Friday - Teach, Learn, Play!

Taking the good players to the cleaners ... and when to balance and when you need to go home quietly and have a nice cup of tea instead.

So another "column" I would like to encourage others to contribute to in the spirit of encouraging our beginning players ... good players may seem to be infallible and yet they sit down at your table and sometimes leave with egg splattered all over their faces.

Here is one that happened to me this month, sitting down against Minnie Mitchell and Pat Miller at a Monday afternoon game where George and I were nailing down our agreements in anticipation of the GNTs.

On board 25 I am W with EW vul NS not and Pat opens non-vul as dealer as N my left opens 1H, and both hands pass to me – do I pass it out and let her play 1H? What is going on?

I held:

◆ Q852◆ J87653

♣ KJ3

And the thick plottens ...


So what do we know? N opened 1H but not 2N or 2C, so is likely limited to 19 points and her partner passed, so likely limited to 5 points, and didn't choose to jump in with a preemptive heart raise, or upgrade to a simple raise. So my partner likely has long hearts, and yet did not overcall 1N, so likely doesn't have 15-18 with a heart stopper. Normally when the auction goes 1? PP? you question whether partner has a so-called trap pass – a X by partner would be for takeout, so with a penalty double of 1H, partner must pass hoping that you will reopen with a X which partner will pass.

Looking at my hand, it is very likely my partner has long hearts, and was hoping I would reopen with a X that he was planning to pass. Down 2 or 3 doubled would be an excellent score for us. So I cooperated and reopened with a X, and George made a perfectly reasonable pass, and Pat had a very easy time taking the 8 tricks for 1HX+1 and a score or +260. We consoled ourselves that it could have been held to +160 (an easy 7 tricks).

What went wrong?

A key point is that George does *not* have a 1N overcall and could have Xed himself – and I trust my partner. George might strain to takeout X with 4 spades, and would overcall with 5 spades and most remaining hands. So we likely have a diamond fit – can we stop in 2D (which I guess I want to), or will he bid 3N if I balance and he has the presumed heart holding but not enough to defeat 1H given my very sad 7 point hand?

And the answer is that if I had put all of that together, it would have been clear to me that George was going to pass a X of 1H, and that if I bid 2D then we would end up in 3N and unless the diamonds produced 5 or 6 tricks then we would be in serious trouble. I should simply pass and hope to take a plus score if we can set 1H, or a small minus score if we can't, and give up on the optimal score of a small diamond partscore, which we cannot get to.



And so, this is the winner the March "Doofus of the Month" award, which will be a self-nominated confession. I hope it will become a regular feature of our better players looking back on a decision and saying to themselves – weeeellll that probably wasn't my best bridge decision, and presenting it as a learning opportunity for others.

There will be nightly buses to various restaurant areas, which will need a coordinator, so if you were planning on dining in Greektown one evening, you may as well volunteer to coordinate the bus.
