

Bridge Academy is Up and Running

The new Bridge Academy, spearheaded and directed by John Dukellis, is underway. John has begun teaching a new series of classes at the Bridge Center on Monday mornings at 9:00 a.m. The first class in this new series began on March 7 and had twelve students, four who are already Bridge Center "regulars," and eight new faces. The first class covered responses to minor suit openings. Future classes will cover weak twos, strong opening bids, Bergen raises, inverted minors, and other popular conventions. Future courses scheduled for Monday mornings will cover two-over-one bidding and slam bidding.

John has also reinstituted "assisted play" on Thursday mornings for members of the Monday classes. Students play hands designed to complement the lesson material. They can ask questions and review the hands with an experienced mentor at each table.

In addition to John's classes, Fran Pilch is currently teaching a free class on Wednesday mornings at the Senior Center covering bridge basics for novices, beginning with "What is a trick?" At the class on March 9, the students reviewed hand evaluation, how to use a bidding box and 1 NT opening bids. Hopefully, these students will soon progress to playing at the Bridge Center in a new 99er game that is being planned.

More information about the Bridge Academy is on the bulletin boards to the left of the big chalkboards at the Bridge Center. If you know someone who would like to learn or improve their bridge, please let John know.

Annual awards:

2021 Unit 360 Mini-McKenney Winners and Ace of Clubs Winners

Each year the ACBL recognizes, with the Mini-McKenney Masterpoint awards, the ACBL members who earn the most MP's in sanctioned tournaments and clubs (excluding NAP/GNT qualifiers and STaCs) within a calendar year. This race is named after William E. McKenney. Mr. McKenney was ACBL's first executive secretary and remained at the helm until 1947.

There also are the Ace of Clubs awards, that are like the Mini-McKenney Master points awards, but only black points are counted. This award was created in 1984, and in 2011, the Ace of Clubs award was renamed after Helen Shanbrom, the most successful club player in ACBL history.

There are 15 race categories in each award ranging from 0-5 MP's to 10,000+. A player is placed in a category based on his/her MP totals at the beginning of a given year.

I have posted a list of each award of Unit 360's top three finishers per race on the Awards Bulletin Board at the Bridge Center. If you would like a copy of the lists, please contact me.

What is the Barry Crane 500?

The ACBL member who has accumulated the most masterpoints during the calendar year wins the Barry Crane Top 500 race. Originally the McKenney Trophy, it was put into play by William E. McKenney, ACBL executive secretary. It was known as the McKenney Trophy contest from 1937-1981. When the list was expanded to include the leading 500 players it was called the Top 500 from 1982-1985. It became the Barry Crane Top 500 in 1986. Crane, who was murdered in July 1985, was ACBL's top masterpoint holder and was acknowledge by his peers to be unequalled as a masterpoint winner and a matchpoint player. His influence on the race was dominant for more than three decades.

I started to play bridge in 2015, after I retired from teaching. Phyllis Dunn was kind enough to invite me to her home to explain the difference between spades, hearts, diamonds and clubs, etc. That's how little I knew when I started. I thought bridge would be really easy and really fun. Just like I thought golf would be easy and fun. Well, golf is NOT easy, I found out, and not even fun for me. 
