## Bridge Judgment



Some Advice from Marty Bergen

#### What Would You Do?

- You are in the second seat.
- For all the following hands, RHO has opened 2 . (Weak)
- 6 diamonds and 5-10 points.

### You Wanted to Open 2 ♠

- **★** K Q J 6 5 4
- **♥** K 7 6
- **♦** 3
- **♣** 6 4 3

A jump bid is out. You don't preempt a preempt.

Just bid 2 ♠. It is not a perfect two-level overcall, but it is the best you can do.

# Would You Make a Takeout Double?

- **★** K Q 4
- **∀** K 7 5 3
- ♦ 7 4
- ♣ Q J 6 3

Not good enough over 2 ◆.

Over 1 ◆ maybe, but over 2 ◆ the hand is too weak. Your bid is "pass."

# Would You Make a Takeout Double?

- **★** K 10 9 2
- **Y** K 10 5 3
  - **\**
- ♣ A 10 9 6 3
- Only 10 high-card points, but so much better distribution. Count your dummy points. You will be supporting the suit partner bids.
- Do Remember, Distribution is power in Bridge

#### Would You Double and Bid Hearts?

- **♦** 9 5 2
- AQJ763
- ♦ K 5
- ♣ A Q
- 17 points. Some people would double, then bid hearts.
- Remember a jump bid over a preempt is strong. So, jump to 3 hearts.
- Best to show your strength immediately.

#### Look at All Those Diamonds

- **♦** A K 3
- **Y** 3
- ◆ A Q 9 7 6
- ♣ Q 7 5 3
- You cannot make a takeout double.
   Partner will surely bid hearts.
- Partner will be in the balancing seat.
   Maybe she will make a balancing double.
- When you have strength in the opponent's suit, it is best to pass.
- Called a "trap pass."

### You Wanted to Open 1 nt

- **♦** J 4 3
- **Y**A963
- ♦ A Q
- ♣ A J 5 3
- You bid 2nt.
- A 2 nt bid over an opponent's weak two, shows a 1 nt opening bid.
- Promises at least one stopper in the opponent's suit.
- If partner is busted, you'll go down.

#### 5-5 Come Alive

- **♠** AJ943
- **Y**A9643
- **8**
- ♣ K 5
- Best to use a Michael's Cue to show this hand.
- Remember distribution is power.

#### **New Situation**

- You are dealer with the following hands.
- What would you bid?

#### 15 Points

- **★** K Q 7 3
- **∀** K J 7 2
- ◆ Q J
- ♣ Q J 3
- Would you open 1 no trump?
- No... too many quacks.
- Note the diamond suit. "dubious doubleton."
- Not worth a 1 no trump opening. I would open 1 ♣.

#### Now Consider This Hand.

- **♠** Q 10 8
- **♥** A J 10 4
- ♦ K Q 9 6
- **♣** K 3
- Still 15 points, but a much better hand.
- Note the intermediate cards.
- Look at the heart suit. Marty Bergen calls that a "quality suit." Add one point for a quality suit.

## Would You Open the Bidding?.

- ♠ Q 10 3
- **♥** A J 4
- ♦ K 8 5
- ♣ Q 7 3 2

- Counts 12 points, but hardly worth 12.
- Note the distribution, 4-3-3-3
- The worst distribution. Subtract a point from a hand with this distribution.
- Better on defense, than offense.

## Would You Open the Bidding?.

Hand A

**★**10 3

A K 9 4

♦ A K 8 5

**♣**10 9 2

Hand B

♠ Q 10 3

**♥** KJ9

♦ K Q 6 5

♣ K 9 2

- A:14 points, but probably worth a bit more.
- You have 4 tricks whether on offense or defense.
- Compare to hand B

## Would You Open the Bidding?.

Hand A

**★** A J 10 3

**y** 9 4

♦ KQ9865

**2** 

Hand B

**♠** Q J 10 5 3

**Y** 9

◆ A K 10 6 5

♣ 9 2

- 10 points, but distribution makes it worth a bit more.
- Meets the "<u>rule of 20</u>."
- If high-card points + the two longest suits equal 20, the hand is worth opening in 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> seat.
