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CEO Update Recap

I have reviewed the most recent CEO Update and the ACBL continues to prosper. Following are some of the issues discussed.

Financial Update

Through April the increase in Net Assets from Operations total \$87,305 which is \$66,807 higher than the same period last year. Savings from switching insurance carriers contributed to this increase and there are expectations of additional savings by switching to Braintree for credit card processing.

Membership Update

At the end of March, membership was at 167,191. New members are joining at approximately 1,000 per month. The League is focusing on retention of membership as an additional growth factor.

ACBLscore+

The Management Technology Committee has completed their review of the product delivered by Hammond Software. The committee has decided to use an in-house team to finish the ACBLscore+ with code from Hammond Software. Mitch Hodus has been hired as the new CIO of the ACBL and he will be the project manager for ACBLscore+. Mitch's background includes Senior Vice President of Vining Sparks, a local investment brokerage house where he was Senior Vice President of Information Technology and Senior Director of Technology for Harrah's Entertainment. The hiring of Mr. Hodus was unanimously endorsed by the three outside experts sitting on the MTC.

Bill Schreiber: Tax return preparation.



Beat the House Night: Friday, June 19 7:15

Winners and Losers: Sunday, June 21 and 29 at 1:00

Partner, in 1st or 2nd seat, opens 1♠. You hold ♠K10xx ♥x ♦AQ10xx ♣Axx. Your conventions, after a major suit opening by partner, include Jacoby 2NT; Splinters; and 2 over 1 Game Forcing. What to bid? The splinter bid probably gives your partner the most information with one bid... but it's very expensive, using up four levels of bidding. Jacoby 2NT, also game forcing, uses up less bidding space and shows a spade fit with 4 pieces. 2♦, also game force, postpones showing the spade fit until your next bid, and may effectively put you in control of the auction, particularly if partner supports you in diamonds. What to bid? My choice would be 2♦. There are a host of 12-14 point hands that opener could hold that would yield 12 tricks, particularly when he has a diamond fit with you, and now you have lots and lots of bidding room to explore the possibility of slam. For example:

A. ♠AQ9xx ♥xxx ♦KJx ♣Qx 12 pts

B. ♠AQ9xx ♥xx ♦Kxxx ♣Kx 12 pts

C. ♠AJxxxx ♥Kxx ♦Kxx ♣x 11 pts

So slow the pace....it's not a race.

For our hand-of-the month, we have a little lesson in hand evaluation. Playing Standard, second to speak at unfavorable vulnerability, you find yourself looking at:

♠AKJT98 ♥4 ♦-- ♣ T97432

RHO passes, and it's your turn. Well? Your choices seem to be 1♠, 2♠, 4♠, or (shudder) pass. Made up your mind yet? Read on ...

Please don't tell me you didn't open 1♠. Whatever you do, even (shudder) passing, will get you as far as 4♠. That's not good enough, though. Over 2♠, partner will raise to game. What partner does over 4♠ is probably a matter of partnership style, and which way the wind is blowing. Partner will respond to a 1♠ opening with 2NT (a forcing spade raise, promising 4 trumps by agreement, not to mention being correct). You show your diamond shortness, partner will come back with Blackwood, you show two key cards, and you wind up in 6♠. It's nearly a laydown, because partner puts down ♠Q742 ♥AK ♦T7532 ♣AJ.

The opening lead is a diamond, which you →

ruff. You plan to ruff three clubs in dummy, after drawing only one round of trump (probably using it as an entry to your hand to ruff one of the clubs). One club goes on a heart honor, and you lose one club. When you get around to playing the clubs, they turn out to be 3-2 with the queen doubleton anyway, so no problem. A nicely bid slam on only 22 HCP. Of course, Walter the Walrus counts your hand at 8 points, but with that wild distribution it's more like 12 (for conservatives) or 15. And who is to say you don't actually belong in clubs? After all, if partner has a club suit, it's going to consist mostly of big ones, since you have all the midgets!

GUV Memorial Award

Well lets take a vote on who's the biggest screwup on this one. A couple maniacal opponents wound up in 6NT after the auction: 1♣ - 1♠ - 1NT - 2♦ - 2NT - 3♠ →

- 3NT - 6NT. Opening leaders only assets were ♦Qxxx and ♣ATxx. Her partner's only assets were ♠KJ tight and out. It takes a club lead to beat 6NT. The good news is that the opening leader led a club. The bad news is that they led their fourth best club instead of the ace. Her naive partner assumed that no one in their right mind would underlead an ace against 6NT. He decided to do a discovery play by playing the ♣J to see who had the queen. Of course declarer now gave a big smile and proceeded to take 13 tricks.

Articles have been written about the brilliance of underleading an ace against a slam on hands with particular auctions. However this lead definitely will not rank among the brilliant all-time slam opening leads. So, who was the biggest screwup, opening leader or her partner?

Make your plans now for October 4 at Barrington, when we host the ABA.

Coming Soon

Qualifying has begun for the North American Pairs. Make sure you play (and qualify in) at least one qualifying game between now and the end of August to continue on in this grass roots event. In addition to Flight A for open players, there is a Flight B event limited to 2500 master points and a Flight C event restricted to non-Life Masters with fewer than 500 points. The bottom line is that this is a chance to win a nice healthy check to Reno (site of the 2016 Spring North American

Championships) by playing against your peers, so keep hope alive by finding and playing in a qualifying game.

Also on the agenda, Bridge Week returns to its roots in Pasadena. I hope you've made plans to play in the granddaddy of them all (among bridge tournaments, of course). If not, grab a partner or use the wonderful Partnership Desk. The tournament begins with a Pro-Am game July 6 and runs through July 12.

There will be plenty more tournament action available in July. The Summer Great Western STAC begins as soon as Bridge Week ends. This tournament is a great opportunity to pick up silver points at your local club, and a big game (or, as Aram Bedros puts it, a normal day at the office) could result in winning more than 20 points for a single session. Neighboring Units are also hosting sectionals later in the month.

Criss-Cross

I've always had a fondness for the criss-cross squeeze, perhaps because the very first squeeze I ever deliberately ran was of the criss-cross variety. Here's an example in action.

After an unremarkable auction of 1♣-1♠, 1NT, you play the following hand:

Dummy: ♠Q965 ♥64 ♦KQ932 ♣K8
Declarer: ♠A72 ♥J97 ♦A64 ♣AT75

The defense begins with four rounds of hearts, ending on your left, as you pitch spades from each hand. Lefty then shifts to a low club, which goes to the queen and ace. Can you take the rest of the tricks?

With some luck and good card reading, you can. You carefully start the diamonds by leading to the K and back to your A. Your care is rewarded when righty shows up with the stiff J, so you finesse the 9 to pick up the whole diamond suit. You discard another spade and a club on the run of the diamonds, leaving the following end position:

Dummy: ♠Q9 ♥- ♦- ♣K
Declarer: ♠A ♥- ♦- ♣T7

If lefty has both the ♣J and the ♠K, he's got a problem because he can only keep three cards. After squirming a while, he discards a low spade.

What happens next is the key feature of the criss-cross squeeze. You have to cash your winners in the →

right order or you'll end up stranded in the wrong hand. After a criss-cross squeeze, you have to begin by cashing your winner in the suit the squeeze victim has stripped. In this case, if you believe lefty's table presence, he's bared the spade king, so you lead a spade to the ace, dropping it, criss-cross back to the board with the club king, and cash the now-established spade queen.

What call do you make?

Bare: 2NT. Pass is an option, but partner is likely to have a singleton and a 5 card club suit. With 4-4 in the minors, I open 1♦.

Swanson: 2NT. Partner is confirming an opening bid and showing short hearts with spade tolerance. Sometimes his defense is not up to snuff. But if someone wants to speculate by passing I don't strongly object.

Kantar: 3♣. Not quite enough to pass. Partner is a favorite to have five clubs. With 4-1-4-4 presumably, he would have opened 1♦.

Lee: 3♣, though I prefer to play Lebensohl on this auction.

Wittes: 3♣. It's tempting to pass with my good heart texture, but I have little else to offer, and I hate more than anything else in bridge to bring back a -670 at imps.

Goldsmith: Pass and lead the ♠T. Let's construct some hands for partner:

- a) ♠KQxx ♥x ♦Axx ♣KQJxx
- b) ♠AJxx ♥x ♦KJx ♣AKxxx
- c) ♠KQJx ♥xx ♦Kxx ♣AKQx

[These hands have a little more than the minimum for

reopening with a double at the 2-level.]

Looks like 2♥ rates to go down 1 most of the time, 2 some of the time. It'll make once in a while. Nothing rates to be cold our way. Passing looks pretty clear. I'll lead the ♠T, because partner rates to have spade honors which need leading up to, and that will also generate entries to my hand for later leads through dummy.

Shuster: Pass. Knowing how likely partner would be to open 1♦ with 4-5 in the minors is very relevant to our expected degree of fit. Still, I expect that 9 tricks in a minor is a more difficult goal than six tricks in hearts. I'm aware that -670 is a live possibility, but then again, so is -500 or more at the 3-level.

This hand was played in the Thursday night Caltech team game. My partner, Matt Klimish, bid 3♣. I held a 4=2=2=5 hand with ♥Jx and a little extra, but against a 4-1 break the hand played poorly. I was down two, and might have been defeated three tricks. Yichi Zhang held Matt's hand at the other table and passed the double for +500 and a 12 IMP win. Matt asked me what I would have done, and I told him 3♣, but I've changed my mind and think pass is right. It's close though, on the actual hand partner had honor doubleton and that won't happen often.

This hand is right out of the textbook under "Preempts work!" Several panelists try 4♦. The ♦Q is likely wasted, and we only have two spades, but still the hand is awfully strong to bid only 3NT or 4♠. If we bid 4♦ and pass 4♠, then that is OK. But if we bid on partner will think we have better spade support and a diamond control. It will be difficult to get to either hearts or clubs if we belong there.

Bare: 4♦. I don't like to cue bid with no control and only two spades, but in this crowded auction it seems right. Partner is very likely to be short in diamonds. 3NT seems wrong because it might not make, and I have 3 suits that might be right. Also, we may have a slam.

Lee: 4♦. Uncomfortable, but I don't like going past 4M (4♥ or 4♠), so this seems to be our best way of conveying strength without getting too high, even if it does lie about the spade support.

Shuster: 4♦. Strain and level are both in play here, but what I really think I have is a hand that is too good to bid 4♠.

Swanson: 4♦. Lots of high cards, lots of aces, shortage of tricks. My second choice is a dull raise to 4♠.

Kantar: 4♥. I have no idea where this will lead, but I'm not bidding 3NT or 4♠ with this moose.

Wittes: 4♥. Partner needs so little to make slam on this hand (♠KQJxxx ♥Kxx ♦x ♣Qxx for example) that I want to make a forward going bid.

I think 4♥ is natural. What would opener rebid with ♠x ♥AKQx ♦xxx ♣Qxxxx or ♠x ♥KQxxx ♦x ♣AQxxxx? Why should 4♥ be forcing?

Goldsmith: 5♠. We have the values for slam, and it is unlikely we have a heart fit, because partner might have doubled with 5-4 in the majors. Clubs may be our best strain, but I don't see a good way to find it. I'll just hope partner's spades are good enough and pick level based on his diamond holding. If it's Kx (he bids 5NT), that's great; I'd love to be able to play 6NT. If he passes 5♠, we are probably too high after a trick 3 trump promotion. Second choice is 5NT, but will partner really play me for this shape? He'll pick clubs way too often. The one case he'll get right is when he's 6412 without great spades. He'll bid 6♦, and we'll reach 6♥ vs. ♠KJxxxx ♥KJ10x ♦x ♣Qx. I think finding 6NT after 5♠S and stopping in 5♠ vs. ♠KQJ10xx ♥Kxx ♦xx ♣Qx make 5♠ a little better than 5NT.

5♠ is an awful way to describe that hand. However, if we are always going past game to make a slam try, what's better? At least it puts the focus on the need for a diamond control.

This is an old problem, but I changed the hand some. When this hand came up almost 30 years ago, the expert panel was not in agreement whether 3♣ was forcing or not. But the original hand had a maximum with good hearts, so much of the panel bid 3♥ because it would be correct regardless. I made the hand a minimum with poor hearts so that punting with 3♥ would not be trivial. These days many pairs play 2NT as an artificial clarifying bid, although systems for answering it differ.

Lee: 3♦. I play that this is a 5-trump game try, opposite which my hand is okay but not great, so I'll just make some return try and be happy if we stop in 3M.

Swanson: 3♥. This is a forcing auction for me (short clubs in some partnerships). 4♣ is possible, but I don't like 3♠, which would show four spades.

Goldsmith: 3♥. 3♣ is natural, forcing, and invitational or better. (Not everyone plays that way, but I think that's the most common treatment.) I have to act as if it is invitational. Is this hand good enough to accept? If I had a fourth spade, definitely. The missing spade is offset by the fact that I have five cards working overtime. It's close enough that I'll make a counter-try and suggest diamond shortness. Maybe that'll make partner's decision easy.

Kantar: 3♠. Every good pair has an agreement on

this sequence as to whether it should be forcing or invitational. My conclusion is that at IMPs it should be forcing and at Matchpoints invitational. Inevitably you will get a hand where you wish you were playing the other way. Since this is IMPs, honesty has compelled me to play it forcing so I would bid 3♣ showing four pieces. I was toying with 3♥, but I didn't have the guts to actually bid it, let alone explain it.

Shuster: 3♠. I play that invitations that care about my spade length go through 2NT. Over that, I would bid 3♣ with a minimum and only three spades, and partner would be able to pass (or bid a non-forcing 3♦). Given that treatment, 3♣ is forcing and natural, and I have useful fitting honors for play in a black suit. Still, I don't want to mislead partner about my red suit holdings, so I'll emphasize my good spades. There is still time to switch to clubs if this is a slam hand.

Wittes: 3♠. With most of my partners I play that 2NT would be an artificial game try with most probably four spades, therefore 3♣ should guarantee five spades. Although I do have good cards, I have a dead minimum with only 3 trumps.

Bare: 4♣. 3♣ is forcing, and I have nothing to cue bid in the red suits. Partner may be checking for a 4 card fit in spades. If NT was right partner had to bid it.

Wittes: Pass. Although partner's double is not purely penalty, it could be at that high a level, and partner is unlikely to have much of a heart fit. If I were to bid, it would be 4NT, but there's no guarantee this will get us to a good spot.

Several panelists pull out the 4NT card, bidding Blackwood even though they have a void. OK. OK, it's not Blackwood, and it is so clearly pick a suit that "Blackwood" didn't even get mentioned.

Swanson: 4NT. Partner's double is takeout with some defensive values - but probably not in spades. I'll let partner pick the suit.

Bare: 4NT. Take your pick of the minors.

Goldsmith: 4NT. I'll guess to save. I have very little defense, and if declarer ruffs the first heart, I have nearly none. Partner's double is not penalties, not takeout, just enough cards to believe that it is our hand. Sometimes, he'll have three tricks and the HA cashes. Sometimes not.

Kantar: 4NT. I play this double shows cards, not necessarily spades. If it does, I'm looking for a place to play.

Shuster: 4NT. Whatever partner bids, ought to have play. I'm not forcing slam just because I have a spade void.

Lee: 4NT. I'm not sure what the alternative is supposed to be. *[This time Roger got a near unanimous panel].*

The big issue here is not what 4NT means, but how penalty oriented the double is. 4♠ doubled is not penalty for most expert partnerships.
