Changing the subject, the Double Dummy Bridge Problem I included in Newsletter No.3 was a real challenge and for those of you that are still trying to work it out. The solution is below:-

- 1. On the lead of 7 of diamonds put up the Ace from dummy and unblock the Ace and King of hearts
- 2. Lead a trump from dummy and after winning the trick lead a heart discarding the queen of diamonds on West's queen of hearts.
- 3. Ruff the club return from West and ruff a diamond in dummy
- 4. Draw the remaining trumps and win the last tricks with the long hearts

I managed to deliver the promised Easter Egg to Colin Christmas (not personally) this week so his Easter celebration was longer because of the delay.!!!

In last week's newsletter Lesley Lewis posed a bidding problem for you to consider. Here is the hand again and how she and her partner playing North/South bid -.

Lesley explained that the 1NT by West responding to partners 1 heart was the only possible bid as the hand was not strong enough to bid 2 diamonds. The 2 spades bid by North assumed the double by South was indicating spades. Fortunately the 3 hearts doubled by south resulted in a top for North/South

In conclusion, my 'spice' of life looks something like this -
