12-14 *HCPs*

A balanced hand:

- No voids
- No singletons
- No more than one doubleton
- No six-card suit
- Could have a 5-card major

Not a forcing-bid

Only three hand shapes:

o 5-3-3-2

0 4-4-3-2

o *4-3-3-3*

A limit bid:

3-point range: 12 13 14

Opener will only rebid if asked a question by partner



Why play in a major suit fit?

Game in a major suit: Game in no trumps:

Control Could lose control

Extra winners from ruffing No ruffing opportunities

30 points per trick 40 then 30 points per trick

Game is 10 tricks Game is 9 tricks

30+30+30+30 + 300 = 420 40+30+30 + 300 = 400





A conventional bid does not mean what it says







The Stayman Convention

A bid of 2 in response to partner's opening bid of 1NT

Tells opener you hold a 4-card major

Asks opener if they have a 4-card major

Hoping to find a 4-4 major suit fit

A **forcing** bid - the opener cannot pass

It does not mean clubs - not a natural bid*



Sam Stayman - American tournament bridge player from the 1940s into the 1980s His partner invented the convention and named it after Stayman, who brought it into popular use

Responses to 1NT-2. "Have a four-card Major?"

Forcing bid - opener must answer the question

With one of the following three *responses*:

- 2 No, I don't have any four-card major
- 2 Yes, I have four+ hearts, says nothing about spades
- 2 Yes, I have four+ spades, I do not have four hearts

There are no other *responses*

Again, East could easily *bid* 3NT with 16 *points* opposite *opener's* minimum of 12 *points...* but if we *bid* Stayman we're looking for a possible 8-card fit first

Again, East could easily *bid* 3NT with 16 *points* opposite *opener's* minimum of 12 *points...* This is why *Stayman* is a *forcing bid* - we must not lose out on a *game contract*

Summary: How to continue the bidding

Responder's continuations

If no *major suit* is found:

- Bid 2NT invite with 11-12
- Bid 3NT bid game with 13-18

If major suit fit is found:

- *Bid* 3♥ or 3♠ *invite* with 11-12
- *Bid* 4♥ or 4♠ *game* with 13-18

Balanced invite, asking: "if 14 HCPs, bid 3NT"

Summary: When to use Stayman

Partner has opened the bidding with 1NT

and

Responder has at least an invitational hand (11 or more HCP)

and

Responder has at least one 4-card major

and

Responder has a rebid available if a major suit fit is not found

Don't lose a spade fit

3NT = game values (13-18) and four+ spades

4♠ = I also have four+ spades - we have a spade *fit* and *game*!

3♠ = I also have four+ spades - we have a spade fit but not game

2NT = invitation values (11-12) and four+ spades

4♠ = I also have four+ spades - we have a spade *fit* and *game*!

With both *majors* West shows the hearts in *response* to *Stayman*. East must have spades to *bid* like this, else why use *Stayman*? So West converts 3NT to 4, a far superior *contract*.

With a balanced 10 points West is not strong enough to raise to 2NT, so it would be unwise to use Stayman. 1NT is quite high enough on these hands.

Pass if partner bids 2 or 2 - you have found a good fit and have no interest in going to a game contract

Whatever *opener* replies, bid 3, which is a *weak-takeout* into clubs You have a minimum of 8 club cards between the two *hands*

Bid 3♣ if partner bids 2♦ or 2♥, as with the previous hand, this is a weak-takeout into clubs

Pass if partner bids 2 - you have luckily found a spade fit so don't need to show your club suit

Summary: Weak Stayman - hand types?

Weak hand with at least 5-4 in the majors

or

Weak hand with long diamonds and support for both majors or

Weak hand with at least six clubs, a weak clubs take-out

Weak Stayman or Rescue Stayman or Garbage Stayman

Review

Stayman is a convention bid

Use to find a major suit fit after a 1NT opening

Use with *invitational* (11) or *strong hands* (12+)

Opener has only three possible rebids: 2 or 2 or 2

Extension - Stayman with weak hands - just be careful!

Other examples of Stayman... (if we have time)

these will need pre-arranged partnership agreements...

Stayman over partner's 2NT opening bid

Partner's 2NT opening bid promises 20-22 HCPs and a balanced hand

Opener might have one or both four-card majors

With one or both four-card majors you might try to find a fit

- To respond 3♣ with a four-card major you need 5+ HCPs
- If partner rebids 3 or the wrong four-card major, you need enough points to rebid 3NT



Stayman after partner's 1NT overcall


Partner's 1NT overcall promises 16-18 HCPs with stopper/s in the opponent's suit

Opener might have one or both four-card majors

With one or both four-card majors you might try to find a fit


- To respond 2 with a four-card major you need 8+ HCPs
- If partner rebids 2 → or the wrong four-card major, you need enough points to rebid 2NT (8) or 3NT (9+)
