Some hands go down in value, and some go up. Does partner know the whole story of this hand from my opening bid, or do I have more to tell?

What's forcing? What's non-forcing? What's invitational? It's important to know which bids are limited and which are not. With a minimum, limit your hand properly... Don't get hung up on conventions.

Tips on being competitive in the bidding:

- a. Hand evaluation
- b. Judgement, importance of shape
- c. Re-evaluating your hand when the opponents are bidding

Whenever you can show your shape, it allows partner to judge which of their cards are working. That's why I recommend you play Jacoby 2NT and splinters.

If responder is going to jump (in a suit) on his first bid, he needs to know 2 things:

- a. What the trump suit is going to be, and
- b. That the partnership might have values for at least a small slam, 33+ points.

Always plan a second bid before you choose a first. The best bid available is often the least bad alternative.
