## Opening Leads

- 1. Partner's Suit
  - a. high from two
  - b. low from three or more
- 2. Top of a Sequence
  - a. perfect sequence KQJT
  - b. broken sequence KQ>T8
  - c. Suit contracts need only a 2-card sequence KQxx lead the K
  - d. NT contracts need a 3-card sequence QJ9x similar to b above
- 3. Fourth from longest and strongest but NEVER from an A in a suit contract QT84 lead the 4
- 4. Unbid Suit
  - a. top of nothing 9764
  - b. low from an honor
- 5. Singleton if you have several trump and partner has bid, he might win the lead and give you a ruff
- 6. Three times when you should lead trump
  - a, A part-score has been doubled
  - b. When 3 suits have been bid and the 3rd suit becomes trump
  - c. One or both opponents show a strong hand, your lead should be a trump as you don't want to lead from an honor and help them with the play.

## Signals

When Partner leads a suit, you can tell him if you have help for him in that suit with the card you play. If you have an honor or shortness, play a high card. With K92, play the 9. If you have no shortness or help, play small. With the 963, play the 3.

## Current Count

When returning the suit partner has led, use current count. If you started with 3 cards and followed suit the 1st time, you have two left so you play top of two. If you started with 4 cards and followed suit the 1st time, you have 3 left, you play low.
