First Let's Look at Michaels Cue

- A cue bid of an opponent's minor suit opening shows both majors.
 - 1 ♣ and a direct 2 ♣ cue bid shows
 - • and
 • 5-5 distribution or better.
 - 1 ♦ and a direct 2 ♦ cue bid shows
 - • and 5-5 distribution or better
 - 1 ♠ and a direct 2 ♠ cue bid shows 5+ ♥ with a 5+ card unspecified minor suit
 - 1 ♥ and a direct 2 ♥ cue bid shows
 - 5 or more ★ with a 5+ card unspecified minor suit

How Strong Should the Michaels Bidder Be?

- You don't need a lot of points to bie Michaels.
- The bid is generally intended to be obstructive and preemptive.
- However, you and your partner should discuss how you want to handle a twosuited overcall.
- There are three options.

Strength Option 1

- Use the Michaels cue with any hand that meets the distribution guidelines.
- Point count 7+ points.
- For me this is too vague and not your best option.

Strength Option 2

- Use Michaels cue with any hand that has between 8 and 15 points.
- With 16+ points:
 - Overcall the higher ranking suit
 - Than overcall the lower ranking suit.
- For me, this is better than option 1.
- Partner at least has an clue of how good your hand is.

Strength Option 3

- Divide two-suit hands into 3 categories
 - 1. 6-12 points
 - 2. 13-17 points
 - 3. 18+ points
- Category 1: use Michaels cue but do not bid again unless forced by partner.
- Category 2: Try to overcall both suits.
- Category 3: Use Michaels cue, then make an additional bid to show partner your strength.

Responses to Michaels Cue

- If partner used the michaels cue and your RHO passes, you must select a suit
 - If partner's bid shows both majors, pick your best major.
 - After you make your choice, partner will not bid again, unless she has the 18+ hand.
 - If partner's bid shows a major and a minor, you can ask partner to show the minor suit by bidding 2 no trump.

Some Examples

- **♦** K 2
- **Y** 3 2
- ♦ k 10 7 5
- ♣ Q J 9 4 3

LHO Partner RHO You 1 → 2 → Pass 2 ♥

When you have a doubleton in both of partner's suits, bid the lower.

- **♠** 9
- **∀** KJ32
- ♦ k 10 5
- 98643

LHO Partner RHO You
1 ♥ 2 ♥ Pass 2 nt
```

Consider These Michaels Hands

- **★** K Q 5 4 3
- ♥ J 10 7 6 4
- ♦ A 5
- ***** 3

- LHO You 1 ♦ 2 ♦ 3 🍁
- RHO Pass
- Partner 2 🏚

- **AKQ54**
- A K 7 6 4
- ♦ A 5
- **4** 3

- LHO You 1 ♦ 2 ♦
 - 3 ♣ 3 ♠
- RHO Partner Pass
 - 2 🏚

One More Example

```
★ K J 8 5 4 3
▼ A Q 10 7 6 4
◆ 5
```



When you have extreme distribution, you should bid again,

Advancer Example (1)

- ◆ 9 4 3
- **♥** K 7
- → J 8 3
- ♣ KJ852

LHO Partner RHO You 1 ◆ 2 ◆ Pass 2 ◆

You would make this bid even if RHO had raised opener suit.

More Advancer Example (2)

- **★** KJ83
- **♥** Q 9 7
- ♦ J 8
- ◆ 10 8 5 2

LHO Partner RHO You
1 ♠ 2 ♠ Pass 2 ♥

- You don't know partner's second suit, but you have a heart fit.
 Push them a bid.
- If they were to continue in spades, you might make things a bit uncomfortable for them.

Advancer Example (3)

```
♠ 3

♥ K 10 9 7 5

♦ J 8 6 3
```

♣ Q 8 5

```
LHO Partner RHO You
1 ♥ 2 ♥ Pass 2 nt2
```

You will pass whichever minor partner bids.

Advancer Example (4)

- **★** J 9 8 6
- **♥** KJ8
- ♦ A J 8 6
- **★**87

LHO Partner RHO You
1 ♠ 2 ♠ Pass 2 nt2

- I partner bids diamonds, you will place the contract at 4 ♥
- If partner bids clubs, you would choose to invite game, with 3 ♥.

A Couple Conventional Bids You Should Know

- In a competitive auction, if you want to play in partner's minor, you can bid clubs.
- If you are sure, you want to play game in partner's minor you can bid 4nt. This is not Blackwood.
- 3 nt is natural and to play.
- In a non-competitive auction, the bid of either minor (when partner has shows a major and a minor) says, "I want to play this suit regardless of your holding."

Advancer Example (5)

- **♠** Q 6
- **9** 8 5
- ♦ KJ86
- ♣ A 10 7 3

LHO Partner RHO You
1 ▼ 2 ▼ 3 ▼ 4 ♣ 2

 You want to compete at the 4level, but you will pass if they bid
 4

Advancer Example (6)

- **♦** A 6
- **9** 8 5 3
- ♦ K Q 8 6
- A Q 7

LHO Partner RHO You
1 ▼ 2 ▼ 3 ▼ 4 nt 2

 With this hand, you are willing to play at the 5-level in partner's minor suit

Advancer Example (7)

- **4** 4 2
- **Y** K 7 5 3
- ♦ 8 6
- ♣ J 10 9 4 2

LHO Partner RHO You1 ♣ 2 ♣ pass 3 ♥ 2

- A jump bid in one of partner's known suit is preemptive and non-forcing.
- However, with a really good hand partner might bid

Advancer Example (8)

- **A** A 9 4 2
- **∀** K J 5 3
- **8**
- **★** K 10 9 2

LHO Partner RHO You
1 ★ 2 ★ pass 4 ♥ 2

- A jump bid in one of partner's known suit is preemptive and non-forcing.
- However, with a really good hand partner might bid game directly

Advancer Example (9)

- **★** K Q 8 6
- **Y** A 3
- ♦ 8 6 2
- ♣ A J 9 2

LHO Partner RHO You 1 ◆ 2 ◆ pass 3 ◆ 2

- A cue bid of the opponent's suit is forcing one round..
- It shows game and, possibly, slam interest
- The Michaels bidder, with a weak hand, bids the most convenient of his two suits,
- Any other descriptive bid shows a strong hand.
- In this case, the Michaels bidder, with a weak hand, will bid 3 ♥, you will correct to 3 ♠.

The Unusual 2 No Trump

- This is also a two-suit overcall.
- Like the Michaels cue it is usual a preemptive tactic.
- You can divide unusual no trump hand into three categories, in the same way you do with Michaels cue.
 - 6 to 12 points: make the 2nt bid then leave it up to partner.
 - 13-17 try to overcall one suit than the other']
 - 18+ make the 2nt bid then bid again usually supporting partner.

The Unusual 2 No Trump Bid

- You always know both of the unusual no trump bidder's suits.
 - If the opener opens a major suit, the 2 nt bidder has both minors. (5-5) or better.
 - If the opener opens 1 ◆, the 2nt bidder has ♥ and ♣ (5-5 or better).
 - If the opener opens 1 ♣, the 2nt bidder has ♥ and ♦ (5-5 or better).

Advancer Example (10)

- **♦** K 9 4 2
- **Y** 3
- ♦ J 8 5
- ♣ A J 9 7 2

LHO Partner RHO You 1 ♣ 2 nt pass 3 ♦ 2

- Because RHO has passed, you must bid 3 •
- You have no disire to go any further.
- However, if opener hand bid 1 ♥, your hand would be fitting with both partner's suits and 5 ♣ would be a strong possibility.

Guidelines for the Advancer

- Similar to those for the Michaels cue.
 - A simple preference to one of partner's suits shows no interest in game.
 - A jump in one of the suits is preemptive if it is below the game level.
 - A jump to the game level could be a weak preemptive bid or a bid with the intention of making the contract.
 - A cuebid of the opponent's suit is forcing for one round and shows at least game-invitational values.
 - 3NT is to play.
