When Opponents Open at the 3 Level or Higher

A Modern Phenomenon

- In past days when we shuffled and dealt hands, 7card suits were a rarity.
- Since we have gone to computer generated hands, 7-card, and even longer, suits have become more common.
- Recently at a club game, in a set of 28 boards, there were 4 hands with 7 card suits.
- Three of them were north-south and one east-west.
- None of them happened to have opening hand count.
- So, they were all opened at the 3 level.

In the Pass-Out Seat

- We'll take a look at what to do in the direct seat later.
- First let's look at what to do in the pass out seat.
- Of course, you can pass and defend.
- Let's look at the kind of hand with which you might get into the bidding.
- Whatever you do is taking a chance.
- The person who opened at the 3-level took a chance and you will have to take a risk if you get into the action.

Your hand ★ K 10 9 7 4 ♥ K 2 ◆ A 6 4 ★ Q J 3

- You have 13 points.
- You would have opened the hand, if you had been in position to do so.
- If 1♥ was passed to you or even 2♥...
- You should overcall spades.
- But at the 3-level best pass.

Your hand ▲ A K 10 9 7 4 ♥ 2 ♦ J 10 4 ♣ Q 10 3

- You have only 10 points.
- But with this hand, you might overcall 3♠.
- The most important features of this hand are:
 - You have a good suit
 - You have a singleton in the opponent's suit.

Your hand

What to do with this hand?

- **◆**74
- 🕈 A J 2
- K Q J 10 5 4
- ♣ A 3

Partner's hand ???

▲ Q J 9 6 4

♥ 5 3

♦ A 7 2

♣ Q J 5

- You cannot make a takeout double.
- You might bid 4 diamonds, but that's only a part score.
- If you can find one trick in partner's hand you can make 3nt.
- It is chancy, but 3nt is not a bad bid.

Your hand

Here's another 3 no trump example. ♠ A K Q 5

♥ Q J 7 ♦ A K 5 4 ♣ K J

- A really strong hand.
- You would have opened 2^(*), if you had the chance.
- If you double, partner is likely to bid clubs or maybe diamonds.
- If partner has anything at all, you can make 3 nt.

When You Have a 2-Suited Hand

- A convention you might want to learn is called Leaping Michaels.
- It is a sequel to the Michaels Cue convention.
- Originally, it was designed to use with a strong two suiter over a weak two opening.
- Leaping Michaels works in the direct seat or the balancing seat.

NorthEastSouthWest2♦passpass4♦

Your hand

♣ 2

Leaping Michaels Example ▲ A K 9 8 5 2 ♥ A J 10 9 3

- First used over a weak two, with a strong two suiter like this.
- But you can easily adapt it to a 3-level preempt.

NorthEastSouthWest3♠passpass4♦

Your hand

Leaping Michaels Example

▲ 2
♥ A K J 9 7 5
♦ K Q 10 8 4
♣ 2

- When they open a major suit.
- A 4-level minor suit bid shows that minor and the unbid major.
- You don't have to have a 6-5 hand but you need a strong two suiter.

NorthEastSouthWest3♠passpass5♦

Your hand

- **≜** 2
- **7** 5 3
- K Q 10 9 8 4 2
- **♣** K J 5

- This means, of course, you cannot bid 4 of a minor to play.
- You must either bid at the 5 level or pass.

NorthEastSouthWest3♠passpass4♠

Your hand

Another leaping Michaels example

- ♥3
- K Q 10 9 8 4
- ♣ K Q J 9 7 5

• A 4-level cue bid of a major suit shows really strong minor two suiter.

NorthEastSouthWest3♠passpass4♥

Your hand ▲ 2 ♥ A K J 10 5 3 ♦ K Q 9 ♣ K J 5 • When you bid an unbid major it is to play.

NorthEastSouthWest3♠passpass4nt

Your hand

Another leaping Michaels example

∳ 4

¥3

♦ A 10 9 8 4
♣ K J 10 9 7 5

- 4 no trump over a 3level preempt shows a weaker minor two suiter.
- This is an optional addition to the leaping Michaels convention.

Your hand

Here's another 3 no trump example.

- **▲** Q J 7 5
- ♥ 7
- ♦ A J 5 4
- ♣ K 9 6 4

- Using a takeout double.
- This hand has the advantage of perfect distribution.
- Not strong enough for a direct-seat takeout, even over 2 ♥.
- But in the balancing seat you should do it.

Your hand ▲ A J 10 ♥ 7 5 ♦ A J 5 4

♣ K J 6 4

- A little stronger hand, but less perfect distribution.
- Only 3 spades is a weakness, but you should make the double.
- Most of the missing highcard points will be with your RHO.
- So most of partner's finesses will work.

North East South West 3♥ pass pass dble or 3nt

Your hand

Here's another 3 no trump example.

- ♠ A Q 9 8
- ♥K95
- ◆ A Q 4
 ◆ K Q 4

- This is a difficult hand.
- If partner bids a minor suit, what will you do?
- If partner has a minor suit you want to play 3nt.
- The only way to get to three no trump is to bid it yourself.

Your hand ▲ K J 9 8 ♥ 9 5 ♦ A Q 4 ♣ K Q J 4

- Double is an easy bid here.
- If partner bids 4 of a minor, you should pass.
- If partner bids 3♠, you can raise to game.
- If you doubled with this hand in the direct seat, you would pass partner's 3♠.

Final Thoughts

- We have looked mostly at the balancing seat, in this lesson.
- Some of the bids I have suggested would be different in the direct seat.
- Don't forget Leaping Michaels.
- It is a good convention to have these days.
- Opening 3-level bids are becoming more and more common.
