



Dummy Reversals




Normally in a suit contract, a declarer uses the short trump suit in dummy to ruff losers. A Dummy Reversal flips this concept around so that declarer's long trumps are used for ruffs, and dummy's suit is used to draw trumps.

A Dummy Reversal entails ruffing in the long trump hand (your own) sufficient times to turn it into the short trump hand. Opposing trumps will be drawn with dummy's trumps, typically 3 to 4 cards in length and usually high.

(Assume unlimited entries in both hands.)




Now he crosses to the A♣ and ruff the last ♦.

Declarer then draws trumps in dummy by overtaking his Q♥. His other ♠ trick will be his 10th trick.







It looks like 7H depends upon the ♠ finesse, which happens to fail.

But a **Dummy Reversal** might be a better line of play.

South

♠ A(6)

♥ KQ(00)

♦ 5

♣ KQ(4)

and the Q♥.

By ruffing ◆'s on the long side of trumps and later drawing trumps on the short side, declarer comes to 13 tricks while avoiding the risk of a ♠ finesse.
