Computers are a curse or a blessing. It's one or the other for most of us. Summaries are produced with ease and quickly. So, with the Torrance Regional only a few days in the past, we have some data for you.

The Marriott is a nice location for a tournament. Parking is right

there. The main room is open and well lit. Lots of hall space for meeting your partners or resting with your coffee. Starbucks down the hall. Staff was on top of things. Nice breakfasts in the restaurant in addition to the pastries out front. Rooms with a view for those who stayed at the hotel. Nice breezes from the beach. OK, so it's a few minutes from the freeway. Not as good as Ventura, but about the same as the Westin in Palm Springs. A total of 867 players enjoyed the games. Did you?

The 987 tables this year was a slight increase over last. We had folks from as far away as New York, Massachusetts, North Carolina, Oregon, and Texas, plus one from S Korea. Rounding the numbers, we had 540 players from our District, 270 from District 22, and 60 "Pro's" and clients from all over. We thank everyone who travelled those distances and hope you enjoyed the week.

One of our pleasures was to welcome 80 players for Gerri Carlson's lesson and game on Monday morning. Many stayed to mix it up with the main room in the afternoon and that was a good sign to keep that event on the schedule. We did not count how many times the lesson subject – preempts – came up in the student game, but anyone who stayed on for the first regular session may remember the hand that had nine spades. I heard of one case at least that opened 6. A trump lead beat it.

To continue with the stats: 3,950 sessions of bridge were played. Our friends from District 22 played more

"Don't even think about starting a bridge club. No one plays bridge in Los Angeles anymore," was the inspiration I received from District Manager Peter Benjamin back in 2011. I was about to launch Agile Bridge Club a few miles from Peter's residence. A life-long entrepreneur, I had a dream that if people were taught the game I loved in a fun, patient way, they would grow to love it the way I did. Before long, Peter was glad I failed to heed his advice. Jeff's Agile Bridge Club recently surpassed 60 tables in one week.

To make the games more fun, I start each one with a lecture that includes a few jokes. I have tried out almost every type of game: pot lucks, Quinellas, Swiss Teams, Top Scorer, Silent Auctions, Mentor/Mentee, ice cream socials, North American Pairs, and Beat the House. I stopped the last one after too many pairs beat

me in one game!

A Tournament at the Beach?

The South Bay has not hosted a bridge tournament for two and a half years. The weekend of January 15-17, 2016, that changes. The South Bay beach cities welcome their first ever bridge tournament: the Beach Cities 299r Sectional. There will be two daily games Friday through Sunday at 10:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Players must have less than 300 master points to enter. New players (49ers) will play separate games. All games will grant silver points exclusively.

new players with fewer than 5 mps. A Swiss Team game will be held Sunday afternoon. There will be plenty of snacks and coffee. Lunch will be available for purchase.

The Tournament festivities will begin the week prior with a Charity Pro Am Bridge Game benefitting Youth Bridge. It will be held Thursday January 7, at 12:15pm at the Hermosa Beach Kiwanis Club 2515 Valley Drive. Pros play free.

As tournament coordinator, I am planning for a large turnout. With Agile Bridge Club's Friday morning game already having reached 23 tables of 299rs, I expect a turnout of over 30 tables for the Friday morning and both Saturday games. As a result both the Kiwanis and Rotary Club buildings located in Valley Park in Hermosa Beach have been reserved.

Players from as far away as Maryland and Upstate New York have already made plans to fly out for the Beach Cities Sectional. Hotel Hermosa 2515 Pacific Coast Hwy., just one block from the venue, is the host hotel. Those who book rooms prior to Dec. 15 receive a 20% discount.



District 23 Scholarship Program

Approximately 20 years ago, District 23 of the ACBL started the Scholarship program. This was implemented by the efforts of Paula Oliver of the Pasadena-San Gabriel Unit.

The program was designed to assist high school seniors who have some bridge affiliation, with their college expenses. Candidates were required to reside within District 23 boundaries and maintain a 3.0 GPA in their senior year.

The amount of the annual awards is determined by funds available in the scholarship fund. Scholarships are renewable for up to 4 years. Students must maintain a 3.0 GPA.

About six years ago, the District established a tax exempt foundation status. The scholarship program is financed by contributions from units and individual donors. Currently there are 10 recipients, each receiving \$800. John Jones, who mentors bridge and teaches math at Elizabeth Street Learning Center in Cudahy, has sponsored several students with financial need. Nolan Chang from our unit is another recipient.

The "Name a Game," that honors individuals at regional events, is used to raise tax deductible donations to the foundation. The required donation to name an event is \$100 per session.

On Thursday, Oct. 1st, at Arcadia, I was seated north at table 1. My partner was Roy Wilson, and, for round one, my LHO was Herman Helber and my RHO was Peter Szecsi. stimulating conversation We some a couple of good laughs as we each shuffled and dealt out one deck, following which we picked up our hands to bid and play board one. I took a quick look at my hand. It was a 6/5er: ♣KQJ10xx Clubs AJ10xx. I quickly decided I would open a club, then bid spades twice, to show my distribution. I did open 1♣, and, on my left, Herman bid 1♥. My partner doubled, and a spirited auction ensued which culminated with me playing 5♠, undoubled. The dummy came down with 44, as promised. There were no comments by any of us, as I proceeded with the play, going down two. I entered the score on the traveler, we replaced our cards in their slots and were about to embark on the next board, when Peter, my RHO, said, "You were 5-5 in clubs and spades, right." "No", I said, "I had 6 clubs and 5 spades. He disagreed, so I extracted my hand to show him. "There!" I said, as I displayed my 6 clubs, my 5 Spades, my singleton Heart, and my TWO little Diamonds. "Oh, oh....I had 14 cards." Now we all picked up our hands and Herman said, "Oh, oh. It looks like I also had 14 cards." Peter, solid as a rock, as always, said, "Well, I have 13." That left my partner quite short-handed, with just 11 cards. Talk about embarrassing moments, three of us had the wrong count in hand, and all four of us were totally unaware of an eleven card dummy. There is, of course, a moral to this story. It is....'At our age, Count Your Blessings....and your cards.'

It is noted that, pursuant to Law 7, Sect B2, all players are directed to count their cards, and in some situations, may be subjected to penalties for failing to properly do so.



A three-loser hand, so you might open 2♣ if that's your style. Let's be simple and say you open 1♥. The auction will procede 2♦-4♥-4♠.

Well, you now know where the ♠K is, and all you see is a diamond loser, so you bid 6♥. Two passes follow, and RHO calls 6♠! Now what?

You're still looking at that pesky diamond loser (unless partner has the ♣A – or the ♠K – no way to find out, now), so you decide to take the money and double. It goes for 1100, which is an above average score. Unfortunately, partner has ♠-- ▼T96 ♠8 ♣KQT987642 and with an opening spade lead, 13 tricks would roll home. Twelve tricks are always there, because the full deal is



That's right. Partner had a nine card suit and never mentioned it. Needless to say, declarer in 6♠x got the shock of his life when he tried to come to hand with a club ruff (with the ♠7) and got overruffed with the ♠8!

One pair played in 6 v x (+1660) and one pair actually found a way to bid the grand, which made. Must be nice...

When was the last time you saw a deal with three voids? The odds against any single hand having a void are about 1 in 20. I'd guess the odds against **three** voids are somewhat better than 1 in 203 = 1 in 8000, but probably not much better.

Problem Solvers' Panel

You, South, hold: ♠AT72 ♥J6 ♠T742 ♠K42 What call do you make?

Pass, 4♠ and 5♠ all might be best on any given hand. What's the percentage action? Let's hear from the 4♠ bidders first.

Wittes: 4♠. If doubled, I will bid 5♠. [That makes sense because you will likely be facing a spade stack if you are doubled. The opponents are unlikely to have sufficient high cards nor quick tricks to double if spades aren't stacked.]

Bartusek: 4♠. Partner often has four spades for this auction, and even if he doesn't, I should be able to handle a Moysian fit. When partner holds only three spades, he usually has a stronger hand for his double. Choosing 5♠ might get us too high (especially if partner is 4=1=4=4 or 4=2=4=3). Even though pass should get +200, and sometimes +500, RHO will often have a strong playing hand at these colors.

Dunitz: 4♠. Partner has a big hand, typically with heart shortness. I'm quite comfortable bidding 4♠.

Swanson: 44, the same call I

would have made had East bid 3.

Kantar: 44. My diamond fit was the clincher to bid rather than pass.

Now we'll give the passers the podium.

Lee: Pass. It feels bad since it's not hard to imagine a double game swing, but 4♠ and 5♠ both seem like total guesses to me.

Bare: Pass. I have 1.5 tricks on defense and it's unclear how good a fit we have on offense.

Lolli: Pass. I think 4 tricks on defense will be easier than 10 or 11 on offense.

Shuster: Pass. I don't have any useful shortness. That is really bad for trying to make at the 5-level.

I held this hand at the Bakersfield Sectional and passed. Pass netted down two for +500, but 4♠ would have made for +420. 5♠ would go down a trick, though.

You, South, hold: ♠KQJ9 ♥AK ♠JT865 ♣A9 What call do you make?

Chris Hitchcock, a reader, held this hand in a Caltech game. Chris thought there was an interesting choice of bids at this point, and that double, 2♠ and 2NT were all reasonable. The panel proved him correct. Two members of the panel thought this was an easy problem, and that the answer was obvious.

Bare: Double, seems clear, what else?

Bartusek: 2. WTP? Just bidding what is in front of me (and guaranteeing five diamonds also). Double will falsely encourage partner to bid clubs.

The experts that thought the problem was obvious don't agree on what the best bid is. Think bridge is an easy game?

Lolli: 2. Partner could have lots in one suit with a poor hand that could still make game.

Wittes: 2♠. I like this a little better than 2NT with my concentration of values.

Lee: 2. 2NT is in the discussion, but I prefer to just bid my good four card suit while showing five plus diamonds and a good hand. We don't have the kind of hand that will do well in NT when we have a diamond or spade fit.

Kantar: 2♠. Double is apt to get me 3♠, and then what is to become of me?

The problem of how to react to a $3\clubsuit$ response over a double sways some panelists to consider alternatives.

Swanson: Double. I might have to decide how to continue if partner bids 3♣. [I'd pass 3♣.]

Shuster: 2NT. Double won't help us figure out the right level. What would I do over 3♣?

Is pass an option?

Dunitz: Pass/Double. The problem is my big high cards are in my short suits. This eliminates 2NT as a possibility. Partner didn't make a negative double, so he likely does not have four spades. This leaves pass (going low) and double, hoping I can survive partner's possible enthusiasm for clubs. I have no strong feeling.

You, South, hold: ♠J4 ♥7 ♠AQ874 ♣A9753 What call do you make?

This is a problem a created based upon a conversation I was having with Ed Barad. Oddly, the exact same auction and same shape with only one less HCP occurred in a match Ed and I played as opponents after I had already submitted this hand for this month's column

Kantar: Pass. But I would have liked to know the state of our game.

Swanson: 4. I'll be optimistic because a plus score is not assured in 3. [This is optimistic partially because 4. is 100% forcing.]

Wittes: 34. Tough problem. If partner has a fit for one

of my minors and a spade stopper, 3NT should be a good spot. If partner has a good hand with a four card minor, slam is not out of the question. If partner has a minimum with a 6-card heart suit, we may be in a little trouble.

Lolli: 3♠. Try to get to the right game.

Bare: 3♠. North should be aware that even though a cue bid almost always shows a fit, in this case 3♠ puts you in game anyway. So from the 3♥ bidder's viewpoint if partner has a slam try in hearts, a bid back to 4♥ over any bid would be a clear slam try. Frequently partner may have a hard hand to bid, so North should allow for other options.


Lee: 3♠. In this auction, I play 3♠ is either a stopper ask or a good hand with clubs, and 4♠ shows a strong heart raise. That seems like a good agreement for this hand.

Bartusek: 3NT. Opponents are non-vul and there was no raise by my RHO. Partner rates to have a spade card, and 3NT could easily right-side the contract when partner has something like Kxx. Some partnerships allow 3♠ to ask for a spade stopper and not guarantee heart support.

Dunitz: 3NT. Partner rates to have something in spades. 3NT will be the winning action most of the time.

I'm with the 3NT bidders. So is our resident joker.

Shuster: Double. Just kidding. 3NT. I've got a good hand and so does partner. Partner didn't make a takeout double and RHO didn't raise, so my guy rates to have some spades. At least that will be my story later after they take the first six tricks.

You, South, hold: ♠KQ8 ♥-- ♦AK9862 ♣K763 What call do you make?

Shuster: Pass. I'm waiting to see what nugget of wisdom will be published here about why some mastermind bid is, of course, correct.

Bartusek: Pass. I'm not going to hang partner. If I had a fourth spade the hand would be significantly stronger.

Lolli: Pass. Partner knows I have a pretty good hand and was content to play game.

Swanson: Pass. Partner will try 4♠ on a wide variety of hands in the situation. I'm pleased he bid.

Lee: Pass. Partner could be taking a shot here. It's losing bridge to guess on partner's guess. His range of hands includes a lot of random hands with five spades.

Wittes: 5%. Aggressive, but partner needs too little to make a slam, $\triangle AJxxx$ $\forall xx \land Qxx \triangleq Qxx$ for example. Make the $\triangle Q$ the $\triangle A$, and a grand is a very good proposition.

This is another hand from the Bakersfield Sectional. I tried $5 \checkmark$ at the table. My partner, Doug Blagdon, who had made a great $4 \spadesuit$ bid, retreated to $5 \spadesuit$ with his six spades and his three HCPs. He gave $5 \spadesuit$ a great effort, but to no avail. I had got us overboard in my effort to get to a slam. 10 tricks were the limit of the actual hand.

Bare: 5♦.

Eddie passes, but thinks of Edgar Kaplan.

Kantar: Pass. I'll gamble partner has five spades or four good ones. Edgar [Kaplan] would not be happy with me. His answer to all tough problems was to bid one's longest suit.

Dunitz: 5♦. 4♠ could be the limit of the hand, but I'm a 5♦ bidder. [That's the bid Edgar would make]. I'm suggesting another strain and still leaving spades in the picture.

You, South, hold: ♠AQJ6 ♥QT82 ♦QT4 ♣72 5a. Would you have overcalled 1♠? 5b. Would you double 4♥?

Bare: a: Yes. b: No. Declarer may play 1 trick better if doubled.

Lee: No and no. I'm not a fan of four card overcalls with scattered defense. After the opponents get to 4♥ when responder implies useful club stuff, I don't like doubling. It could be cold, or perhaps declarer has a line of play that involves ruffing something and then playing AK of hearts to claim on trumps breaking 3-2. I like to spec double about as much as anyone, but I just don't see it here.

Bartusek: a: No. Overcalling 1♠ shouldn't have such strong defense for hearts. It will encourage partner to make bad decisions in the auction. b: No. What am I trying to do? ... turn +50 into +100? Doubling might even give declarer enough information to make the hand!

Swanson: a: No. Defensive potential is much greater than offensive potential. An overcall would not have occurred to me. b: No, but I assume double is the winning action because it is given as a problem. A double could convert two heart winners into one. West has limited values, but could hold as many as 12 HCP. East could have up to 17, even 18. Pass, in tempo, is clear to me. Sometimes you just don't get full value when the opponents overbid. At least they got to 4.

Lolli: Pass. I'm not a fan of overcalling four card suits. No, I would not double. It might make him play the hand into a make.

Dunitz: Pass. I should go plus. Double could work out, but could also be disastrous.

Shuster: a: No. 1♠ isn't terrible, but it is dangerous and unnecessary with this heart holding. b: No. My hand holds little in defense and only a very mild surprise for declarer.

Wittes: a: No. I probably would not overcall 1♠, but I do not have a strong objection to it at this vulnerability. b: No. I would not double 4♥. A double might be just what declarer needs to take a safety play with Jxx or K9x of trumps in the dummy. Dummy should have some kind of limit raise with a nice club fit.

Jon has correctly guessed the reason for the 4♥ jump. The 4♥ bidder (West) had ♠xxx ♥Kxx ♠xx ♠AKJTx and had upgraded based on the probable club fit. Unfortunately for her, there wasn't really a club fit. Her partner had ♠KTxx ♥AJ9xx ♠Jx ♠Qx. Both Easts elected to open this hand, but my teammates stopped in 3♥ (after a 1♠ overcall). I thought about doubling for a split-second, but passed in tempo. Against 4♥, I led a low diamond, and partner took his ♠K and ♠A before shifting to a spade for down three. If I had doubled, he is quite likely to find the spade shift in time to get another trick for +800.

Kantar: Pass. I once had a hand very similar to this in a National KO event in Chicago playing with Marshall Miles. Actually, my spades were Q108x, and I overcalled a l♥ opening with l♠, vulnerable, (a death wish). I was raised to 2♠ by Marshall with ♠Kxx. It went double on my right and pass on my left with LHO holding ♠AJ97x. I went for 800 and Marshall never said a word. There was one board to go, and as it happened we were still ahead! Our teammates were Alvin Roth and Tobias Stone, and they had →

been carrying us through each match with huge games. When Roth saw they were barely winning these matches, he started to make plane reservations home after each match. On the next hand, the last hand of the match, partner invited with 4NT and I passed and the hand made six on a finesse. Had I not overcalled l♥ or had I bid 6NT, we would have won the match. There's more. A good friend of mine, Harvey Cohen, living in Los Angeles at the time, had come to Chicago to kibitz us. After the match he was in the circle surrounding our team among many others during the comparison. After we lost the match, Stoney pointed to Harvey and said: And here's a guy who has come thousands of miles to watch these guys play!
