Making Good Bidding Judgements

Partner Opens a Minor Suit

I Will Show You Some Hands

- They will be unusual hands.
- Partner will have opened a minor suit and the next player will have passed.
- I will give you a couple of choices for your bid, then talk about:
 - What you should be thinking about.
 - What you should bid.
 - Some of the bids will be difficult.
 - Some might be debatable.

- What should you be thinking about?
- You don't have enough points to bid anything at the 1 level.
- Their side has a spade fit.
- You have 1 chance, and 1 chance only, to make a bid.
- What if partner has hearts?

- What should you be thinking about?
- This is not a preempt hand.
- Your side has about half the points or more.
- Bid 1 ♥
- If LHO bids spades, partner will know about your hearts.
- If partner bids spades or no trump you will pass.
- You only have 1 bid with this hand. Make the best choice.

- ♦ A K 10 9 4

- What should you be thinking about?
- This is a completely different situation.
- You know your side is going to game.
- Bid 1 →. You can bid your ♥ later.
- It is possible that 6
 is your best contract.

- 1 **♦** 2 nt 3 nt

- What should you be thinking about?
- 13-15 points with little interest in slam.
- Both majors stopped.
- A good reason for your hand to be declarer.
- Bid 3nt.

- ◆ Q 7 5 4
- **♣** J 9 5 3

- 1 nt

- What should you be thinking about?
- If you play inverted minors, too strong for 3
- Diamond suit too weak for 2 .
- 1nt (6-10 points) describes this hand.

- **A** K 5 3 **→** 3 2
- A Q 4★ K Q 9 3
- 1 ♠ 2 ♣ 3 nt

- What should you be thinking about?
- Even if you play 2/1, some would suggest 1 ★.
- But with a hand this strong, you have a slam interest.
- Bid 2 ♣ then your ♠ suit.
- You can take your time to find a fit. And maybe slam.

- 1 **♥** 3 **♦** 4 **♦**

- What should you be thinking about?
- Your opponents surely have a spade fit.
- Maybe a double fit in clubs and spades.
- 3 → might be right.
- Better bid 4 ◆.
- If opponents then bid 4 ♠, partner can make a decision about a ♦ diamond sacrifice.

- What should you be thinking about?
- Your opponents surely have a spade fit.
- With 7-cards preempt at the 3-level.
- Bid 3 ♥
- If playing splinters....

- ★ K Q J 3
 ▼ 8 5 3 2
- **♦** 5 4 2
- **♣** 9 3
- 1 ♥ 2 ♠ 3 nt

- What should you be thinking about?
- Some might argue that your spade suit is so much better than your heart suit, you should bid spades and ignore the hearts.
- Bid your 4-card major suits up the line.
- If partner has spades, she will bid them.

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- What should you be thinking about?
- Bidding rules say you should bid 1 ★ with 5-5 distribution.
- There is no perfect bid here.
- 1 ♥ is probably best.
- If you bid 1 ★ and partner bids 2 ★ or 2 ◆ , you have no good bid.
- Yes, you might miss a 5-3 spade fit.

Some Final Thoughts

- When partner opens the bidding, you, as responder, are the one in charge.
- You must have an idea of where the hand is going.
- As you think about a response, you must think about what partner might rebid and what you will do when he does.
- If you are the opener, what your partner responds is important.
- What partner could have bid, but didn't bid, is also important.
