PRESIDENT VBA LTD. - CHRISTOPHER LEACH

Today I would like to talk about the significance for Bridge Victoria of the sale of Poath Road and some associated history. I am often asked to explain in more detail the decision to relocate the VBA club to Dendy Park and the related decision to acquire the Dendy Park Bridge Centre and merge it with the club to form the Victorian Bridge Centre. I am very happy to do so.

The origins of this plan date back to the VBA's move, twenty years ago, from Prahran to Murrumbeena. By 2011, due to a variety of factors, the once very successful VBA club was declining in numbers and at the same time the relatively vast Poath Road building was becoming more and more expensive to operate. After a brief respite during Covid when the building was closed and government support available, the VBA Council was facing escalating losses in the 2020's, plus the need for unavoidable and expensive building maintenance. The situation had become untenable.

The move to Dendy relocated the club into an environment which was much lower cost, far more selfcontained, with a more pleasant ambience and (unlike Poath Road) excellent parking. The acquisition of Dendy, at an advantageous price, also provided the club with more active members.

The importance of this is that the club can now be administratively separated from state activities and can stand on its own two feet. An Operations Committee has been formed for the VBC, chaired by Allan Hardie, and a new website for the VBC set up. Going forward, the club's operations will be accounted for separately from state operations, probably for the first time ever.

The significance for Bridge Victoria was that Poath Road could be sold and planning for a Future Fund set in motion. That Fund, whose revenues will be utilized for the advancement of bridge in Victoria will come into being late this year, with its primary corpus of funds arriving in 12 months upon receipt of the balance of the Poath Road proceeds.


Meanwhile, we are setting up the Bridge Victoria Operations Committee which will be run by a group of representatives from across Victoria to direct new initiatives across the state, A new chapter for Victorian bridge will thereby be ushered in.

West leads the \blacklozenge J.

Counting our tricks, we have the following sure tricks -

Two \bigstar s, three \forall s, three \blacklozenge s which equals eight tricks.

If the ♣ finesse works, we have four more tricks and if it doesn't, we have three more tricks

There is no point delaying the inevitable. You win the trick with \diamond K and lead the \clubsuit Q and, after East plays a small \clubsuit , you let it run.

Guess what happens? There is no point in writing the hand up as a test if the finesse wins.

You guessed it, East wins the AK and returns the T and East throws a A.

Now you must find the $\diamondsuit Q$ to make the contract.

What is your plan from here?

Are you a declarer who takes the bit between their teeth and leads a \bigstar now for a 50-50 shot or do you cash a few winners first and delay the decision?

BRIDGE HAND OF THE MONTH

South, over North's 1, simply bids 1, on the theory that you are going to bid again if partner rebids 1NT, so show the \blacklozenge suit along the way.

North shows a strong hand by jumping to $2 \checkmark$ (a high-level reverse).

South shows a good hand by bidding $3 \checkmark$ (not fast arrival to game as they are in a game forcing auction).

North shows the \bigstar control.

South rolls out the Blackwood convention and after North shows 3 key cards, South bids 6♥

East leads the \blacklozenge 2.

BRIDGE HUMOUR

My partner and I were playing in a match point pairs event in a club that we had never been to before. The director had setup a movement where we sat North and South at table 2 and we would play two boards against each of the East West pairs in the field.

The first two boards were fairly uneventful and the director asked the East West pairs to move to the next higher table.

The two ladies that came from table 1 sat East and West at our table. As the lady playing East sat down in her chair, she apologised to her partner saying that, unfortunately, she always makes one mistake a night and thank goodness it happened at the first table. Of course, this meant that the lady sitting East could now concentrate fully as her one mistake had already taken place and her partner, in the West seat, could now look forward to a mistake free session for the rest of the evening.

The lady in the East chair as a defender on the first board, trumped one of our losers with the boss trump and then proceeded to present declarer with a ruff and sluff to allow the contract to make.

Then on the second board, as declarer, she found an exact sequence of plays to find the only way to go down in what was a contract that the rest of the field would most likely make.

The director called the move. As the lady in the East chair left our table, she said to her partner that, as promised, she played mistake free at our table as she had made her one mistake earlier.

My partner and I turned around to look at table 1 and its surrounds. There appeared to be no fire damage, no noticeable coffee stains on either of the North and South players or on the floor. The bridge table was still upright and the chairs all appeared to be as good as new. Both the North and South players seemed to be in good health without any noticeable burns, pen or pencil marks on their body.

We then turned to each other and looked puzzled. We wondered what on earth this one mistake must have been.

MCMANAMNY CLUB TEAMS EVENT

After the success of the 2022 McManamny Club Teams, the event will be held again this year on Sunday 24 September at Moonee Valley Bridge Club.

Twenty teams from five clubs took part last year at the Waverley B.C. The Crofts Trophy (best Club performance) was won by Geelong and the Stokes trophy (best team on the day) was won by Waverley Team 3 (Alex Goss, Peter Goss, Elizabeth Vanselow and Robert Quirk).

The event is named after Nicole McManamny, a Waverley stalwart and Bridge fanatic.

In Club Teams competitions, each club selects up to five teams to play all day against other club teams. Pairs compete against pairs of a similar level.

Think about entering this fun competition and save the date in your calendar.

VICTORIAN RESTRICTED PAIRS

The Victorian Restricted Pairs final which is being held on 13th May.

This event is open to all players who are registered members of an affiliated Victorian Club and who have fewer than 300 masterpoints as of 31st December 2022.

The two top placed pairs win a place in the Australian Restricted Pairs Championship at the Australian National Championships in Perth in July, with the ABF providing a subsidy for the airfares and entry fee.

The Australian Bridge Federation (ABF) will reimburse the cost of airfares for the participants but will NOT be purchasing airline tickets. The participants will also receive \$250 towards accommodation. If the airfares purchased totals more than \$2200 per person, no accommodation subsidy will be issued. The ABF also pays the entry fee to the Restricted ANC.

Online Committee:

The Online Bridge Committee would like to thank everyone who completed the surveys, attended our live sessions and put their hands up to join our task force to prepare the draft strategic document on the future of online bridge for the ABF in time for their AGM in May.

Of the 2,491 responses to our player survey, 1770 of the respondents played on-line bridge in 2022 and 721 that had not. We also had 155 responses to our club/association survey. 31 of these had run online sessions in 2022 and 124 had not.

While looking through past documents on online bridge we came across the Australian Bridge of April 2003. In this Suzanne Eggins from Sydney wrote an article called 'Bridge in the Cyber Century'. Her opening line as 'Why Online Bridge May Save the Game'. Peter Gill also wrote an article in 2020, which can be found through this link https://petergillsite.wordpress.com/2020/08/12/is-online-bridge-here-to-stay/.

There are many opinions in this space and we as a group, including quite a few Victorians, are very hopeful by listening to all our stakeholders, we will be able present to the ABF a strategy which will help us preserve the wonderful game that we all love.

How can we get to the grand slam?

In the final of the Gold Coast pairs with fourteen excellent partnerships, two pairs bid 7 \checkmark , two pairs bid 7 \bigstar , one pair bid 6 \bigstar and the other nine pairs (including us) played in 6 \checkmark . Therefore, I don't feel so bad but it still would have been nice to bid and make a grand slam.


Answer:

These freak hands are always tricky to bid but rather than bid 5, it has been suggested that you bid 6 instead. Now partner knows that you can bid 6 when they could have nothing at all but they have three s to the Q and the A. A good partner can bid the grand slam fairly confidently.

WHAT NEXT IN DEFENCE? - April Solution



Given this dummy, you really need three \diamond tricks to defeat the contract (any black suit cards that West has are able to be finessed if South can get to their hand).

If partner has the A and three or four s in total, and if you lead the J specifically, then you will get them. What can declarer do? If declarer plays low, you can continue with either the K or a low I. If declarer plays the Q, partner wins and returns a t through dummy's T which you are hovering over with the K and 9. Curtains for declarer. Notice, if you don't switch to a t one of dummy's s goes off on declarer's K.

This play is called a 'surround coup'. Your middle card and third card are surrounding dummy's highest card.

Even if declarer and West's hands are swapped, this play doesn't cost a trick and if declarer has both the \blacklozenge A and Q, it doesn't cost a trick as declarer gets only the two \blacklozenge tricks they are entitled to receive.

NOTE: If declarer switches to either the \diamond K or \diamond 9, the defence will get only two \diamond tricks, if declarer guesses correctly.

West leads the \blacklozenge J.

There is no point dealing the inevitable. You win the trick with \diamond K and lead the \clubsuit Q and, after East plays a small \clubsuit , you let it run.

East wins the \clubsuit K and returns the \blacklozenge T and East throws a \bigstar .

Now you must find the $\triangle Q$ to make the contract.

Of course, you cash a few winners first and delay the decision.

Counting the opponent's cards.

West has six \blacklozenge s and East one (East discarded on this trick).

You cash the remaining \clubsuit tricks and West started with three and East two.

When you cash your three ♥ tricks both opponents follow.

Who has the **A**Q?


West has shown up with six \diamond s, three \clubsuit s and either three or four \forall s (they each followed to three rounds of \forall s so either could have the fourth one).

Therefore, West has zero or one \clubsuit cards.



BRIDGE HAND OF THE MONTH – March Solution

The following hand took place at the Yarra Valley congress.

Both North and South decided to take aggressive views in the auction. North by jumping to $3 \checkmark$ with a patchy suit and only 15 points. South then compounded the aggression by bidding 4NT with a lot of extras required from partner (that they didn't have).

Is there any chance of making this on a A lead from East?

The only possible chance revolves around the \blacklozenge K and J.

If your stars are aligned in your astrological chart, then the \bigstar K might be singleton in either the East or the West hand and playing the \blacklozenge A will drop it.

With about the frequency of Haley's Comet being viewed from Earth, another alternative is to lead the \diamond Q pinning the singleton \diamond J in West's hand or, perhaps, East is looking for Haley's Comet and does not cover the \diamond Q with the \diamond K.

For those not gazing at the stars, the only other chance is that East has four \clubsuit and the \blacklozenge K.

After drawing all the trumps, play A, K and ruff a small one.

Then play all your \clubsuit s and all but one of your trumps and, if East started with four \clubsuit s and the \blacklozenge K, this is the position.

When North leads the \checkmark 2, what is East to do? – throw the \clubsuit Q and setup the \clubsuit 7 or throw the \bigstar X and then South throws the \clubsuit 7. In the latter case, when North leads the \blacklozenge T then the \diamondsuit K falls.
