AFTER A YEAR OF 'RAMPANT' CHEATING, ELITE BRIDGE TRIES TO CLEAN UP

As the pandemic forced most players online, the problem of cheating consumed the game's highest levels. Top players say a tight-lipped culture is finally changing.

In the USA, ten days after the first elite player confessed to cheating, a second said she had done it, too. A few months later, wealthy sponsors pleaded for players to clean up the game. Then officials suspended one top player, and another, and this summer 30 teams forfeited rather than play someone accused of cheating.

For over a year, the topic of cheating has consumed players in the highest levels of bridge. In interviews, top players, officials and data analysts described a surge in cheating as the coronavirus pandemic pushed players online, and a subsequent backlog of cases in the game's byzantine disciplinary system.

With online play, teammates could cheat effortlessly: talking side-by-side on the sofa, chatting by phone, or using spectator accounts to see everyone's cards; but despite assertions by some analysts, the extent of the problem remains unknown. "

'Rampant' Cheating and a 'Ridiculous' Set of Rules

With remote play, organizers couldn't look for secret signals, analyse video of important matches, or tell whether partners were talking. They had only a digital record of decisions in the game and an incredibly complicated set of rules. For example, the ACBL disciplinary code which until recently ran to more than 29,000 words, assumes the game is played by "gentlemen and honourable ladies." Indeed, the assumption is so strong that there still is a rule that threatens a player with suspension for publicly accusing another of cheating.

Serious cracks in that culture began in 2015 and continued to expand to snare experts, professional and 'normal people'. Sylvia Shi, a high-level player who was suspended last year until 2023 for online cheating, apologized in an open letter: "I didn't do it for money, glory, results, victories, some sort of fulfilment, or masterpoints," she said. "I did it because it was so, so easy, and so tempting."

A Digital Record of Every Trick

Online platforms not only simplified cheating, but also make discovery easier post-play as there is a record of every bid and card played. Algorithms have been created and analysts are looking at patterns of odd decisions. Based on data beginning in March 2020, about two to 5 percent of all pairs playing online are cheating, a figure that translates to several hundred players in ACBL alone.

A Threat to Bridge's Future

Prosecution is not always the answer as it is costly, time-consuming and stressful for both parties. Plus the challenge of explaining bridge to judges or arbiters — in the actual, non-bridge judicial system —adds a comic dimension.

Cheating will always be a problem to some degree but there is a lot of pressure for topflight players to do the right thing. Players and officials are concerned about the death of the

sport and are looking to get a better handle on cheating, and with more modern methods. They are working to rebrand the game, reinvigorate it, and keep it clean along the way. (Edited by Norma Springer for this Newsletter)
