Squeasy!

A **squeeze** is an advanced form of endplay that less experienced players may believe is beyond their skill level. Not so! Often squeezes happen automatically and all you need to do is pay a little bit of attention to your opponents' discards. Look at this hand (East is dealer) from a recent game at the club:

	♦J92 ♥7653 ♦74 ♣9832	
★K107643 ▼K9 ◆A8 *J104		AQ85 ♥A82 ♦KQ62 ♣A6
	♣ -♥QJ104◆J10953♣KQ75	

West was declaring an overzealous 7♠ arrived at via this pushy auction:

$$1 \leftarrow -1 \triangleq 4 \leftarrow -4NT; 5 \leftarrow -5 \checkmark; 6 \leftarrow -6NT; 7 \triangleq -4NT; 7 \triangleq -$$

4NT was RKC 1430; 5♦ showed 3 controls; 5♥ asked about the ♠Q; and 6♦ promised that card and the ♦K. West was looking for a good matchpoint score and bid 6NT instead of the obvious ♠6. East thought 6NT was a grand slam try and that 7♠ was the place to play.

The opening lead was the ♠2 (a trump lead is almost always correct against a grand slam). There are 12 top tricks and East needed to find a 13th. Dummy's 4th diamond seemed the most likely candidate.

When South discarded the ♣5 on the first trick, it was clear that she was more likely to have length in diamonds, so West focused on her discards. Declarer finished pulling trumps, South discarding the ♥4 and ♦3. They were playing upside down signals, so it appeared South liked all the non-trump suits!

One of the most important steps in any squeeze is to continue leading your long suit to put pressure on the opponent(s) you are trying to squeeze. On the 4th trump, South discarded the \$7. She was now down to these remaining cards \$QJ10, \$J1095, \$KQ.

When West played a 5th trump – discarding the ♣6 from dummy – what was South to do? She was automatically squeezed in all three suits! If she throws a diamond, dummy's 4th diamond becomes declarer's 13th trick; if she discards a club honor, the other top club will fall under dummy's ♣A and West's clubs are now good! She reluctantly let go of the ♥10, clearly her best choice, hoping that North could guard hearts. Unfortunately for the defenders West has the ♥9, and

after cashing the ▼AK, dummy's ▼8 is promoted to the 13th trick.

I call this a "squeasy," an easy squeeze that happens automatically. Whenever you find yourself a trick short of your contract, keep your head up and your eyes open, cash your winners in the proper order and you might find a squeasy too.

JULY 12, 2021



A quorum being present, the meeting of the Board was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by our club president, Pete Marvin. Officers and board members present were Kaye Stanley (Vice President), Rick Lowens (Treasurer), Becky Bien (Secretary), David Cockcroft, Lou Casteel, Mary Anne Wildman (via conference call), Nancy Speer, Richard Johnson, and Tom Wahl. Also present were John Mueller (Immediate Past President), Dick Heil (Club Manager), Dick Chapman (Lead Director) and Diane Lord (representing The Bridge House). In addition, club members attending were Richard Kalkbrenner and Mary Jane Weindorf. Minutes of the June 14 meeting were approved.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Pete led in a discussion regarding a proposed increase in game Director compensation. After reviewing financial information regarding an increase, a motion was made, seconded, and passed to increase the fee for non-playing directors in face-to-face games at the club to \$4.00 per table, or a minimum of \$40 (plus the current practice of one free play coupon). The increase will go into effect Monday, July 19. Compensation for playing directors (\$25 and playing free in that game) and virtual club game directors (\$25 for one event, \$35 for two concurrent events, and \$45 for three concurrent events) will remain the same.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Rick Lowens distributed a Statement of Income and Expense report for January 1 to June 30, 2021, and a summary of bank account balances as of June 30, 2021. He stated the club is financially stable.

CLUB MANAGER'S REPORT: Dick Heil reported on the special games scheduled for August which includes a STaCs (Sectional Tournament at Clubs) week awarding silver points, and "Super Welcome

Back Games" which will be upgraded to Club Championship rated at 3.75 X masterpoints! A full schedule of August games will be included on the calendar in the *August Newsletter* and posted on the club's website.

"Stardust Week" will be held on BBO as virtual club games the week of July 26 to August 1. There will be no face-to-face games held at the club that week. Game starting times are included on the July calendar.

Wi-Fi access is available at the club (LRDBC with the passcode of Jacoby2NT). The club's new telephone number is 501-615-8720.

GAME DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT:

Dick Heil, reporting for Carolyn Stowers, outlined recommendations from the Game Development Committee regarding the Friday night game. A motion was made, seconded, and passed that the Friday night game be terminated immediately on the virtual game schedule, and resumed at the club effective August 13. The game will include the option for players to participate in a potluck dinner prior to the game. Dick Chapman has agreed to direct the games and will work on a timeframe that will allow players to finish the games at a reasonable hour.

THE BRIDGE HOUSE REPORT: Diane Lord stated LRDBC will resume paying full rent effective July 1, 2021. Rent had been reduced for a period when the club was closed due to the pandemic.

Richard Kalkbrenner presented <u>The Bridge House Fall</u> <u>2021 Education Program</u> schedule which includes the following:

- A free four-week refresher course for LRDBC members to be taught by Dick Heil. Beginning August 19, the course will be held four consecutive Thursdays, from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.
- A fall Open House (aimed at recruiting new club members) is scheduled for Tuesday, September 14, from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. Current club members will be requested to invite prospective members, and free play incentives will be given.
- Learn Bridge In A Day?® will be held Saturday, September 18, from noon to 5:00 p.m. Richard Kalkbrenner will be the instructor. Cost for the five-hour course is \$19.99. Club members will be encouraged to advertise this course to anyone interested in learning the basics of bridge.
- 4. Fall classes will begin the week of September 20. Classes will include bridge basics courses, play of the hand, etc. A full schedule of classes/instructors is being developed.

DIAMOND LIFE MASTER RECOGNITION:

The Board recognized the accomplishment of Gerald Koonce for earning the rank of Diamond Life Master (a Life Master with 5,000 masterpoints, of which 1,000 are silver/red/gold/platinum, of which 500 or more are gold/platinum). A pin with a diamond will be ordered and presented to Gerald.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:20 p.m. The next meeting of the board will be held at TBH on August 9, at 4:00 p.m.

Although I would daily read Charles Goren's bridge columns in the newspaper even as a child, I did not know how to play bridge until college, and even then I mostly played hearts and euchre for money in the student union.

My introduction to bridge came via a hearts game when Jackie Pate fooled me with a false card, which he explained was a well-known bridge tactic. When I told him I needed to learn that game, he invited me to play with him at the Bridge House on Durwood, where I picked up my first fraction of a masterpoint . . . and I was hooked.

Denny Hamilton and I agreed to play in the 0-50 game at the 1966 Little Rock sectional. That was my first tournament and even though I could not sit North because I did not know how to keep score (and we probably had the fewest number of masterpoints of

anyone playing that day) we won the event and a silver pecan tray. I was only 19 years old. The main advantage I had over other beginning bridge players was that even though I had never taken any lessons and hadn't read any bridge books, I knew how to play cards. I could execute an endplay and count the hands. But my bidding was primitive.

After enlisting in the Army and serving in Vietnam, I returned to college, graduating from Southwestern at Memphis (now Rhodes College) in 1973 and picking up my first regional victory in 1972 playing with Rod Roark, who wrote the OKBridge interface. We showed up at the Jewish Community Center one time and they wouldn't let us play because I was long-haired, barefoot and wearing cutoff jeans.

It took me 20 years to make life master, which only required 300 points then, and I went over with black points playing with Jackie Pate in the same club game where he and I had first played. If someone had told me then I would make diamond life master one day, I would have laughed.

I have been fortunate to have played over the years with a number of excellent players.

My first regular partner in Little Rock was Betsy Berry. I was working nights and weekends, so the only time I could play was in the morning game on one of my days off.

After I changed careers and began working regular hours, I then began playing regularly with Bonnie Melchior, which was my most successful partnership. I had not won an event at a tournament since 1972 until she and I won the masters pairs at the 1989 regional in Little Rock in a field loaded with top pros. In the years since then, she and I won more than 30 tournament events, including beating a team headed by Jeff Meckstroth in the top-flight of the knockouts at a Hot Springs regional and twice finishing first overall in an ACBL-wide charity pairs,

During that time, I also played regularly with Steve Kornegay, Janet Tetkoskie and Moe Schwartz, among others. I also played in my first Nationals with Al Childs, who taught me how to play the weak notrump. Other favorite semi-regular partners included Lois Jimerson and Dane Clay.

Most recently, my favorite partners included Jim Proctor, Allan Siebert, Robert Downie, Elaine Lowens and Becky Bien, who got me over the finish line to make Diamond Life Master after I had been stuck for almost two years. I am also grateful to David Cockcroft and Pete Marvin for agreeing to play Precision with me.

I am haunted by the number of masterpoints I have thrown away over the years by careless or thoughtless play (more than 500, if not 1,000)!
