

What does an opening bid of 3NT mean?

The usual agreement is NOT that it's natural. Remember to ALERT it. A hand strong enough to make 3NT by itself would be opened with the "strong hand" opening bid in your system. In Basic ACOL that would be $2 \clubsuit$, in Benjaminised ACOL that would be $2 \spadesuit$.

An opening 3NT is often agreed to mean the "Gambling 3NT". It tells partner that opener has a solid (A K Q J x x x) suit in either Clubs or Diamonds and therefore that partner can rely on you for seven tricks in that minor, but nothing else. This means nothing higher than a Queen in any of the other three suits.

- ♠ 3 2
- **♥** J 10
- 3 2
- * A K Q J 4 3 2



Responding to Gambling 3NT

Partner's role is to consider whether they can stop a run by the opponents in the other three suits. If they can, two more tricks will also come. With:

- A 3 2
- ♥ Q J 10
- KQ432
- ***** 3 2

Partner can pass, knowing the solid minor in opener's hand must be Clubs.

- ♠ 432
- ♥ K Q J 10
- Q 4 3 2
- ***** 3 2

Partner should bid 4*, allowing opener to pass or correct to 4* as appropriate.

There are plenty of variations on this theme, so discuss it with partner!
