
Matters Arising 120

being some thoughts prompted by hands played at Kendal BC 27 Feb - 3 Mar 2023




On this deal from Monday North passed and the bidding then proceeded around the table 1D - X - 1S - 2H. Further aggressive bidding from East and South left West in 4S facing the KH lead. Over to you.

The bidding suggests that South has most if not all the remaining high cards, so there is a good chance the AS is onside. With a normal trump break that means 3 spade tricks, AH and 4 clubs (probably). That is 8 tricks. Two more could come from heart ruffs, but whilst declarer can return to hand via AC to achieve one ruf, there is no way back for a second one. That would be one off.

A different plan is needed. If South has both top diamonds, quite possible on the bidding, then there is a ruffing finesse available to set up diamonds for heart discards.

At T2 lead a small diamond towards the 9. In the unlikely event that the 9 holds we can revert to our original thoughts as we now have 2 entries to ruff the hearts. More probable though is that South wins and plays Ace other spade to reduce ruffing possiblities.

Declarer wins, crosses to dummy with KC and leads QD with intent to discard a heart if South follows low, and to repeat the process. If South covers West ruffs, returns to table via a club and runs the diamonds. The defence can ruff in with their boss trump when they like, but will win no more.



We have often met hands where we don't draw trumps as we need one or more for ruffs. Here declarer leaves trumps alone so that those on table can act towards the defence like a menacing night club bouncer: *make my day punk, lead a heart.*

Negative Double

Thursday board 3, and a non-vulnerable North dealt and opened 1D on the above hand.

If East overcalls 1H and South contributes 1S what does North know about the South hand?

Clearly South has spades and enough to reply, but a negative double also shows spades. For many partnerships the difference between

1D - 1H - 1S and 1D - 1H - Xis that the former promises 5 spades and the latter 4.


The same would be true for the difference between 1C - 1H - 1S and 1C - 1H - X.

However the difference between

1C - 1D - 1S and 1C - 1D - X

is that the latter shows both majors whereas the former shows only spades, and hence possibly only four.

Armed with the knowledge of an 8 card spade fit North knows not to simply rebid diamonds, and is well placed to cope with further enemy interference such as a heart raise by West.
