The Trouble With the Double

They Don't Always Mean What You Might Think

Doubles Have Many Meanings

- Even fairly experienced bridge players sometimes get confused.
- You and your partner should have a conversation about what a double in different auctions means.
- I will show you some common auctions in which a double appears. You tell me what the double means.

LHO You RHO Partner

1♠ pass 1nt dble

- **♦** 4 2
- ▼ K Q 3 2
- ♦ A J 7
- ♣ K 10 9 4

- This is a takeout double of 1♠.
- Same strength as if it were in the direct seat.
- Even if 1nt is forcing.
- Support for the unbid suits.
- Opening bid count.

LHO Partner RHO You 1nt dble pass ??

- Depends on the system you play
- Standard meaning is penalty, but many conventional meanings.
- Equal hand
- D.O.N.T. long suit
- Cappelletti Penalty.
- Talk it over with partner.

LHO You RHO Partner

- 1 ♣ pass 1♥ pass
- 2♥ pass pass dble

- ♠ Q 10 4 2
- **7** 3 2
- ◆ A Q J 7
- ◆ 9 4 2

- Reopening or balancing double.
- 8 to 11 points.
- Support for the unbid suits.
- If it was a full value takeout double, partner would have doubled at the first opportunity.

Partner RHO You LHO

1♥ pass 2 ♦ 2♠

dble pass ??

- **★** K J 8
- **Y** A Q 10 7 2
- **♦** 7 5
- ♣ K J 4

- Usually a penalty double.
- If you play 2/1 partner shows 5 diamonds and opening count.
- Don't confuse this with a support double.

What Does Partner's Double Mean? Support double

Partner RHO You LHO

1 → pass 1 → 2 ◆

dble

- **♦** KJ8
- ♥ Q 10
- ♦ K Q 7 5
- **♣** K 8 5 4

- Usually a support double
- Partner is showing 3-card support for your spade suit.
- This is a common convention, and does not need to be alerted.

You RHO Partner LHO 2 ◆ 1 2 ♥ dble 1weak

- **★** A 8 5
- **Y** K Q 10 9 7
- **8**
- **♣** A Q 7 5

- This is a penalty double.
- You have described your hand fully.
- Not a negative double.
- You make this double when you have length and strength in the opponent's suit.
- Plus other defensive tricks. .

RHO You LHO Partner

↑ 1

↑ dble

- **★** 85
- **Y** K 9 7 5
- ♦ 8 7 5 2
- ♣ A Q 7

- Depends on your agreement. .
- Most commonly a support double
- One convention is the Rosenkranz support double.
- 6-10 points with one of the 3 top honors in the overcalled suit.

RHO	You	LHO	Partner
1♥	pass	3♥	pass
4nt	pass	5♦	dble

- **♠** Q 8 5
- **♥** 7 5
- ♦ A J 8 7 5 2
- **♣** 9 7

- Lead directing double
- The double of an artificial suit bid is always lead directing.
- Here, partner is asking for a diamond lead.

RHO You LHO Partner 1nt pass 2♣ dble

- **A** A 8 5
- **7** 5 4
- **♦** 5 2
- ♣ KQJ97

- Lead directing double
- You make this double when you have some strength in the suit.
- You don't know where this auction is going.
- You expect to develop some defensive tricks.
- Don't make this double simply because you have the ace.

RHO You LHO Partner

1♣ dble 2♣ dble

- **♦** K 10 5 3
- KJ94
- ♦ Q 5 2
- **♣** 9 7

- Responsive double.
- Says, "partner, pick a major suit"
- Responsive double is on only when opponents bid and raise the same suit.
- Point count?
 - 6+ at the 2-level
 - 8+ at the 3-level
 - 10+ at the 4 level

RHO You LHO Partner

1 dble 2 dble

- **★** 10 5 3
- **y** 9 4
- ♦ Q10 5 2
- ♣ A J 9 7

- Responsive double.
- Says, "partner, pick a minor suit."
- Responsive double is on only when opponents bid and raise the same suit.
- Point count?
 - 6+ at the 2-level
 - 8+ at the 3-level
 - 10+ at the 4 level

RHO You LHO Partner
3♠ pass 4♠ dble

- **♦** K 10
- **A** J 10 9
- ♦ KQJ2
- ♣ A J 9

- Depends on agreement.
- Most common meaning is penalty.
- Must be prepared for partner to bid.
- Good defensive values.
- 15+ points
- Don't take this double out unless you feel pretty sure of your contract.

RHO Partner LHO You

4♥ dble pass

- **A** 5 3
- **Y** A 9
- ♦ Q10 5 2
- ♣ A J 9 7

- Depends on Agreement.
- Must be prepared for partner to bid.
- Good defensive values.
- 15+ points
- Don't take this double out unless you feel pretty sure of your contract.

You LHO Partner RHO

1nt 2♠ Dble

- **★** K J 5 3
- **Y** A 9 4
- ♦ Q 8 5 2
- ♣ 10 7

- Penalty double.
- You know partner's hand and you are in charge.
- Not a negative double.

Final Thoughts

- Doubles come in many forms.
 - Natural
 - Conventional
- Their use or misuse is the cause of many disagreements at the bridge table.
- Discuss with partner the meaning of your use of doubles.
