Opener's rebid in first or second seat – some tips

Tip 1: Rebid in NT when you have a flat 4333 shape

Even though this hand has 4 spades, bid 1NT as it has a flat 4333 shape.
This immediately limits your hand and tells your partner that you have a minimum opening hand and a balanced hand.
1H 1S
?
A jump in NT shows a 18-19 HCP and a balanced or semi-balanced hand.
It is game forcing.
Raising responder's spades with only 3 card support would be wrong here as you have a better option and partner may only have 4 spades and you don't want to be in 4S with only a 7 card fit.

Tip 2: Generally, show your second suit before rebidding a six card suit

A	With a 6-4 shape or a 5-4 shape, show your second suit, particularly if it is a major suit. The exception would be if your second suit is a very poor minor suit and your first suit is very strong.

Tip 3: Don't rebid a suit responder has denied unless it serves a useful purpose
