
Books on Bridge Defense

- One book written a long time ago, ended with this piece of really bad advice:
 - "When in doubt, lead trump."
- Another book written by a one-time national bridge champion, said:
 - "Never lead trump, except when it is right."


There are Obviously Times When You Shouldn't Lead Trump

- When it is likely to cost you a trick.
- When it is might cost partner a trick.
- When you have something more important to do.


When It Might Cost You a Trick

When You Have a Singleton



You Might Want to Lead Trump When:

- You need to protect high-card values.
- Partner has opened a strong no trump or, in some way has shown a strong balanced hand.
- Your opponents have taken a high-level sacrifice.
- You know they are depending on ruffing to gain tricks.

You Might Want to Lead Trump, When:

- An opponent shows a 3-suited hand.
- A bid of 2 →, in the precision system,
- Or with some hands playing Flannery
- Shows a 3-suited hand 11-15 points.
- Often their strength is based on ruffing power.
- It is unlikely, you can eliminate all their ruffing tricks, but if you can cut down on some of them, you might defeat the contract.

Summary: When to Lead Trump

- To protect high-card strength.
 - Partner shows a strong balanced hand.
 - Opponents are obviously sacrificing.
- You want to stop ruffs
 - Opponents show a 3-suited hand.
 - Opponents bid three suits and end up in the 4th.
 suit.
 - You have strength in declarer's first bid suit.

Summary: When to Lead Trump

- Partner has passed your 1-level takeout double.
- Partner does not balance, when the bidding indicates he has strength.
- The bidding indicates you should play a passive defense.
