GCBA WINTER PROGRAMME

The first County match of the season saw a poor start, the highlight being a 10-10 draw for the Markham team. This was against Warwickshire who won the top two divisions last year!

GCBA RESULTS

The Winter Swiss Teams kicked off with 11 teams and the first two matches; the leading team is Richard Butland & Garry Watson, with Keith Stanley (and Patrick Shields as a sub). In second place was the "Angseesing" team – this time Martin McWilliam & Mike Wignall with two subs.

The Winter Pairs had one session, the winners of which were Roy Collard & Pam Pearce followed by Malcolm Green & Mike Lewis.

The County League, has started and the top score went to the Wearmouth team in Division One (a 20-0 win), while Mary Jones' team is leading Division Two after its 13-7 win.

In the County Ladies' Pairs 6 pairs competed and the winners were Mary Jones & Cynthia Moore (a record 5th win) ahead of Lesley Harrison & Pam Pearce (winners in 2015). In the County Men's Pairs 14 pairs competed and the winners were Paul Denning & Kanwar Rahim ahead of Tony Letts & Garry Watson.

In the Midlands Counties Pairs championship for the Edgar Foster Cup, the winners were our Ian & Val Constable. We also had 5th place in John Arblaster & Mel Barlow, but Warwickshire picked up the prize for overall best county performance.



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Discards & Signals

One of the trickiest things on any hand is to know whether your signals will be more help to partner or to declarer. We normally trust that partner is watching and declarer is not, but just sometimes ...



West was in 3N on a spade lead and ducked the first round but won the second. There were nine clear tricks and the obvious candidate for a tenth was the club finesse. The first step however was to cash the diamonds.

It was important here to cash them in the right order – to extract as many discards as possible from the opposition. So declarer played the ace, king, jack and over to the queen.

North had two discards to make and first threw the \$3 (encouraging clubs) and then a heart, while South threw two non-descript clubs. This allowed West to re-assess the club finesse.

While false carding does happen, most defenders are remarkably honest in these positions. So declarer trusted that the club finesse was a waste of time, and proceeded by cashing the top two hearts and then – after checking that the club ace would never get lost - exited in spades. In the end position North had to lead a club into the AQ. Can we trust your signals next time we see you?

venture а ioint with In Cheltenham Bridge Club (phase 1, other locations later) the GCBA is launching GYB to give those still at school the chance to learn bridge in the County. This is a pre-cursor to having bridge taken up as an activity within schools, for which we need a certain critical mass with which to start.

The sessions will be running 0930-1215 on Sundays, starting on Sunday 29th October. The cost of a session is £5, to cover rent of the building and snacks; any profits will be put back into teaching materials.

We are also running FREE Taster Sessions during half-term to allow children and their parents and carers to learn a little about the game before planning a regular attendance. Favourite Conventions

The challenge was made a little while back to name and order one's favourite conventions. There was no doubt about top of my list - it is the takeout double. Although everyone will use this on a regular basis, there are many occasions when it is not used and people are missing out because of this.

On the opening bid front, the most common omission is the use of double over a $4 \checkmark$ or $4 \spadesuit$ opener as takeout. The world is bidding a lot more now than ever before (following the advice I've just been reading in lain Macleod's 1952 book!) and if you don't have double for takeout you will lose points to those who have learned to preempt more vigorously.

In fourth seat after partner passes and you hear a suit response it is clearly for takeout, but this should also apply when third seat made a 1N response. In this case it is takeout of the suit opened (and should be alerted).

Another fourth seat position is when partner overcalls and third hand bids a natural 1N. Defeating this is notoriously difficult and doubling here for takeout (showing the other two suits) is very useful.

Even after we have found a fit, say it went 1♥-1♠-2♥-4♠, double for takeout is much better than bidding on, as partner might have four spades opposite your void, and doubling gives partner the chance to pass.

In my book, the occasions when double is for penalty can be easily listed: partner's redouble or a double of an opening 1N (or certain artificial bids) establish the desire to seek a penalty and after that double is not takeout. Otherwise takeout.
