West leads the 5 of spades, you play the 7, East plays the 9, you win your queen. After the opening spade lead, you have two spade tricks. You also have 5 club tricks. Two more tricks are needed. The diamond suit offers the opportunity to develop four tricks through promotions by driving out the A and K. However, that would require you giving up the lead twice to the defenders. What's wrong with this plan? Do you have a better plan?

East opens with a preemptive 3 diamond bid. Holding a good hand with support for the unbid suits, South makes a takeout double...With 10 high-card points, advancer (North) is suppose to jump, but should North jump to 4 hearts or 4 spades? South, what's your bid??

## General Rules about Forcing Auctions:

Jumps in previously bid suits by either partner are invitational, not forcing, unless one partner has already shown at least game values.

Opener's reverses is forcing for one round. Jump shifts by opener on the  $2^{nd}$  round or by responder on the  $1^{st}$  round of the auction create a game force, not just a one round force.

If the opponents overcall, a cue bid of the opponents' suits by either of us on the 2<sup>nd</sup> round of the auction or later is game forcing.

If opener makes a jump of 2 NT, all continuations by responder are game forcing.

New suit responses to preempts are forcing.

When we have found an 8 card major suit fit, new suits are game tries, forcing to at least 3 of the agreed suit.

A jump to 2 NT by responder over a minor suit opening is invitation, 11 to a bad 12.

New suit rebids by opener are not forcing, but are wide ranging, usually pass or correct. Example: opener 1 Heart, Responder 1 Spade, Opener's rebid of 2 clubs or 2 diamonds, pass or correct, Opener didn't reverse or make a strong ump shift bid.
