Welcome to the English Bridge Education & Development (EBED) Simultaneous Pairs!

The proceeds from this event will support EBED, the national charity dedicated to promoting and developing duplicate bridge. At EBED, we focus on two key priorities:

- Youth bridge initiatives aimed at encouraging students in full-time education to learn and play bridge.
- A national bridge education and training framework to support bridge teachers.

Youth bridge is experiencing a revival, with increasing participation in EBED's camps and competitions. The Schools Cup in March had 32 tables—the largest turnout in over 25 years. EBED runs three youth camps annually: the **Spring Camp** in April, the **Summer Camp** in late August, and the **Autumn Camp** in late October. EBED generously provides bursaries and travel support, as each camp operates at a loss of approximately £5,000.


New schools are launching bridge clubs, and EBED offers equipment and support. In collaboration with **New Tricks**, EBED is about to launch a new youth learning website featuring instructional videos, quizzes, and 240 set hands on **2 over 1**, allowing young players to learn independently. Over the next six months, EBED's youth team will introduce a major initiative to establish bridge clubs in sixth-form colleges and universities.


Additionally, EBED is revising its **teacher training and directors' courses**, incorporating online components to improve efficiency for participants. EBED is also hosting **Teacher Cluster Meetings**, providing local teachers with opportunities to share best practices and receive demonstrations of materials available in the **Teaching Hub**. Over the next few months, EBED will be improving it communication to English Bridge Teaching Association members by providing more frequent newsletters with input from its members, an online forum, and a completely new website.



But even after 2♣ I would expect East to bid 3♣, which would end the auction. With the heart finesse right, careful play should result in 11 tricks for EW. When declarer finds out about the 4-0 trump break, he should turn his attention to diamonds. With four tricks outside trumps (two hearts and two diamonds), it should not be beyond declarer's skill to make seven trump tricks. Board 3: Dealer South: EW vulnerable West North South East Pass 1 • 1 2♣ Dbl 3♦ All Pass West's opening bid looks normal. North's double is aggressive, but it is a good idea to get into the bidding, especially non-vulnerable. Over 24, West is worth 3 ♦ despite holding only 14 HCP. That seventh diamond is well worth the upgrade. No-one has any reason to proceed and 3. becomes the final contract. It looks as if declarer will lose just two diamonds and a spade. High-level competitive judgement needed here! After North's weak No Trump, East dares a 2♥ overcall at unfavourable vulnerability. Assuming no particular methods, South tries a forcing 3 , West supports hearts, and North supports spades. When the auction comes back to West, he thinks his partner would have a bit more at the vulnerability, and so he ventures 5♥, doubled by North with his three aces, and passed out. As it happens NS can make 11 tricks in spades, while EW make ten in hearts. So the decision to go to 5♥ was a winning one, and NS would

have done better to bid on to 5, even at the favourable vulnerability.

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West has a terrible choice of opening leads. There are a lot of close

decisions to be made, both by declarer and the defenders. I would

expect some to make and some to fail. Maybe 1NT is an OK place after


