Lesson 5: Holding Up in a No Trump Contract

A No Trump contract is a race. If you are in 3 No Trump, your goal is to take nine tricks before your opponents take five. You don't have a trump suit to protect you from the opponents running their long suit. You count the winners you have "off the top," that is, without giving up the lead, then see if there is a way to develop enough additional tricks to make your contact.

Hold Up strategy employ as declarer to try to keep your opponents from running their long suit on you. The idea is, when the defenders lead your weakest suit, you refuse to win enough times so RHO does not have any more cards in the opening leader's long suit. This severs the opponents' communications. RHO no longer can use the opening leader's suit to get his or her partner back on lead.

A key to this strategy is the Rule of Seven. When the defenders lead your weakest suit, you add the number of cards you have in that suit in hand with the number of cards your dummy has in the suit, and subtract this number from seven. The answer is the number of times you should hold up before winning the lead. Keep in mind, you should only hold up when the defenders lead your weakest suit and there may be other considerations which take priority over this Rule of Seven.

Your partner now knows you are 2 suited with Clubs and Diamonds, and 12-16 points. Other **poor** options than bidding 2C:

Pass: New suit from an unpassed hand, forcing, don't pass.

1S: Must have 4-card Spade suit

1N: 1N denies 4 Spades and shows 2-3 Hearts

2D: Rebidding your suit shows 6-card Diamond suit

2H: Must have 4-card Heart suit

If the bidding had gone: 1C 1H 2D

Bidding **2D** is a Reverse. Forcing your partner to the 3 level. For a Reverse, must have 17+ points, 1st suit longer than the 2nd suit. This is why we open 1D and not 1C, to avoid Reversing.





When East wins the lead with their Ace of Clubs, they are unable to return a Diamond to West. Whatever East plays, South will get in and run Clubs. South makes a minimum of 9 tricks, maybe 10 if opponents do not defend properly.

If South did not hold up twice, East gets in with the Ace of Clubs and returns a Diamond to partner. West will run Diamonds and contract down one instead of making game.
