection: ♠AKTxx ♥AKxxxx ♠x ♠x . "Only" 14 points. Look again, Walter (the Walrus, that is). A sniff of a fit in either major and this hand has ENORMOUS playing strength. So you open (I hope) 1♥, not 1♠, with big plans for the future.

Partner calls 24, not game forcing. The opponents obligingly remain silent. Now what?

I certainly hope you've read Eddie Kantar's book, A Treasury of Bridge Tips (540 Bidding Tips to Improve Your Partner's Game). Check out tip #165, which says: "After a two level response, a reverse can be made with as few as 15 HCP." (The italics are Mr. Kantar's by the way.)

Certainly this hand is worth 2♠, which you duly call. Partner's bid is 3NT. And the ball is back in your court.

The indicated call is ... 4♥, of course. The communications in 3NT are going to be just awful, especially after the expected diamond lead. (Singletons in three suits! Ewwww.) 4♥ was passed out, and dummy flopped with: ♠ x ♥Qx ◆AQxxx ♣ QJTxx.

With some luck you would make 9 tricks in notrump, but unless you manage to revoke, there are eleven tricks in hearts. (Spades are 4-3, but even if they are 5-2, you have 10 tricks. Where was the ◆K? Offside, of course, which you knew when the opening lead was the ◆9.) Oddly enough, only one pair got to

4♥. 3NT failed miserably, as did **4♠** in the 5-1 fit.

The lesson here is Man (or Woman) Does Not Live by Points Alone. Marty Bergen has expressed this more eloquently, of course, but we do try to keep the plagiarism down to an absolute minimum. (Of course, plagiarism from three or more sources can be called "research" ...)

While I am sure the "oops" was not an intention to lead declarer astray, Mike decided that LHO really meant to trump and decided not to finesse for the trump queen since LHO already had shown up with one singleton. Well it was right to finesse and Mike went down one. Mike, being a director himself, knew that any ruling about the "oops" comment would be that if declarer takes a different action than he would have after the "oops" comment, he does so at his own risk. However Mike's RHO understood why Mike had gone wrong. Since the board had not been played at the other table he told us to forget the board and redeal it. A classy act to be sure. The RHO was Val Kovachev, who recently won an NABC championship in Atlanta.

Test Your Defense

After overcalling spades and then raising partner's heart bid, you double RHO's 3NT bid, only to see them run to 5♣. Your hand is: ♠Q7632 ♥JT72 ♦A8 ♣A8.

Naturally, you lead the heart jack. Dummy comes down with: ♠K985 ♥5 ♦KQT43 ♣J53.

Declarer wins the heart ace and trumps a heart in dummy, then leads a club to the 10. You decide to win with the ace and exit your last club, partner discarding a heart. Declarer then leads a diamond toward the board.

Have you decided yet what you're going to do? If you're a habitual counter, the decision is easy. Declarer has 6 club tricks, the heart ace and a heart ruff, and surely also has at least Ax of spades (declarer needs the ace for his NT bid and if it were stiff, he would have unblocked it before crossing to dummy with a heart ruff. Declarer also can't be prevented from scoring at least 1 diamond trick, for a total of 11, so you may as well grab the ace.

What happens if you don't? One defender found out the hard way. After the diamond king held, declarer returned to the spade ace and then ran all his trump, coming down to 2 cards. With you discarding in front of dummy, dummy retains the diamond queen and the K9 of spades. Would you rather discard the diamond ace to establish dummy's queen or come down to one spade to establish dummy's long spade? Making 6, however, proved to be a poor board for declarer. Two pairs managed to take 11 tricks in 3NT when the defense


This tournament held its major events at 1:00 p.m. and 7:00



DUNITZ: 4NT. Quantitative invite.

GOLDSMITH: 5♥. We should have the values for slam, so I'll just check for diamond control. If I bid 4♦ and later bid 5♥, partner should play me for a diamond control, and since I don't plan to pass 4♥, I can't start with 4♦.

JONES: 4♠. I can envision hands opposite with which a grand is cold (♠QJx ♥Ax ♠Axx ♠Kxxxx) or a small slam is hopeless (♠QJx ♥Ax ♠QJT9 ♠KQJT). I'll reverse into spades, but won't drive to slam. If partner bids 4NT (signoff), I'll pass. If partner bids 5♠ or 5♠, I'll bid 5♥, which is passable.

MEYERSON: 4♦. This is the clearest slam try. I want to play 6♥ opposite a doubleton rather than 6♠ opposite four weak ones.

WITTES: 4. Partner could have a minimum and we may be in grand territory, for example, a hand with the ♠Q, ♥A and ♠AQ. I'm a little worried about a diamond ruff if we play in hearts and partner has secondary rather than primary cards in diamonds. If partner bids 4♥ over 4♠, I can keycard. If partner shows the ♠A, I'll investigate a grand. If not, I'll play 6NT.

Partner's 3NT spans a fairly wide range of hands, so it seems as if a slam try is in order. I opt for natural 4.

DUNITZ: Pass. Too old to rock n' roll. [As Mick Jagger has proven, one is never too old.]

GOLDSMITH: Pass. Marshall Miles would have raised and not understood why partner couldn't figure out to give him a spade ruff. I think you just can't mess around when partner has opened a white on red weak two bid. Just hope he's already done enough damage and don't bury him.

JONES: Pass. This hand is eerily similar to the hand from the 2004 Senior Trials where responder raised with a singleton queen, only to hear "double, all pass" for -1400 against just a game the other way. Yes, I want a spade lead, but I'm not offering a huge number only to find partner reluctant to lead away from AQ anyway.

MEYERSON: Pass.

WITTES: Pass. I know the vulnerability cries for me to take some action, as the opponents definitely have a game and quite possibly a slam, but without a fit

for partner, bidding is fraught with peril, especially if trumps are breaking poorly. If I bid, and the opponents elect to defend, we are going for a minimum of 800, possibly as much as 1400. If they have a slam and are able to bid it, that's no disaster. They are probably on a combined 25 to 29 points, so even if a slam is makeable, it might not be that easy to bid. If they weren't bidding the slam, or if partner has enough to beat it (maybe two spades cash!), then going for a number will be a disaster.

I agree that it's risky to bid 34, but isn't it worth it? Unless your partner tends to open weak two bids with Jxxxxx, [White on red in first seat, don't you open 24 with Jxxxxx all the time? Don't you open on a 5-card suit pretty regularly? - Jones, editor] it seems unlikely the opponents can double for penalty, so why not take away an entire level of bidding? Also, won't an opponent holding three or four spades count on his partner's spade shortness?

You, South, hold: ◆AKJ96 ♥75 ◆3 ◆KQJT8 What call do you make?

DUNITZ: 2♠. (If forcing.) I play it is NF and constructive in most partnerships. In those partnerships, my choices are 2♥ planning to bid 3♠ over partner's 2NT or 3♠, or to jump directly to 3♠, which is not normally just a five-card suit. I don't hate the latter choice, but a small percentage of the time, partner will bid 3♣ after I cue bid, and that will make my tail wag. So I cue.

GOLDSMITH: 3♣. This is slightly skewed, but I'm planning to rebid 3♠ and 4♠. Bidding the normal 2♠ will usually get me 3♠, and then 4♠ is a little high. If partner was about to rebid 2NT, I did the wrong thing.

JONES: 2♠. Great if it's forcing and still probably the best bid if it's not.

MEYERSON: 2♠. In some partnerships, I play 2♥ as a spade transfer here; otherwise I play 2♠ is forcing opposite a two-level overcall.

WITTES: 2. I don't even know that this is 100% forcing, but it should be forward-going. If partner does not support spades, I will bid clubs at my next opportunity. That should be forcing.

The key here is whether $2 \triangleq$ is forcing. Those who believe it is not are willing to risk a pass by partner. A cue bid works fine if it doesn't guarantee diamond support. I like Jeff's approach: Start with a forcing $3 \triangleq$ and then bid and rebid spades.

DUNITZ: Double. Double shows values and no clear action.

GOLDSMITH: Double. I have enough convertible values that if partner bids, I'm happy, and if he passes, we'll probably beat them. We are not in a force.

JONES: Pass. If forcing, otherwise 5♥. Mike Pudlin and I had the agreement that this was forcing. Pass isn't forcing in my other partnerships, but I think it ought to be. 5♥ is reasonable and partner might occasionally bid 6♥. It's my preference to play responsive doubles here, and double is reasonable if it's responsive.

MEYERSON: Double. Takeout / card-showing.

WITTES: 5. With a perfect hand from partner, we could have a slam, but that's asking for a lot. We could also be going down at the five-level. Even that's not necessarily bad; maybe the opponents are making 4♠.

Double seems normal here, but I like 5. It tells partner about my heart fit, and avoids partner having a decision over a double.

DUNITZ: 3. Showing 4 hearts and a minimum, assuming that 2NT is not game forcing (my preferred method). If 2NT is a game force, then 3NT seems clear.

GOLDSMITH: 3NT. I think this is just enough to accept: 13 HCP, two tens and a 98. (K&R = 12.70, and it hates 4-3-3-3 shape. [K & R is the Kaplan and Rubens hand evaluator, developed by Edgar Kaplan and Jeff Rubens. See http://www.jeff-goldsmith.org/cgi-bin/knr.cgi]. As for strain, if I'm 4-3-3-3, and partner suggests notrump, then notrump it is. It wouldn't surprise me if each of 3NT and 3♥ were down one, but I think 2NT is forcing, so I might as well play a contract with an upside.

JONES: Pass. This is somewhat a stylistic problem,

but for me 4-3-3-3 13 HCP openers should be considered minimum hands. I hate 4-3-3-3 distribution and frequently pass 4-3-3-3 12 HCP hands. I like the connected club honors and the two ten-spots, but for me this is a minimum. If I were playing Spiral (also known as 3-3-4-4) or Robinson (a slightly better but more complicated method), then 2NT is forcing, and I will bid 3, although I dislike returning to hearts without a ruffing value.

MEYERSON: 3NT. Usually the place to play with 3=4=3=3.

WITTES: 3NT. I have no ruffing values and a hand well suited for no trump. If partner is suggesting a no trump game, I have no reason to disagree.
