Member Profile - Bob Beecroft



The Club celebrated Bob Beecroft's 90th birthday at the December 14 Holiday Party with a birthday cake enjoyed by everyone. Bob has been an active bridge player for most of those 90 years. When Bob Beecroft moved to Toronto in the 1950s, Bob and his then future wife Jacqueline were introduced to bridge by Bob's brother and sister-in-law. They relatively quickly moved from kitchen bridge to duplicate bridge and Bob never stopped playing. Bob and Jacqueline played at duplicate bridge clubs in the Huron Park area of

Mississauga, in Oakville and eventually found their way to John Rayner's club. At some point along the way, a club had to abandon a policy of giving a free game to each winner because Bob was winning so many games.

Although Bob was often playing 4 – 5 times per week, he also had a long career in the food industry where he held supervisor positions with a couple of companies before arriving at Kellog's. Bob enjoyed working at Kellog's for many years; in Bob's view, an excellent employer.

Bob really enjoyed playing at John Rayner's club which he found to be very social with numerous opportunities to meet all kinds of interesting people. As Bob said to me, "points shmoints": He plays bridge to socialize. Beware, Bob has also been known to play euchre for money. Happy Birthday Bob!

Mobridge Year-End Update from President Lee Stem



In mid-September, I authored an update to our Mobridge members outlining our current status. I covered club activity for both Face-to-Face

and Virtual (via BBO) play, our financial status going forward, along with our nearterm plans for bringing our members back to the club to enjoy the game that we all love. As a reminder, some of the actions that we have implemented include:

- Continuous monitoring of attendance at our games and adjustments to our game schedules to cater to our members needs
- A revised annual membership program which includes new member benefits
- Prize draws for those playing at the club
- Special events which include the opportunity to get to know your fellow members
- Re-starting our in-person education programs
- Publishing a monthly members' newsletter

Your Board of Directors will continue to monitor our progress going forward and will do everything in our power "To provide a home for friendly, competitive bridge in a community of new to highly skilled players". Since taking over as President, I have been focused on the question "What will it take for Mobridge to survive and prosper?". I wish there were some simple answers to this question, but it is complicated since everyone has their own

motivations for playing bridge and individual views on what it means to them.

For me, the game of bridge was an amazing discovery. Although I grew up in a card-playing family, I was only vaguely aware of a game called "bridge" and lacked the time to take a closer look. Thanks to the support and encouragement of several close friends, my partner Laima (in life and in bridge) began the journey of learning this game which has ended up being a major source of entertainment and satisfaction in our retirement lives. Bridge has been a natural extension of my interests and drive - highly analytical and highly competitive. As a business consultant, I was used to solving complex problems. In my retirement world, bridge has provided an outlet for my skills in dealing with complex puzzles. Further, as my physical limitations have reduced my ability to be competitive in sports (I played squash 4-5 times a week through most of my adult life), attendance at club games and bridge tournaments have fed my need for competition and camaraderie. Having lived in Mississauga for close to 50 years, my community involvement before retirement was limited as I spent most of my time running a business (downtown) and raising a family. Membership in our bridge club has provided me with a wonderful social outing - an ideal connection to my community.

Together, Laima and I have experienced many significant changes in our lives due to the pandemic. From the bridge perspective, our only outlet to play was BBO. At the beginning, we participated in the virtual club games but found the experience lacking on several fronts. Not only was the social aspect of the game largely gone, but many of the challenges of playing in an in-person setting were

missing. We moved on to playing in the larger games offered through BBO (at a significantly lower cost). In these larger games, I have observed people doing things that they wouldn't try in an inperson game - making the whole thing a bit of a free-for-all. Some would argue that the virtual game is superior since it removes many of the nuances of playing with and against people in a live setting. For me, it helped to improve our game through the facilities to track and review all plays. However, virtual play has not provided the opportunity to get out and experience community life and (reason unknown) does not satisfy the competitive aspect of the game that I thrive on.

From my personal perspective, the success of a local bridge club providing opportunities for face-to-face play is very important. Although I understand that we all have different motivations for playing bridge and have many choices where to spend our time and money playing the game, I am disappointed with the uptake

of our re-opened club. The good news is we have the time to germinate a refreshed club environment at our new location. I believe that the Board has been doing many things right to create an environment for friendly and competitive bridge. However, at the end of the day, we need you, the members, to support the club through your regular attendance and by volunteering to do the many things needed to enhance the club experience. Remember, Mobridge is your club - a member-owned not-for-profit community club.

Please support the club – renew your memberships for 2023, volunteer to help out where you can (especially by supporting the host program and participating in the mentoring program), introduce your friends and family to the great game of bridge. Most of all, come out and participate!
