And now we come to those little Bridgemates. They do speed up the scoring and I actually hear players asking for them lately. But do they add to our enjoyment or hinder it? It certainly does not add to my day when my opponent grumbles as he enters the contract and score, then does not even turn the device around so that I may "accept" the result – as is my duty at the table. Sometimes it is literally thrown over to me. I usually turn it around so that I may see the result, check it against my scorecard, push the "accept" button, and, finally, turn it back to face my opponent and quietly hand it back so we are ready for the next hand. Ask me sometime whether I'd really like to throw it back! How do you feel when that happens?

I really don't know if BridgeMate etiquette is recorded in an ACBL publication, but it should be. Maybe I'm dreaming – it seems to me that I read somewhere

The ACBL announced some very good financial news in early

July.

The ACBL reached an agreement with online bridge provider BBO. BBO has agreed to pay the ACBL \$500K per year above and beyond any current payments to the ACBL. In exchange, the ACBL has given BBO the exclusive rights to run ACBL robot games through July of 2020.

This welcome good news marks an important improvement in the ACBL's financial condition after several challenging years. Although there are some very minor additional conditions of the agreement, the agreement represents effectively a pure win for the ACBL – the equivalent of finding money in your pocket. CEO Robert Hartman deserves high praise for coordinating the deal. Several members of the board of directors facilitated Mr. Hartman's efforts and deserve praise in a supporting role.

Representing Clubs

I submitted one motion to the national board meeting. My central motivation is: how can the ACBL make it a good deal to own a bridge club?

I am not seeking a direct financial payment to clubs. Rather, I am trying to find and promote ways that

the ACBL Board of Directors can set policy and fees for clubs as well as ways that ACBL headquarters can provide better value for clubs.

My motion proposed specific ways that the ACBL Board of Directors become well-informed about how clubs – and other groups such as bridge teachers and other volunteers - contribute to the ACBL and how the ACBL will be attracting new members in the long-term.

This idea is Business 101, and it was derived from a sustained effort on my part to understand the current situation. I spoke to a wide variety of club owners and managers. I also spoke to board members and others familiar with the ACBL and bridge administration. I continue to welcome feedback on this subject. I continue to feel that the ACBL would strongly benefit if the ACBL Board better understood the role of clubs.

Unfortunately, I ran into some political challenges in advancing this simple notion. Some procedural obstacles prevented a full airing of my motion. I did start the process of building political support for clubs, but I see that this will be a longterm challenge. I'll write more extensively about this issue at: https:// acbld23dd.wordpress.com/



This month our Hand-of-the-Month takes an en-

tirely new direction. It's called "Sometimes Those %\$#! Hand Records Do More Harm Than Good." The hand presented occurred during our recent STaC.

North deals, and North-South are vulnerable. The North-South hands are

♦AQ9 **♥**AT863 **♦**AJ **♣**AQ4 **♦**8532 **♥**K5 **♦**K52 **♣**K973

The auction could go many ways, depending on your methods, but let's say... just for laughs... that you are playing Standard and open the North hand with 2NT. Then it will probably go 3♣ (Stayman), 3♠, 3NT. Pretty tame, no?

Maybe. Maybe not. The hand record shows 6NT making (+1440) as the par contract. Really? Sure, at match points you will take both finesses (spades and diamonds) and since both win, you will take 12 tricks. But how under Heaven and Earth do you get there? Even opening that North hand 2♣ (22 points, counting for the long heart and ignoring ◆AJ tight), we see no reasonable way. Of course, if you are about 30 IMPs behind in a match, it's probably a great slam to be in.

Just for added icing on the cake... 6♣ also makes, on the same two finesses and the 3-3 club break. Go figure.

Guessing Shoes

After opening a 12-14 NT in fourth seat at matchpoints, white against red, I bought it there. The opening lead of the heart J gave me the following challenge:

Dummy: **♦**J6 **♥**K85 **♦**K865 **♣**J874 Declarer: **♦**A982 **♥**962 **♦**A103 **♣**KQ5

My first guess was to insert the king immediately. RHO won the ace and sent a heart back to the 10. My luck was in when LHO took a while in thought (indicating that I'd successfully blocked the suit) before returning the \$\ddot 4. I played low from dummy, fetching the queen, and since I was pretty sure that hand held all the outstanding hearts, ducking seemed like a bad idea. After winning the ace, I sent back another spade and LHO won the K10 (I threw a heart and a diamond from dummy) and then put me back in with the last spade, his partner throwing a heart.

I played the ♣K, winning, and then the ♣Q. LHO won the ace and exited with the ♣10, his partner throwing another heart on the third club. Now I exited with

dummy's last club, and when RHO threw a diamond, I dumped my now-useless heart. When LHO exited with a low diamond that rode to my 10, I scored up my contract with three diamonds, two clubs, and two spades. If he'd led a high diamond, I'd have had to make another guess, somehow working out to play RHO for the ◆9 instead of the other diamond honor. A cute variation on a simple squeeze.

Problem Solvers' Panel

You, South, hold: ♠AQ985 ♥A4 ♠A98 ♣AJ5 What call do you make?

It's hard to envision what partner might have to pass over 3NT doubled, but to make a slam try over 4 doubled. Does he have very long hearts and a rather weak hand? Does he have a stronger hand with marginal hearts? We have enough extras to bid some slam, but what is the best strain?

Kantar: 6. I'm playing partner for eight hearts and no outside king. He must have been afraid to overcall hearts for fear his partner would think he had a better hand.

Lolli: 6. Partner was content to play 3NT doubled, but he judged the penalty wouldn't be enough

against 44 doubled. Thus, he has good hearts and wants to play a slam instead if I can bid it. I'm more concerned about missing seven and making six.

Sacks: 6. Preempts work! I have two first round controls more than the minimum that I could have, so let us see what happens.

Should we suggest playing the hand in spades, and if so, what's the best try?

Bare: 5♠. This leaves all options open.

5NT suggests two places to play.

The 5NT bidders are going to correct $6 \blacklozenge to 6 \blacktriangledown to$ give partner a choice of $6 \blacktriangledown or 6 \spadesuit$. I'm a 5NT bidder.

Lee: 5NT. Surely we have enough to bid more, since partner would not be stretching to bid $5 \checkmark$ in this position. I'll offer a choice between $6 \checkmark$ and $6 \checkmark$ since I don't think my hearts are good enough to insist on them. If partner pulls $6 \checkmark$ to $6 \checkmark$, I'd think that's right on average.

Roeder: 5NT. This hand is slam worthy, but I do not want to unilaterally commit to hearts. If partner has six good hearts, they will be rebid.

You, South, hold: ◆AJ ♥AKQ964 ◆A2 ◆Q74 What call do you make?

We have an excellent hand. How do we best make progress?

Roeder: Double. No bid by partner can embarrass you. Even if partner bids 4♠, you will not be ashamed to rebid 5♥.

Sacks: Double. Maybe we will glean some information with partner's response. If partner responds 3♣ he will have some values [David is assuming the Lebensohl convention, of which virtually all expert pairs use some variation] as opposed to 2♠ or 2NT, which could be broke.

One bidder considered double, but went a different route.

Lee: 4♥. It's tempting to double first to try to go slower. However, I play that partner is expected to pull 4♥ to 4♠ with most hands with five spades and fewer than three hearts, which we certainly don't want with this hand.

Two bidders beg for partner to bid with a solid trick.

Lolli: 3♥. 3♥ shows a very good hand so I expect partner to react accordingly.

Bare: 3♥. Top of the range for 3♥, but best anyway.

Our final bidder selects my choice, the NT game!

Kantar: 3NT. Where there are eight there will be nine. Where there are nine (bidding $4\heartsuit$) there may not be ten.

You, South, hold: ◆AKQ653 ♥7 ◆J4 ◆Q652 What call do you make?

Bare: 4♠. This might be best spot, but a club slam is quite possible. [At matchpoints I think we would get more 4♠ bidders.]

Kantar: 4♣. Hoping to have a chance to bid 4♠ if partner bids 4♦ or 4♥.

Lee: 4. I have great club support, so I raise clubs. These spades are not good enough to rebid again with such an attractive alternative.

Lolli: 4. I don't have a great hand, but partner is looking for the best game or slam. I'll assume we have the mechanism to stop in 4NT if necessary.

How do we show club support with a singleton heart? David suggests bidding around the heart suit to show a singleton.

Sacks: 4♣. There was a time I would bid 3♦ to see where partner was coming next. If that bid followed by 4♣ over 3NT guaranteed a singleton heart I might still do that. Bidding 4♣ is easy; the tough part is what to do over partner's bidding 4♥ next.

Rick suggests the answer I like, 4.

Roeder: 4♣. Glad you did not give as a matchpoint problem. [Matchpoints would make it a more difficult problem]. If a 4♥ bid is a splinter, as I suspect it should be, that would have much merit. One of the most difficult bidding evaluations is to know whether your stiff, opposite partner's length, is a good thing or a bad thing. That is why 4♥ would be invaluable as a splinter here. Practical bridge dictates that partner be aware.

You, South, hold: ♠95 ♥K986542 ♠AJ83 ♣--What call do you make?

What's the best call here: Pass, $1 \checkmark$, $2 \checkmark$, $3 \checkmark$ or $4 \checkmark$?

Lee: Pass. Any preemptive number of hearts is a misdescription, and 1♥ is a strange bid with such little defense/HCP. If I had to open I would open 1♥.

Sacks: Pass. I pass, unless the state of the match is such that I am looking for a swing. I am not up to the current state of affairs so as to open 1.

Lolli: 2v. Once I ruled out pass and 1v, I made my ugly bid. A seven card suit, a void, and a side 4 card suit aren't my cup of tea, but this is a tough hand.

Bare: 3. A pass followed by a high-level bid usually shows a two-suiter and the diamonds don't quite make it a two-suiter. Also, the hand should be stronger as well as two-suited for most high level bidding.

Kantar: 3. Not exactly what partner will expect, but on the other hand, not exactly an easy hand to describe. Please don't tell me I missed a game or a slam in diamonds, please, John.

Roeder: 3. I know preempts are getting looser, but even considering a 4. with this moth-eaten suit should result in a 30 masterpoint penalty. [Ask your buddy Ifti Baqui!]

What call do you make?

Bare: 5. A guess but many minimum hands will produce slam.

One 5♥ bidder still isn't giving up on a grand.

Lolli: 5♥. If partner has three small diamonds I'll apologize, but if partner is kind enough to bid 5♠ over my 5♥, I can bid 6♣ and land in the correct level.

Roeder: 4. Not riskless, but I could not bear partner's scorn if he looks at dummy in 4, holding ♠Ax ♥Axxxx •x ♠Kxxxx, and telling me I badly need a testosterone injection. Then his adding insult by saying, "Sorry, partner, I guess I should have jumped to 4."

One panelist thinks he is making a "fake" cuebid, showing a diamond control.

Kantar: 4. You've driven me to make fake cuebids, John. What is to become of me? [Remember, Eddie, no matter what you bid in this panel, you are still the master, and Yvonne loves you!]

Other panelists think 4 represents a big hand with a fit and says nothing about a heart fit.

Lee: 4. I have a good raise in hearts with reasonable slam chances, so that's what I would show.

Sacks: 4. Agrees hearts and suggests slam.
