Chicago Duplicate Bridge Moving to the North Side

On April 29 the Board met and approved a new lease for Chicago Duplicate Bridge at the Century theatre building at Clark and Diversey. The space was formerly occupied by Victoria's Secret and is large enough to hold local tournaments or other events. The lease will be effective on May 1, at which time we will be installing a kitchenette and making other repairs. The move will take place toward the end of June, with a scheduled opening for games as of July 1. We will be looking for volunteers to help with packing, moving, and preparing the space for use. A Brief Lesson: Negative doubles, and when you cannot use Blackwood

Your hand:

S KJ63

H 93

D_{AJ3}

CAKQ9

You are vulnerable and your opponents are not. Your partner opens 1C in first seat, and your right-hand opponent overcalls 2H.

So you have quite a lot going on: a potential 4-4 spade fit, a potential club fit, and enough points that you should be sniffing at slam. **There is no rush.** You can start with a negative double (which is virtually forcing) and show your values and shape with your next bid.

How many points should a negative double show, and how should partner respond? I like the 7-9-11-13 scheme where a negative double at the 1 level shows 7 high card points; at the 2 level shows 9 points; 3 level, 11points; and 4 level, 13 points.

With any of the family of takeout doubles (which includes takeout, negative, responsive, and support doubles), each side is expected to bid the extent of their hand while assuming partner is minimum. Therefore, your double at the 2 level leads your partner to assume you have 9 points and 4 spades.

Partner bids 4S, agreeing on spades. Wow! How bad was that 2H bid? Your partner should have in the region of 16 playing points (because partner assumes you have only 9, so must have the remainder to get to game), perhaps with shortness somewhere. From your hand, it

looks like you have about 34 playing points, so it's up to you to keep the auction open and explore the possibility of a slam.

So how could the slam fail? Well, you could be off two aces, but that is unlikely. The thing that should scare you is being off the first two heart tricks.

Don't use Blackwood (or any of its variants) with a void. Don't use it if there is the danger of being off two fast losers.

The risk of being off the A and K of hearts is high, so you can't use Blackwood.

A bid of 5C would show the club ace, 5D would show the diamond ace, and 5H would show a heart control, probably the ace or a void (which you obviously don't have). What should 5S mean?

And this is where a rarely encountered convention applies: the *Voluntary Bid of Five of a Major*. By a process of elimination it should show two fast losers in the opponents' suit. It invites your partner to bid 6S with the A or protected K of hearts.

Mentor night is intended to be nurturing, and we hope to see many of you there. And there's a bonus every month: Director Dave Schroeder bakes a treat—cookies, brownies—whatever strikes his fancy. I/N players are welcome, regardless of whether you have a partner. But it is important to email Dave in advance and we will find you a partner. If you have a partner to play with, great; again, please let Dave know in advance. Mentors: If you are available, email us and we will match you up.
